their 36-32 thrilling victory.


'Our six-man game's not any different—it still comes down to blocking and tackling and our guys stepped up and did what they needed to, es-

Lady JV Coyotes Tame the Spurettes at Home





With Friday's thriller, Borden County now gets the chance to play what Coach Richey often refers to as playing Thanksgiving football against Ira, at 2 p.m. Saturday at Colorado City in the Divi-sion I quarterfinals. Ira was a 56-34 winner over Water Valley in its second round match up Friday.

"Our region's so tough that even after beating No. 1 tonight there still aren't any guarantees," Coach Richey said. "Ira's going to be just as tough as these guys were here to-night. We're talking about the guys (the Bulldogs) who beat these tonight by a touchdown.

Rankin scored the game's first touchdown with 8:29 left in the second stanza on a oneyard plunge by Cory Norwood. Ty Self kicked the PAT, giving the Red Devils the game's first lead at 8-0.

Borden County tied Friday's nail biter at 8-all with 6:13 to go in the second quarter on a 19-yard keeper by Borden County junior quarterback Tanner Richey. Helio Rosales

Both the Red Devils and Coyotes let scoring opportunities slip away in the final 2:49 of the second quarter.

With no time showing on the games clock at Forsan, game officials ruled that Rankin coaches called timeout in the first half's closing seconds, but the Red Devils were unable to cash in, misfiring on a 35yardfield goal as the score remained 8-all at the half.

It did not take the Coyotes long to take their first lead as Austin Fields scored on a 34yard run just seven seconds into the third quarter. Borden County missed that PAT kick, leaving them up 14-8 with 9:53 showing on the third quarter

Rankin, however, answered back with 6:37 left in the third quarter on another one-yard scoring plunge by Norwood. Again, Ty Self kicked the PAT, giving the Red Devils their 16edge at that point.

Borden County re-gained that lead at 20-16 with three minutes to go in the third quarter after Fields scored from 20 yards out.



able foods stay in the danger zone – 40-140 degrees – for more than two hours. Transport time and serving time should be included in these two hours. Be careful with these perishable foods: meat, poultry, seafood, eggs, cooked vegetables and dairy products, and dishes made with any of these foods, such as dressing, gravy, casseroles, cream pies, puddings and dips.

- Perishable foods prepared ahead of time should be kept refrigerated until time to leave. If the food is to be served hot, reheat it at the event.

- Use ovens and micro-waves to reheat food; don't use warming trays or slow cookers. Food thermometers should be used to make sure reheated available, prepare food closer in doubt, throw it out. to the event time and keep it hot by wrapping it in towels or insulated chest.

The holiday season is a time serving time. Use ice chests to

Make sure everything that comes in contact with the foods is kept clean. Wash hands and food preparation surfaces often. Make sure adequate garbage disposal facilities are available and keep garbage away from the food area.

If food will be prepared at - When transporting food to a get-together, don't let perish-rate from foods that will not be cooked, such as salad or raw fruit or vegetable tray ingredients. Use separate cutting boards for fresh produce and for raw meat, poultry and seafood. If separate cutting boards and utensils are not available, clean and sanitize between

- Use shallow containers to store leftovers so that the entire food gets cold sooner. Disposable containers and zippered storage bags are great to divide leftovers up in smaller portions and are easy to send home with guests.

The experts stressed the importance of the two-hour rule: Do not let perishable foods remain in the temperature danger zone for more than two hours.
