It didn't matter that the "conventional wisdom" at that time was that they didn't have the numbers, resources, knowledge, or skill to break free from England, the most powerful nation on earth.

Had the founders been without backbone, our great country would never have emerged. If the founders were susceptible to critics and detractors they certainly would have abandoned their plans before progressing past the conceptual stage. Who were the people that turned the dream of

a free country into reality?

They were farmers, shop keepers, craftsmen, merchants, wagon drivers, sailors, and laborers. They were under equipped, poorly supplied, poorly trained, under paid, and outnumbered. But they had backbone. Without it, the vision of the founders would have collapsed.

Knowing who you are, what you believe in, what you stand boundaries, are all components of the character trait commonly known as "backbone." The willingness to stand up and speak out is a commendable attribute that is not nearly as prevalent as it should be.

Do you know what you believe in? Perhaps you're not. sure or haven't given it much thought. Without knowing what you stand for, how can you know where your boundaries are? You may be asked to do something or be put into a position you are uncomfortable with. The better you know yourself, the better you can identify your boundaries.

Agriculture Secretary Vilsack **Announces Changes to CRP to Assist Producers Impacted by Severe Drought Conditions**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8, 2011 - Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced that the Farm Service Agency (FSA) is modifying its Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) policies to help those affected by sustained drought conditions. Throughout this year of extreme weather, USDA has supported and delivered assistance to farmers, ranchers, and rural communities across the

"We continue to do all we can to help thousands of farmers and ranchers in the south-western United States who are struggling from drought," said Vilsack. "Many ranchers have been or will be forced to sell livestock due to drought and USDA will do what we can to help our farmers and ranchers during these challenging

The policy changes influence FSA rules governing emergency grazing. The period normally allowed for emergency grazing lasts through Sept. 30, 2011. FSA is permit-ting farmers and ranchers in drought stricken states who have been approved for emer-

in Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas, to extend the emergency grazing period to Oct. 31, 2011, without an additional payment reduction.

Producers wishing to participate in emergency grazing must first request permission from the FSA county office by indicating the acreage to be

grazed.

As a second condition designed to help livestock producers, FSA will allow producers nationwide to utilize harvested hay from expiring CRP acres when those acres are being prepared for fall seeded crops. Prior to this modifica-tion, all mechanically harvested hay was required to be destroyed. This change enables livestock producers to feed the hay that is mechanically harvested to their own livestock or to sell or donate hay. Consistent with existing policy for managed or emergency having and grazing of eligible CRP acres, rental payments will be reduced by 25 percent for those utilizing this option.


"We are eager to do all we can in the face of this drought gency grazing, including those crisis across the southern

plains," said FSA Administrator Bruce Nelson. "This has been one of the worst dry and hot spells since the Dust Bowl era of the '30s."

Having backbone takes conviction and strength of character. Having backbone isn't easy. It will make you a target for ridicule and criticism. You will be urged to conform and not rock

Although those with backbone are in the minority, they are the ones who make significant contributions and have the biggest positive impact on others. It takes backbone to innovate and leave the beaten track. It takes backbone to stand up for your principles.

Why is it important for you to have backbone? It allows you to sleep at night without worrying about being swayed from your beliefs. Your principles and standards will guide you through tough times when you may be tempted by the path of least resistance.

Money is a major distraction that clouds one's thoughts and taints judgement. Trouble arises when a person decides to do something for money that violates their code of ethics. The amount is irrelevant. When a person does something contrary to their beliefs, it doesn't matter how much money is involved. The result is the same; you were bought.

Develop principles that help people. Reject actions that take advantage of or put people at risk. Prove the adage "everyone has their price" wrong by not having a price. Stand up for what you believe is right. Don't be intimated or deterred by what you anticipate others might think or say.

Backbone provides peace of mind. You won't have to look over your shoulder and you won't regret that you should have stood your ground.



The Superintendent's Office, on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Borden County Independent School District will receive bids/requests for proposals to serve as Depository for the purpose of assisting with the banking functions for all funds of the Borden County Independent School District.

Pursuant to existing provisions of Chapter 45, Subchapter G, School District Depositories, Texas Education Code, it is the intention of the Board of Trustees of the District to select a Depository through soliciting bids and/or proposals for a Depository services contract for a term of two years beginning September 1, 2011, and ending August 31, 2013, or until such time as a successor Depository is selected and qualified agrees to a depository agreement based on either fees or compensating balances.

The District and the Depository may agree to extend this contract for two additional two-year terms in accordance with Section 45.205 of the Education Code. This section requires that the contract and any extension of this contract coincide with the District's fiscal year. In the event the District changes its fiscal year, the term of the contract may be shortened or extended no more than one year by mutual agreement to coincide, provided that this contract is to remain in effect until its successor is selected and been qualified. If the parties cannot agree, the District may at its option change the term of this

The resulting contract and any extension(s) shall become binding upon the District and the Depository only upon acceptance by the Texas Education Agency.

The legal provisions providing for the naming of a Depository of the District are set forth in Subchapter G, School District Depositories, Sections 45.201 through 45.209, of the Texas Education Code. Investments by the District will be governed by the Government Code, Chapter 2256, Public Funds Investment. Securities pledged as collateral to secure District deposits will be governed by the Government Code, Chapter 2257, Collateral for Public Funds.

A bidders conference/pre-proposal conference will not be held. Bank representation is not required for submitting a bid or proposal; however, the submission of a bid or proposal shall be prima facie evidence that the bidder has full knowledge of the detailed requirements as outlined in this bid and

Bids and Proposals shall be addressed to Jimmy Thomas; Borden County Independent School District; Box 95; Gail, Texas 79738, and shall be delivered in a sealed envelope marked appropriately as "Borden County ISD Depository Bid"/ "Borden County ISD Depository Proposal". Bids and/or Proposals will be received up to but no later than 2:00 P.M. on Friday, August 12, 2011. Bids and/or Proposals will be opened and read as they are received. Banks submitting bids and/or proposals should be careful to see that the appropriate form is used. Bids and/or Proposals will be tabulated, researched, and selected by the Board of Trustees at the regular meeting on August 22, 2011. Bids and/or Proposals received after the specified date will not be considered.

The Borden County ISD Board of Trustees or its designee reserves the right to accept or reject any or all proposed bids and/or proposals, to waive any and all technicalities, and to accept the bid and/or proposal that will best serve the needs of the District.
