

## Coyotes Crush The **Cougars With Final Score of 72-24**

they did in their district opener Friday at home. The visiting Klondike Cougars playing with a lot of confidence came out and took the opening kick and commenced to drive the ball right down the field for a quick touchdown aided by a 55 yard pass play to take a 6-0 lead over the home town Borden County Coyotes. As has been the case all year long the Coyote offense, they came out fast and explosive as Tanner Richey followed the blocks of Matt Roberson, Helio Rosales, Kurt Shafer, TJ Basquez and Jared Smith untouched from 32 yards out on the first offensive play of the game for the home team. Rosales hit the extra point to give the Coyotes their first lead of the game.

The Cougars would not go away as they converted two 4th downs on their next drive, the second allowing the visitors to regain the lead with 4:49 left in the first quarter at 12-8. Again, Richey and the Coyote offense scored on the first offensive play, this time on a 45 yard run. Another Rosales kick gave Borden County a 16 to 12 lead. The Coyotes finally got into the act as Frank Banman

The moto for the 2012 Coyotes is "Start Fast...Finish Strong", but that is not what plays later TJ Basquez extended the Coyote lead to 24 to 12 with his 10 yard touchdown run and Rosales kick. On the next defensive possession, Steven Howard intercepted a Cougar pass and two plays later Richey extended the lead with a nice 62 yard run to put the Borden County up 30-12. On the next Cougar possession, it looked as though the Coyotes would stop the visitors, as the Cougar quarterback squirted out of the grasp of a Coyote defender on 4th down and found a receiver in the back of the endzone to cut the Coyote lead to 30-18 with 5:08 left in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter.

The Coyote offense immediately responded as Richey sprinted 46 yards to regain the 18 point lead at 36 to 18 with 4:58 left in the period. On the next defensive possession, Jared Smith came up with the first of his two interceptions. Two plays later, on a run/pass option play, Richey took off and looked to be hemmed in, but a bone crushing block by Basquez paved the way to pay dirt for Richey and the Coyotes and a commanding 44 to 18





#### Family Eating

Sure, you want to help your family to eat healthy. So what's stopping you? If you think it takes too much time to shop and prepare nutritious meals, you have plenty of company. Many people aren't doing more to eat healthy because they think it takes too much time, according to a survey conducted by the American Dietetic Association. But there's good news ... the road to healthy eating is paved with shortcuts. Try these timesaving tactics to help you feed your family well—and with great taste, too:

Make simple switches at the supermarket. It doesn't take extra time to buy products such as whole grain cereal, fatfree milk, lean ground beef, baked chips, whole wheat bread or reduced-fat cheese. Ditto for high-nutrition snacks such as yogurt, raisins, frozen fruit juice bars and whole-

wheat pita bread.

Poke the produce. There's a washed, cut and ready-to-eat fruit and veggie ready for every taste bud. Think about bagged lettuce and spinach, baby carrots, cut-up broccoli and cauliflower, cubed cantaloupe and pineapple. Of course, favorites such as apples, pears, oranges, bananas and grapes are fast fruit, too. For a switch, try new varieties—you often can try a sample right in the produce department.

Swing by the salad bar. Sure you can use it to quickly assemble a salad. But think outside the bar! Save prep steps by picking up ready-togo ingredients for tonight's recipe. Try sliced onions, celery and carrots to start a soup or stew, or chopped lettuce, tomato and shredded cheese for taco-toppers. While you're at it, pick up some fruit salad for dessert.

Pad your pantry. Don't get caught short, especially out here where we are not able to "drop by" the store. Stock up on often-used quick meal fixings such as canned beans and tuna, various pasta shapes, jars of spaghetti sauce and quick-cooking brown rice. Stash away some canned or frozen fruits and veggies, too. They're always there when you need them and just as nutritious as fresh ones because they're packed at the peak of freshness.

Make it big on the weekend. Block out a few hours to make a big batch of chili, a hearty soup, a pasta dish or a casserole. When schedules heat up during the week, you and your family can just zapand-eat

Use time-saving cooking techniques. Bake chicken instead of frying, or let a pot of bean soup bubble away on the back burner. Meanwhile, you can prepare the rest of the meal, get caught up on some household chores or just kick back and relax for a few minutes.

Slip good nutrition into fast favorites. Make instant oatmeal with milk instead of water. Load sandwiches up with lettuce and tomato. Toss frozen mixed vegetables into canned soup. Top your favorite frozen cheese pizza with a rainbow of veggies like broccoli florets, chopped red peppers or sliced zucchini. (Tip: Toss veggies in a little vegetable oil first so they don't dry out.)

Demand double duty from big restaurant portions. Bring some home to make a quick start on tomorrow's meal. For instance, slice up steak from your doggie bag to star in tonight's beef and broccoli stir-fry.

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
