The Gail FFA Chapter was active once again this past Saturday as several of its members traveled to the Texas Tech Campus in Lubbock to compete in the State FFA CDE Judging Contests.

The Wool team consisting of Dalton Thuett, Matt Roberson and Sydnie Rebeles were coming off of a successful run to two contest wins and one $5^{\text {th }}$ place finish this season.

The Cotton team members Maeghan Herridge, Jared Smith, Jordan Day and Teryn Soto also entered the state event as a team who was undefeated in their outings this year with wins at Canyon and Clarendon College. Additional team member Tye Basquez was unable to attend the state contest due to her advancement in UIL but also helped the team to secure these earlier fin-

These individual awards came from a contest total of 300 plus individuals.

Although the wool team did not secure a top 10 team finish at the state contest, they too can close the book on a successful chapter of judging this year.

Mr. Wallace stated that he was very proud of the students' success and work in the CDE Judging events and wishes to thank all students on the Livestock, Horse, Wool and Cotton teams for their dedication and character while competing.

## Resentment

Harboring resentment is no different than drinking poison and expecting someone else to suffer. It's a common misconception that you can punish another person through resentment. Left unchecked, resentment and its deleterious results will last a lifetime
Resentment is a response to someone else's actions or your own behavior. If you are treated in a rude, unjust, unfair, or insulting fashion you may reflexively experience resentment towards the offending person. When you believe you have made a mistake, you can feel resentment towards yourself.

The effects of resentment are numerous. You can become bitter, angry, upset, depressed, stressed, or any combination of negative emotions. Resentment can also induce physical ailments. Any way you look at it, resentment is devoid of benefit.

When slighted, you reflexively want to lash out and cause the offending person the same misery you are experiencing. Although this is a normal defensive mechanism, it's a boomerang that impacts you more than anyone else.

Resentment can become buried deep inside you and is a time-release poison that stays
potent as long as you hold onto it. The only antidote to resentment is purging it from your system. You can't control it or ignore it. You must eliminate resentment.
Getting rid of resentment doesn't mean having to accept or adapt to aberrant behavior. Never waste a minute thinking about people you don't like. Most of the time you can chose the people you want to continue to interact with. It's your responsibility to be discriminating with who you spend your time
But there are some people you have to deal with on a recurring basis. This can be because of family or work situations. In these instances it can be especially difficult to not harbor resentment towards those you would rather not be interacting with

You can avoid resentment by not internalizing the actions of others. Although you have no control over the behavior of others, you can manage your own emotions. Even if someone's actions were personal, you want to prevent resentment.

Your objective is to protect yourself from self-destructive emotions and behavior. To-

## UIL Literary Students Advance to State Meet

Seven Borden High School students will represent the school in Austin May 20-22 at the University Interscholastic League State Meet.
By virtue of two team wins and three individual places, BHS scored 58 points at the Region II-A meet held April 21 in Abilene.
The Current Issues and Events Team was seeded \#1 entering the meet, scoring three points ahead of Stamford and Electra's teams. Zach McMeans had the third highest individual score prior to the regional contest.
Both placements held up, as team members Frank Banman, Mallory McMeans, and Sean Tucker all improved their scores to join Zach in capturing the regional championship by four points over Stamford.

Zach's individual score earned him a bronze medal and a state-qualifying position with his third place finish in Current Issues and Events.

By contrast, the Social Studies team (this year's topic was Latin America) was seeded third behind Harmony Science Academy (Dallas) and Summit International Prep (Arlington). The two prep schools had district scores that were 30 points ahead of Borden County
After the dust settled, though, the Coyotes improved their district score by 32 points and celebrated a first place team finish by defeating Christoval, 163-138, and Summit International, 163-135; Harmony Science did not even field a complete team and thus were not eligible for team honors. State-qualifying team members are Shea Burkett Matthew Ham, Mollie McMeans, and Zach McMeans.
Mollie captured third place individual honors and qualified for state individually as well as being a Social Studies team member. Brother Zach scored points for BHS with his fourth
place ranking on the same test. Zach's day was not finished as he qualified for this third event by winning a bronze medal in Persuasive Speaking. He gave two speeches to advance: one over the Texas redistricting plan and one over the French presidential elections.

The Spelling and Vocabulary Team finished third in team competition. Team members are Shea Burkett, Matthew Ham, Steelie Sanders, and Cayden Vaughn.
Junior Celina Guerrero also advanced to the finals in $P o$ etry Interpretation.
Other competitors/events in Abilene were Luke Burkett (Science/Biology), Austin Fields (Calculator), Kassie Gaines (Informative Speaking), Taylor Gass (Poetry), Tye Basquez (Informative Speaking), McKenna Campbell (editorial writing), and Mallory McMeans (News Writing and Feature Writing.

In the girls 800 Relay, Teryn Soto replaced Massingill and again the girls finished $7^{\text {th }}$ with a solid time of 1:52.5 in some very difficult weather conditions. Aubree Lester competed in the triple jump and finished $5^{\text {th }}$ place with a jump of $33^{\prime} 7$ '". Raegan Belongia competed in the discus but was unable to make the finals. Hanna Forbes finished $4^{\text {th }}$ in the 300 hurdles with a career best time of 48.89. Taylor Gass competed in the mile and finished run-ner-up with a career best time of $5: 52$.
On the Boys side, Luke Burkett finished runner-up in the 3200 with a time of 11:11. Luke came back and competed in the mile and ran a 5:05 on his way to a $7^{\text {th }}$ place finish. Throwers Matt Roberson and TJ Basquez had solid days making the finals in both of the throws. wards this end, you have to let go of other people's actions and concentrate on your goals and the quality of your life. Any time spent harboring resentment is precious time lost forever.

The best strategy is to not allow resentment to take hold in the first place. Usually feelings of resentment accompany feelings of anger. Anger is the first warning sign. As soon as you feel the onset of anger be alert to the potential for resentment. Initial anger may fade somewhat over time but it can create deep-seated resentment. Resentment consumes your energy without producing any positive results.

Diffusing resentment involves a decision process. First determine if there is any action you can take that will rectify the situation in a positive way. Retribution and revenge don't qualify. Any re-
sult should ideally leave you in a more stable position without risking behavior that you may later regret or be ashamed of. If you can take action to correct a wrong, clear up a misunderstanding, or prevent yourself from being taken advantage of, then do it.
There are those circumstances where no effective action can be taken. In these cases, you have to accept it and move on. Learn as much as possible from your experiences so you can avoid similar circumstances in the future.
Learning to live without resentment will make you happier and healthier. It takes practice, so start today.
