

Precipitation Boosts Hopes for Good Start to High Plains Crop

Planting time for the 2012 crop is approaching at a rapid pace, and many producers are more "cautiously optimistic" about the moisture situation going into this year, especially compared to what turned out to be a disastrously dry 2011.

Over the past couple of weeks, land on the High Plains has benefited from rains totaling anywhere from a few tenths to more than an inch in some areas.

Weather experts have noted that 2012 already differs from 2011 in that storm systems are dipping further south, creating more of an opportunity for precipitation.

County Extension agents in the area report that some producers are applying pre-plant irrigation, pre-emergent herbicides and some fertilizer, preparing the ground for what they hope will be a more fruitful crop than last year.

However, even with recent praying for rain.'

rain events, the High Plains certainly remains in a drought situation, especially with warmer temperatures and gusty winds causing what moisture does fall to dissipate more quickly. High temperatures around the area this past week have been as much as 15 to 20 degrees above normal, and precipitation forecasts are trending below normal.

According to the West Texas Mesonet, the 10-day average soil temperature at the 8-inch depth ranges anywhere from 50 in Hart and 51 in Pampa to near 60 in southern and eastern portions of the PCG service area.

"Some areas are in pretty good shape right now with regard to moisture," PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett said. "But we've still got a little more than a month to go before the 2012 crop goes into the ground, and we'll keep praying for rain."

Don't Cry Over Spilled Milk



ward. In your life milk will spill. You can act to minimize the spills but they will occur. Some of the most successful people have had the biggest

It's virtually impossible to live a spill free life. Spills will occur, so you may as well make the best out of each situation. Each spill is simply another lesson and opportunity to learn.

What should you do when milk spills? First prevent any more milk from spilling. Then clean up the mess. Next, identify what caused the spill so you can avoid repeating the same deleterious actions. Few things are more frustrating and disheartening than repeating the same mistakes.

Change is the key to avoiding the same mistakes. You must change the way you act and the way you think. Different results require different behavior. If you consistently blame others for your spills you will never be able to deal with the root cause — you.

A person's spill response contributes to their quality of life. One can not attain peace of mind if they are consumed by guilt and remorse. Granted, some spills are bigger and messier than others, but life and time march forward. There are no do-overs, or time outs and you can't sit on the

Although some spills will occur, you do have the ability to reduce their frequency and severity. There are those spills that can't be anticipated or prevented. But there are many more that can. You should try to anticipate future spills so you can take action to avoid or minimize them.

Do what you can to avert spills but don't cry when they occur. Clean up the mess, pick yourself up, and keep moving forward. Learn from your experiences and you will be all the wiser.

4-H Record Books

Record keeping is an important skill for living that is developed through 4-H project work. It is not an extra task, but an integral part of any 4-H project. All 4-H members should integrate some basic record-keeping skills into each project. Record keeping should be tailored for each individual 4-H'er and their project work, leadership, and community service.

The 4-H record keeping system helps youth: develop goal-setting skills by setting individual, project and group goals, foster communication skills through writing and interpretation of 4-H project work, organize and create personal histories, develop a comprehensive 4-H Members Achievement Plan (M.A.P.) by identifying the steps needed to accomplish their goals, and reflect on and understand the value of their learning experience.

By using the record-keeping system, youths develop positive record-keeping habits, have an adequate measurement of what has been learned, have a basis for planning 4-H projects and programs, can interpret information and details, have a greater ability to help or assist leaders and/or agents, and understand the personal value of record-keeping. Borden County EMS Upgrades Communication to Meet New Mandate Local farmer directs \$2,500 through America's Farmers Grow Communities

GAIL, Texas (March 27, 2012) – Borden County is not in a 911 service area. Because of that, all emergency calls from the 960 square miles that Borden County EMS covers go through a private tower service to the EMS volunteers' radios. Those radios provide life saving communication and are an integral part of what keeps the community safe. By 2013, the FCC is mandating a change from wideband to narrowband operation, and the Borden County EMS is required to purchase new radios to meet the new law. Thanks to a local farmer and America's Farmers Grow Communities SM, the EMS will now be able to purchase some of the needed radios.

Grow Communities, sponsored by the Monsanto Fund, gives farmers the opportunity to win \$2,500 for their favorite local nonprofit organizations. Barry O'Brien was the winning farmer in Borden County, and he directed the donation to the EMS.

"The EMS is made up of all volunteers, so I know they can use the extra funds," O'Brien said. "Grow Communities is an outstanding program for allowing me to give back to my rural community."

The EMS needs 10 new radios that cost \$800 each, as well as a \$12,000 receiver/repeater.

"The new radios are very costly for a volunteer organization that charges nothing for its services," said Mike Valentine, president of the EMS. "This donation will be very helpful in purchasing these radios."

March 27 at the Gail Court House, O'Brien got the chance to present the Borden County EMS with the \$2,500 donation.






