Resentment

Harboring resentment is no different than drinking poison and expecting someone else to suffer. It's a common misconception that you can punish another person through resentment. Left unchecked, resentment and its deleterious results will last a lifetime.

Resentment is a response to someone else's actions or your own behavior. If you are treated in a rude, unjust, unfair, or insulting fashion you may reflexively experience resentment towards the offending person. When you believe you have made a mistake, you can feel resentment towards yourself.

The effects of resentment are numerous. You can become bitter, angry, upset, depressed, stressed, or any combination of negative emotions. Resentment can also induce physical ailments. Any way you look at it, resentment is devoid of benefit.

When slighted, you reflexively want to lash out and cause the offending person the same misery you are experiencing. Although this is a normal defensive mechanism, it's a boomerang that impacts you more than anyone else.

Resentment can become buried deep inside you and is a time-release poison that stays

potent as long as you hold onto it. The only antidote to resentment is purging it from your system. You can't control it or ignore it. You must eliminate

Getting rid of resentment doesn't mean having to accept or adapt to aberrant behavior. Never waste a minute thinking about people you don't like. Most of the time you can chose the people you want to continue to interact with. It's your responsibility to be discriminating with who you spend your time.

But there are some people you have to deal with on a recurring basis. This can be because of family or work situations. In these instances it can be especially difficult to not harbor resentment towards those you would rather not be interacting with.

You can avoid resentment by not internalizing the actions of others. Although you have no control over the behavior of others, you can manage your own emotions. Even if someone's actions were personal, you want to prevent resentment.

Your objective is to protect yourself from self-destructive emotions and behavior. To-



Track Teams Enjoy Final Tune-Up Before **Regional Meet**

The Borden County men's and women's track teams traveled to Lubbock Cooper Thursday to participate in the Cooper Regional Qualifiers meet. The girl's sprint relay finished 7th overall but in the process, in very difficult conditions set a school record with a time of 52.06. The foursome of Hanna Forbes, Stefanie Cooley, Kalyn Massingill, and Aubree Lester put their names in the record books.

In the girls 800 Relay, Teryn Soto replaced Massingill and again the girls finished 7th with a solid time of 1:52.5 in some very difficult weather conditions. Aubree Lester competed in the triple jump and finished 5th place with a jump of 33'7". Raegan Belongia competed in the discus but was unable to make the finals. Hanna Forbes finished 4th in the 300 hurdles with a career best time of 48.89. Taylor Gass competed in the mile and finished runner-up with a career best time of 5:52.

On the Boys side, Luke Burkett finished runner-up in the 3200 with a time of 11:11. Luke came back and competed in the mile and ran a 5:05 on his way to a 7th place finish. Throwers Matt Roberson and TJ Basquez had solid days making the finals in both of the throws. Matt finished second in the shot with a throw of 48'4" while TJ finished 5th with a throw of 46'2" in the discus, Matt finished 4th with a throw of 131'4" while TJ finished 8th with a throw of 125'6". The Mile Relay of Austin Fields (53.5), Riley Smith (55.4), Tanner Richey (53.1) and Collin Telchik (57.1) ran a 3:38.7 to finish 7th overall. Richey and Austin Tyler also competed in the 110 hurdles. Both hit several hurdles while turning in times of 15.59 and 15.71 finishing 5th and 7th. In the 300 hurdles

Richey came back and ran a 42.5 to finish 4th

Richey, Tyler, Roberson and Basquez all traveled to Roscoe on Friday to compete in an-Qualifiers meet. Roberson and Basquez finished 1-2 in the shot, as Matt threw the shot 46'7" and TJ hit a 45'6". In the discus throw, Matt hit a 134'8" and TJ threw a 131'5". These two stayed over after the contest and threw some more and both of these young men hit at or over 140' so hopefully they can take that success into the regional meet in this event.

In the 110 hurdles, Tanner Richey and Austin Tyler both turned in career best times. Richey ran a 15.02 placing 4th while Tyler ran a 15.16 placing 5th. Richey came back and competed in the 300 hurdles and turned in a season best time in winning the race with a 40.88

go of other people's actions and concentrate on your goals and the quality of your life. Any time spent harboring resentment is precious time lost forever.

The best strategy is to not allow resentment to take hold in the first place. Usually feelings of resentment accompany feelings of anger. Anger is the first warning sign. As soon as you feel the onset of anger be alert to the potential for resentment. Initial anger may fade somewhat over time but it can create deep-seated resentment. Resentment consumes your energy without producing any positive results.

Diffusing resentment involves a decision process. First determine if there is any action you can take that will rectify the situation in a positive way. Retribution and revenge don't qualify. Any re-

wards this end, you have to let sult should ideally leave you in a more stable position without risking behavior that you may later regret or be ashamed of. If you can take action to correct a wrong, clear up a misunderstanding, or prevent yourself from being taken advantage of, then do it.

There are those circumstances where no effective action can be taken. In these cases, you have to accept it and move on. Learn as much as possible from your experiences so you can avoid similar circumstances in the future.

Learning to live without resentment will make you happier and healthier. It takes practice, so start today.



10. A motion was made by Mike Valentine and seconded by Carol Lewis to approve the annual Student Health Advisory Council Report as submitted. The motion carried unani-


