Procrastination

can put off until tomorrow," is the mantra sung by procrastinators. There are a variety of motives for delaying or avoid-ing tasks. The items put off are those that are unpleasant, difficult, inappropriate, or risky

Identify and eliminate any tasks that shouldn't be on your to-do list at all. There may be items you don't want to do but other people expect you to. (This discussion relates to personal rather than work related circumstances.) It's very dif-ficult, if not impossible, to find enthusiasm for externally imposed obligations. Perhaps there are chores you don't feel qualified to do. If so, hire someone rather than torturing yourself.

Freeing yourself from the pecter of inappropriate jobs allows your energy to be concentrated on the tasks you are willing to tackle. Otherwise you can get bogged down and wind up not addressing anything.

Begin breaking the procrastination logjam by prioritizing your to-do list. You want to first tackle tasks that have the most immediate impact on your life. There are some tasks that are nice to do but don't have a significant effect.

Activities like organizing

"Don't do today what you your dresser drawers, getting new curtains, rearranging your furniture, or organizing your CD collection fall into this category. These types of tasks should be given the lowest priority.

The most pressing tasks are those with an externally imposed deadline. These are tasks that must be completed by a particular date or an opportunity is lost. For example, you want to rent an apartment. If you don't commit by tomorrow, it will be rented to someone else.

Wait two days to act, and you will lose the chance to rent it. In this type of situation, inaction causes a missed opportunity. If it's an opportunity you wanted to take advantage of, inaction is counter-productive

Start with the most important item on your to-do list and concentrate on it. Don't worry about what's next, otherwise you risk becoming over-whelmed by what you feel is looming overhead. Set a deadline for starting the first task. Then divide it into small subsections. Each part should have its own schedule.

Complete each section and then move on to the next. Don't stop until you have com-

Gail FFA Students Leadership Camp **Attend Area** Leadership Camp



pleted the entire task. Repeat something and it fails? The this process for every item on vour list. All journeys, regardless of length, are accomplished one step at a time.

Cultivating enthusiasm for your pending task makes it easier to get started and keep going. At the very least, you can motivate yourself by imag-ining how good you will feel when you have the task behind you.

Things you procrastinate over can range from the mundane to the critical. Ironically, the more important something is, the more likely it will be put off. It's as if a person is mesmerized into inaction by the magnitude of a situation.

Routines can breed procrastination. Tasks that fall outside of a routine tend to be put off. The familiar is much more comfortable and secure than the new. People attend to the routine before the unknown.

Another reason for procrastination is fear of failure. A concept that has not been implemented always has potential. What if you attempt

potential is gone and you have a failure on your hands. As long as you have not started you have the lure of the potential.

It's like buying a lottery ticket. Once you buy the ticket, you can dream until the drawing. If you don't win, you can spend another dollar next week and begin the dreaming process again. But if you attempt something and it doesn't work, your dream is gone.

Break through procrastina-tion by tackling items from the top of your list and working your way down.

Canning

With summer comes the unsafe. In this method, foods wonderful bounty of fresh garden produce. Do you have squash and tomatoes running out of your ears? If so, have you thought about home canning? It is a lost art, and an enjoyable hobby, however, it is important to follow some basic safety when canning food.

Safe Canning Methods There are two safe ways of canning, depending on the type of food being canned. These are the boiling water canner method and the pressure can-ner method. The boiling water bath method is safe for fruits, tomatoes and pickles, as well as jam, jellies and other preserves. In this method, jars of food are heated completely covered with boiling water (212EF at sea level).

Pressure canning is the only safe method of canning vegetables, meats, poultry, and seafood. Jars of food are placed in 2 to 3 inches of water in a pressure canner which is heated to a temperature of at least 240EF. This temperature can only be reached by a pressure canner.

Unsafe Canning Methods

An old out-dated method of canning - the open-kettle method - is now considered

were heated in a kettle, then poured into jars and a lid was placed on the jar. No process-ing was done. With this method there was often spoilage, because bacteria, yeasts and molds that contaminated the food when the jars were filled were not killed by further processing. The growth of these microorganisms, in addition to spoiling the food, often caused sealed lids to become unsealed late. This method is a very real danger for botulism.

Steam canning is not recommended at this time for either acid or low acid foods. Processing time for use with current models have not been ad-equately researched. Today's steam container looks like an upside-down boiling water canner. One should never use microwave ovens, electric ovens, slow cookers, crock pots or the sun to process canned



Sales Tax August 19-21 Texas shoppers get a break school. from state and local sales taxes The on August 19, 20 and 21 - the state's annual tax holiday. Layaway plans can be used again

the sales tax holiday. As in previous years, the law exempts most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend. Backpacks under \$100 and used by elementary and secondary students are also exempt. A backpack is a pack with straps one wears on the back. The exemption during the sales tax holiday includes backpacks with wheels, provided they can also be worn on the back like a traditional backpack, and messenger bags. The exemption does not include items that are reasonably defined as luggage, briefcases, athletic/duffle/gym bags, computer bags, purses or framed backpacks. Ten or fewer backpacks can be purchased tax-free at one time without providing an exemption certificate to the seller.

School Supplies

The 81st Texas Legislature passed HB 1801 (2009) ex-panding the list of items qualifying for exemption from Texas state and local sales and use taxes during the annual sales tax holiday in August. In addition to clothes, footwear and some backpacks, Texas families also get a sales tax break on most school, supplies priced at less than \$100 purchased for use by a student in an elementary or secondary

The following is an all-in-

clusive list of qualifying school supplies (if priced less than \$100): Binders, book bags, calculators, cellophane tape, blackboard chalk, compasses, composition books, crayons, erasers, folders (expandable, pocket, plastic) and manila, lue, paste and paste sticks, highlighters, index cards, index card boxes, legal pads, lunch boxes, markers, noteposter board, and construction paper, pencil boxes and other school supply boxes, pencil sharpeners, pencils, pens, pro-tractors, rulers, scissors, writing tablets.

Shoppers Get Break From

No exemption certificate is required-with one exception. If the purchaser is buying the supplies under a business ac-count, the retailer must obtain an exemption certificate from the purchaser certifying that the items are purchased for use by an elementary or secondary school student. "under a busi-ness account" means the purchaser is using a business credit card or business check rather than a personal credit card or personal check; being billed under a business account maintained at the retailer; or is using a business membership at a retailer that is membership based

SUBJECT: Water Rationing

Water rationing for all consumers of water on the Borden County Water System will be-gin August 22, 2011, due to the reduced pumping capacity of the two wells operated by Borden County. These wells are located in Dawson County and have been falling behind in water production for the past two weeks.

To protect the integrity of water supply facilities, domestic water use, sanitation, fire protection and to protect and preserve public health, welfare, and safety of the consumers of water from the Borden County Water System, County Judge Ross Sharp has authorized and directed the implementation of the Drought Con-Two and Three.

<u>Water Use Restric-</u> tions: Under threat of penalty for violation, the following water use restrictions shall apply to all persons:

a. Irrigation of landscaped areas with hose-end sprinklers or automatic irrigation systems shall be limited to Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays for commercial and institutional customers, and Saturdays, Mondays and Wednesdays for residential customers and irrigation of landscaped areas if further limited to the hours of 12:00 midnight until 10:00 a.m. and between 8:00 p.m. and 12:00 midnight on designated watering days. However irrigation of landscaped areas s permitted at anytime if it is by means of a hand-held hose, a faucet filled bucket or watering can of five (5) gallons or less, or drip irrigation system.

motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane or their designated watering days between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 10:00 a.m.and between 8:00 p.m. and 12:00 midnight. Such washing, when allowed, shall be done with a hand-held bucket or a handheld hose equipped with a positive shutoff nozzle for quick rinses. Further, such washing may be exempted from these regulations if the health, safety, and welfare of the public is contingent upon frequent vehicle cleansing, such as garbage trucks and vehicles used to transport food and perishables. c. Use of water to fill, or add

to any indoor or outdoor swimming pools, wading pools, or Jacuzzi-type pools is prohibited except on designated watering days between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 10:00 a.m. and between 8 p.m. and 12:00 midnight.

d. Use of water from hydrants shall be limited to fire fighting, related activities or other activities necessary to maintain public health, safety, and welfare, except that use of water from designated fire hydrants for construction purposes may be allowed under special permit from the Borden County Water System.

e. The following uses of water are defined as non-essential and are prohibited:

If a person violates three or more distinct violations, the County Judge/Commissioner shall, upon notice to the customer, be authorized to discontinue service to the premises where such violations occur. Services discontinued under such circumstances shall be restored only upon payment of a re-connection charge, hereby established at \$50, and any other costs incurred by the Borden County Water System in discontinuing service. In addition, suitable assurance must be given to the County Judge/Commissioner that the same action shall not be re-peated while the Plan is in effect. Compliance with this plan may also be sought through injunctive re-
