





workers who dine out frequently for lunch? Are you faced with too much food and not enough willpower at the buffet line? As a result, do you set out to eat a little bit of everything only to discover that you have to loosen your belt or skirt button? Moderation and watching portions are critical when dining out.

If you know that you cannot handle the temptation of a buffet meal, why go? Instead, go to a restaurant that you can order from the menu. This strategy really works - it allows you to be more mindful of eating behaviors and portion size. Most restaurants will limit serving sizes. Of course, there will be a few that will serve huge portions instead of an actual serving, so be on guard. Research shows that por-

tion sizes have gotten larger over the years. Waistlines have expanded and children and adults are now more obese than ever - in part due to excess food. Think about the last time you were served a large potion. Did you eat more than you planned or more than you thought you should have? I am sure most of you did. We have been served large portions for so long that we have come to see bigger portions as normal.

Is there a difference between a portion and a serving? Absolutely. So, what's the difference?

A serving size is a unit of measure that describes a recommended amount of a certain food. A portion size, on the other hand, is the amount of a food that you choose to eat. For example, a serving size of Fritos corn chips is 1 ounce, or 32 chips. Your portion size, however, might be more like 3 ounces (similar to three handfuls), or close to 100 chips. Carolina Cooper

Are you like millions of tion distortion making it more difficult to gauge what a normal portion is and the amount that we should eat. Most people underestimate how much they actually eat. For example, most cereals are 3/4 to 1 cup serving but some may eat up to 3 cups. And a serving of meat is 3 ounces - not the 5-6 ounces served on a typical

> So, you say you don't know what makes up a serving? Well, the key may be in your own hand. Yes, you can use your own hand to help you estimate several different serving sizes. A fist or cupped hand = 1 cup; a thumb = 1 ounce of cheese; a handful = 1-2 ounces of snack food; the palm of your hand = 3 ounces of meat; the tip of your thumb = 1 teaspoon.

> When dining out, here are a few strategies you can use to watch portions.

> Order lunch portions, half portions or appetizers at restaurants, instead of entrées.

> Order an entrée and take half home for another meal. which will also save you money. Ask for a "take out" container when your meal is

> Order an entrée and share it. The "plate charge" is usually cheaper than another

* Ask for sauces and dressings "on the side" so you can control the amount eaten.

Watching portion sizes is just as important as choosing the foods you eat when trying to maintain a healthy weight. Eating too much of even a healthier food can add unwanted fat and calories to your diet, so remember to be mindful the next time you decide to eat out.





Notice of Availability of Electronic Communications

(Gail)—Under a new law, chief appraisers of county appraisal districts, appraisal districts, and appraisal review boards may communicate elec-tronically through email or other methods with property owners or their designated representatives. Written agreements are required for notices and other documents to be delivered electronically in place

of mailing.
How does it work? Certain guidelines must be followed for this local option commu-

Written agreements with the county appraisal district must be entered first, ensuring what electronic means of delivery are acceptable. If you are interested in receiving communications in electronic format, you should contact your local appraisal district. Public notice regarding

the availability of agreement forms authorizing electronic communications may be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the district on or before Feb. 1 each year, or agreement forms may be delivered on or before Feb. 1 each year to property owners shown on the certified appraisal roll for the preceding tax year.

The chief appraiser may

determine the medium, format, content and method to be used for electronic communications other than notices required by Section 25.19 of the Tax Code, which are prescribed by Comptroller rule.

A decision by the chief appraiser not to enter into agreements may not be the subject of an appraisal review board protest, a lawsuit or a complaint to the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation.


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Borden County ISD and FFA **Program Welcome Student Teacher**




