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Marines To Enlist Men For Indefinite Periods

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 6. — To accommodate those men who do not desire to commit themselves to regular three or four year enlistments, the Marines will now enlist men for an indefinite period, the San Antonio Marine recruiting office announced today.

Such men will receive all the benefits due regular Marines. They will compete for promotion in rank with regular Marines. Their pay and privileges will be the same.

Those who enlist for this class of the Marine Corps will be assigned to active duty immediately and sent to recruit depot at San Diego, Calif.

Young men 19 to 26 are eligible for the draft under selective service. Men interested in service with the Marine Corps must apply for enlistment, either regular or indefinite, prior to receiving pre-induction notice from their local draft boards.

All men 17 to 29 years of age who can meet the requirements of the Marine Corps can now enlist at the recruiting office, located in the Post Office Building in San Antonio.

Letter From State Health Officer

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 14. — "The wide advertising of anti-histamines for the prevention of colds should not persuade people to place too much confidence in these drugs as a treatment for colds," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer warns the citizens of Texas. "Those who decide to take any of the anti-histamine pills should realize it is highly important for them to follow exactly the directions. "Regardless of the effectiveness of these new products it

remains most desirable to take the ordinary precautions against contracting a cold — adequate sleep, clothing adapted to the weather, well balanced diet, moderate outdoor exercise and avoidance of unnecessary contacts with those already suffering from colds. Extra rest and the drinking of large amounts of fruit juice are still important aids to physical well being and cure if a cold occurs.

"Unfavorable reactions such as dizziness, drowsiness, and temporary loss of muscle control sometimes occur after taking this drug. Everyone is strongly advised against driving an automobile or working around machinery while taking pills.

"Some readers of advertisements may get the idea that taking small doses of anti-histamines every day will prevent colds. Such use of drugs should be discouraged. Anti-histamines are still new and largely unproved drugs. Physicians have not yet determined what effect these products may have upon the human system if taken over a long period of time.

VIENNA. — Austria with its seven million people is of far more importance in the world than its population and size would indicate. It is the size of Alabama.

Vienna, the capital, is surrounded by Russian occupation, while the areas occupied by the other three powers are a hundred miles or so away. The situation is similar to that of Berlin and Germany, except is Vienna; whereas Germany is not necessarily Berlin. Vienna has a third of the population of all Austria, is its industrial, political and economic heart.

But unlike the situation in Berlin, the Russians cooperate (after a fashion) in the joint control of Vienna. While the city is split into zones, traffic moves freely over the city and Austrian police operate without much interference from occupying forces.

An exception was noted, however, when the Soviet military ordered Austrian police to keep their hands off the Communist general strike effort, going on while we were there. But the strike fizzled out.

The Russians are treacherous, tricky and take advantage of every chance to embarrass and hamper the Western powers. The Reds have been able through pressure to have short Communist propaganda film included in all newsreel showings in Vienna and elsewhere. Not long ago Russian troops got rather friendly with other occupying soldiers. Some would attend American dances, socials, etc.

Then suddenly those troops were yanked out and replaced with younger soldiers who do not fraternize with our forces at all.

That is typical of the Communist technique of keeping their men away from exposure to western ideas and understanding. They must be kept in abject ignorance if their false teachings are to be fully effective.

The U. S. has about 9,000 troops in Austria. Russia has 40,000, Britain and France have fewer than we. If Russia wanted to take Vienna and Austria, it would, of course, be

a push-over. But thus far, Russia's ideological war has been a dismal failure.

In the last election 96% of the people voted and only 5% voted Communist. It can be said that not more than 3% of the rank and file in Austria are Communist.

Reasons for this include the presence of Russian troops in an arrogant and haughty manner; economic chains imposed on the Austrians to pay for occupation costs; and the Russian willingness to negotiate in good faith, a peace treaty for Austria which would lead to withdrawal of occupying soldiers.

A treaty was first proposed by the U.S. in 1946, and negotiations were begun in 1947. Already there have been 258 sessions held. Many agreements have been reached and obviously liberal concessions have been made by the Western powers in an attempt to turn Austria back to the Austrians. But the Reds have haggled for months over details and small matters.

One concession of importance that has been made, and agreed to, by Britain, France and the U.S. is an agreement to give Russia most of Austria's oil production for a period of 30 years, including any new discoveries. At present, the Austrian fields (located inside the Russian Zone) produce 10 million barrels per year. This is an extension of the Ploesti fields in Rumania.

Russia doesn't want to pull out of Austria. First, her troops keep the west with its influence away from the borders of Hungary, Rumania and other satellites. Secondly, the Reds hope to make inroads into anti-Communist Austria, by its imposed youth movements and on-the-spot propaganda programs. And, third, the Russians instead of their occupation costing money, are actually making a profit on the deal. They take what they need to pay their costs, and force the shipment of exports into Russia or the satellites.

And so it goes. The Russians, ruthless and cantankerous, never get impatient. They wait and take advantage of every chance to cash-in on Western impatience and thereby drive a better bargain.

Already, one is besieged by hundreds, nay thousands of suggestions that he buy this, but that, do this, do that, send this or that — most of it is mercenary, selfish motives. Let us remember, above all things, it is the Christ Child's birthday.

The hundreds of young men who are being killed daily in Korea is something to give one pause and think. To what end like of these young men? To die for freedom, for Democracy? To die that others might live and enjoy freedom? To preserve our ideals and aims? To fight for God against the Godless? The answer is somewhere there.

We remember way back when we used to go to school, that most of the youngsters of that day and time often looked upon history as an exciting and interesting story, a study which absorbed many a young mind. Ever since man came on this earth, there have been wars, many of them. Ambition, pride, lust of power, conquest—these and almost any other excuse have been used by the ruthless to gain possession of other lands and enslave other peoples. That day of peace and brotherly love is still far in the distant future, according to all appearances and accounts.

Letterwriting is one of the hardest tasks in the world for many people. Not because they don't know how to write, for there are many interesting writers, and with people busy all around there is much to write about. We don't mean gossip or rumor. But people as a rule, are very interesting. They do things common and unusual, serious and funny, and can give anyone inspiration and the blues. Now, although the cost is high, we are rearming faster than many think and getting ready for what ever may come. These troubled times have had a harsh awakening on America, for which we can thank those wishy-washy souls who always have, and possibly always will, believe in appeasement. They fail because they don't realize that the present mental age of the peoples of the world is such that they can only understand force.

The high cost of goods, and especially foods, is causing more than a little concern among the people of the country. Those unions and groups which are always striking or striving for higher wages will send the cost of goods up, and shrink the sales of the goods they make for the simple reason that it is getting beyond the reach of the ordinary persons, this business of making a living. 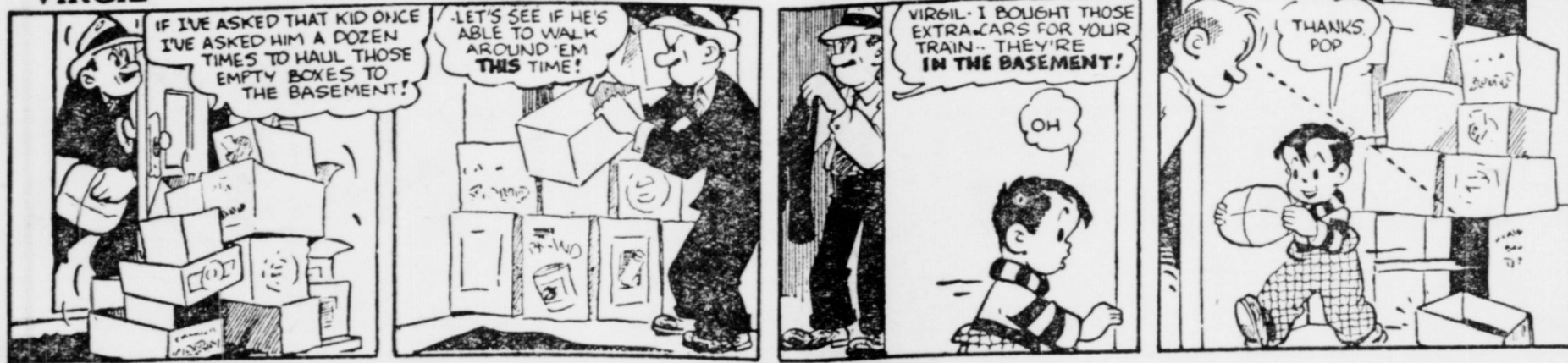

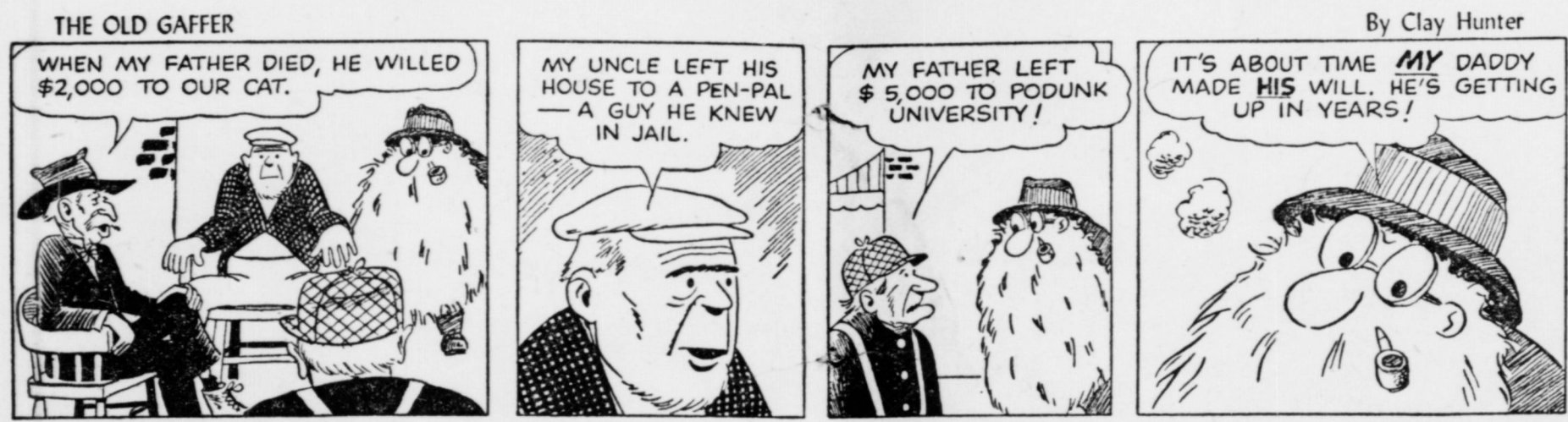

HOUSEHOLD MEMOS... by Lynn Chambers



Treat the Family to Yeast Rolls
(See Recipes Below)

Bake with Yeast
NO MATTER HOW simple a meal, its appeal can be enhanced greatly with freshly baked, yeast-leavened bread or rolls. There's a certain home-like charm about baking with yeast and the wonderful fragrance that fills the kitchen with baking of this kind which most homemakers enjoy.

With a good basic recipe that you have learned to perfection, you can turn out many different styles and varieties of rolls. They're fun to make, and it's nice to serve them fresh and sweet-smelling right from the oven.

HERE'S A GOOD recipe for bread type rolls which is easy to follow:

*Rolls

- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 1/4 teaspoons salt
- 4 1/2 tablespoons shortening
- 3/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1 package yeast, compressed or dry granular
- 4 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour

Scald milk, add sugar, salt and shortening; stir until dissolved. Cool to lukewarm. Place lukewarm water into a large bowl and sprinkle or crumble in yeast. Let stand until dissolved, about 5 to 10 minutes. Add lukewarm milk mixture. Stir in 2 1/4 cups flour and beat until smooth. Add remaining 2 1/4 cups flour and mix thoroughly. Turn dough out on lightly floured board and knead until dough is tightly stretched and shiny, feels springy and elastic and does not stick to the board. Place in a lightly greased bowl and brush top with melted shortening. Cover with towel, let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until double in bulk, about one hour and 25 minutes.

When doubled in bulk, punch down and turn out on lightly floured board. Shape rolls as desired. Cover with a towel and let rise in a warm place until double in bulk. Bake in a hot (425°) oven for 20 minutes.

DAD AND THE youngsters will love these little doughnuts, and they're no chore to make since you simply have to drop spoonfuls of the batter into frying fat, thus saving the fuss and bother of rolling and cutting. They are made from a yeast-leavened batter that will

keep nicely in the refrigerator for a day or two, so you can have nice, fresh doughnuts for several days. Glaze them, if you want to be fancy, or toss them in plain or cinnamon or orange sugar.

Kitchenette Doughnuts (Makes about 3 dozen)

- 1 package yeast, compressed or dry granular
- 1/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup melted shortening
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 3 1/4 cups sifted flour (about)

A yeast dough is rather sticky when you first begin to knead it, but this does not mean that too little flour has been used. As kneading continues, the dough becomes smooth and satiny.

Moderately soft doughs make the best breads, so do not use too much flour during kneading.

If you like crusty rolls after baking, place the rolls in a pan about one inch apart.

Fat for frying

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk; add sugar, shortening and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add 1 cup flour and beat well. Add eggs and beat well. Add softened yeast and mix until dough is smooth. Add remainder of flour to make a stiff batter. Add vanilla and mix until smooth. Cover and let rise until light and bubbly, about one hour. Stir down and cover; let rest for 10 minutes, while heating fat to moderate temperature (350°). Drop batter from teaspoon into hot fat and fry doughnuts about 1 1/2 minutes on each side until golden brown.

Sugary Cinnamon Twists (Makes about 2 dozen)

- 1 package yeast, compressed or dry granular
- 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons shortening
- 1 egg
- 3 cups sifted flour (about)
- 1/4 cup melted butter or substitute
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon cinnamon

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk; add sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add flour to make a thick batter. Mix well. Add softened yeast and eggs. Beat well. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead

until smooth and satiny. Place in a greased bowl. Cover and let rise in a warm place for about 1 1/2 hours, until doubled. When light, punch down. Let rest for 10 minutes. Mix together the 1 cup sugar and cinnamon. Prepare a 12x9-inch pan by greasing with butter and sprinkling with 3 tablespoons of the cinnamon sugar. Roll dough into a rectangle 10 by 20 inches. Brush lightly with butter; sprinkle a thin layer of cinnamon sugar over the dough. Fold the dough over in thirds so as to have long narrow strips of dough in three layers. Seal edge and flatten strip with rolling pin or hands. Cut crosswise into 1-inch strips. Roll each strip under hands. Place hands at each end of strip and twist by moving hands in opposite directions. Pick up dough at the two ends at the same time to let dough shape itself into a twist. Place twists side by side into prepared pan. Brush tops of twists with butter and sprinkle with remainder of cinnamon sugar. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in a moderate (375°) oven for about 25 minutes.

Baking time of bread depends upon the size of the loaves. A pound loaf will usually bake satisfactorily in 45 to 50 minutes in a hot (400° F. to 450° F.) oven. Plain rolls bake in 15 to 20 minutes at this temperature.

Don't forget to add salt to your bread and rolls when mixing. It gives a lot of flavor to yeast doughs and also helps to control fermentation.

Flour added to the dough after mixing will result in dark streaks and coarse textured bread and rolls.

Sing Something Purple

The fact that music can bring certain colors to mind has long been recognized by psychologists. Two of them, Henry S. Odbert and Theodore F. Karowski, found that—out of 148 college students—39 per cent were able to "see" a color or colors while listening to music. Of the number, 53 per cent were able to associate a color and 31 per cent felt a color response. Newton related colors to the diatonic scale in this manner: Do, red; re, orange; mi, yellow; fa, green; sol, blue; la, indigo; and si, violet. Attempts have been made to fashion color organs and other devices to express the correlation of color and music.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Attempt Made to Kill President; Master Defense Plan for Europe Reportedly Agreed on by Allies

(EDITOR'S NOTE: When opinions are expressed in these columns, they are those of Western Newspaper Union's news analysis and not necessarily of this newspaper.)



In a last desperate effort, North Korean troops attacked U.N. forces just short of the Yalu river as the war in Korea entered its dying moments. Chinese Red troops were reported to have joined the North Koreans in the last minute stand. U.N. forces totaling nearly 200,000 men continued to push northward in the final phases of the struggle.

TRUMAN: Escapes Assassination

For the first time in history an attempt was made to assassinate a president of the United States at his official residence. The plot came to an end in a blazing gun battle at the very steps of Blair House, the temporary White House.

The assassins were identified as Griselio Torresola, who died almost instantly of wounds, and Oscar Collazo, seriously wounded, both of New York. The men were members of the Puerto Rican Nationalist party which started an uprising in Puerto Rico a few days before the attempted assassination.

Three policemen on duty at Blair House at the time of the attack were wounded. One of the guards, Pvt. Leslie Coffelt, 40, died a short time later in a Washington hospital. The other two were reported seriously injured.

According to best reports the two assassins approached Blair House, one from the east and one from the west. Collazo opened fire first when within 10 feet of a policeman on duty at the steps of Blair House. Two other guards at posts near the steps opened fire on Collazo.

Meanwhile, Torresola, within a few seconds of Collazo's opening shot, opened fire in front of Lee House, which adjoins the Blair mansion on the westerly side.

Guards returned the fire and within seconds both would-be assassins were shot down.

Collazo is reported to have told police that he and Torresola came to Washington "with the express purpose of shooting the President". On Torresola's body was found a letter and a memorandum both cryptic but indicative of conspiracy of the Nationalists to kill Mr. Truman.

The attack resulted in an immediate crack-down on the Nationalist party in Puerto Rico which has demanded independence of the United States.

The Communist party, afraid of being involved in the plot, immediately disavowed any connection with it and termed the attempt a 1950 version of the "Reichstag-fire frame-up in Hitler Germany."

TIBET: Invasion Ordered

The Indian government which had tried to appease both the east and west in the current battle for freedom, received a rude shock with the official confirmation that Communist China had ordered her troops into Tibet.

India had thrown its weight behind the move to seat Communist China in the United Nations. With the invasion of Tibet, Prime Minister Pandit Nehru found himself in a difficult position. Red armies were at the border of India and it appeared likely that Nehru would be forced to review his policies.

If Communist China and Russia continue their present partnership in foreign policy and exploitation of China's natural resources, the disappearance of free Tibet will bring a formidable combination of Communist-powers to bear against non-Communist India.

Nehru finds himself now in a very unfavorable situation in the struggle for dominance in Asia.

THOSE POINTS AGAIN

Army Reveals Point System for Reservist

Veterans of World War II are not likely to forget the point system by which armed forces were demobilized when the conflict came to an end. Now a point system is again in the news.

Headliners

"The time has long since passed when the world can be stirred to hope by general phrases of the Soviet Union about disarmament and peace and German unity," Secretary of State Dean Acheson said in rejecting a Cominform proposal for a unified Germany.

"You can have all the glittering front that's left in Europe today. I've had enough," said Barbara Hutton, American heiress who had four husbands, three of them European.

"It is useful for the American government to show in a plain way that it is ready to help people rather than issuing propaganda as some other countries," Premier Tito of Yugoslavia announced his resignation to the administration should the country would get U.S. aid.

EUROPE: Master Defense Plan

The will and a plan for the defense of Europe against any aggression was made known to the world when the Atlantic pact nations reportedly agreed on a unified army of about 50 divisions, strong fleets in the Atlantic and Mediterranean and a mighty air armada based in Britain and on the continent.

The plans called for General Dwight D. Eisenhower to be named supreme commander of the collective armed forces. The defense plan would reach full force as soon as possible and not later than 1953, it was reported.

The plan is a further step in the armament for defense program outlined in a recent speech by President Truman. The western world has accepted the belief that Russia understands only armed strength.

In the new plan, the U.S. would furnish five to 10 divisions, more than half the warships, all strategic bombers, and five to 10 groups of tactical fighter planes. France reportedly would provide 20 to 23 divisions; Britain about five; Belgium, Luxembourg, and the Netherlands five to 10, and Italy about 10.

Britain would contribute a smaller number of warships than the United States, but would share the major responsibility for sea power.

CASUALTIES: Climb to 26,701

The terrible price of war was brought home to the American people with the announcement that U.S. casualties in Korea numbered 26,701.

The latest tabulation included 3,683 killed in action, 18,682 wounded and 4,337 missing in action.

The official figure on total deaths was 4,125. In addition to those killed in action, it included 442 who died of wounds and listed as missing those whose capture by North Koreans and subsequent death was confirmed.

The army casualties totaled 23,140, the navy 252, the marine corps 3,133 and the air force 176.

TITO: Without Conditions

Most Americans have no illusions about Premier Tito of Yugoslavia. He is a Communist who has fallen into disgrace with Russia and the Cominform countries.

However, millions of his people face starvation because of a drought in Yugoslavia. When he asked for American aid, we gave it to him.

Americans who had expected nothing in return were surprised when Tito made a speech that praised the United States and provided the best propaganda the West has had in years in its battle against Russia and her satellites.

Tito declared that as a result of talks with U. S. officials "it will be possible to get all we need: Wheat and sugar, that, and other goods in order to feed whole districts which are damaged thoroughly by the drought."

Then he added, "I can here openly say that the American government did not impose any conditions."

As if that wasn't enough, he added a punch line, "I think—and I told this to their people when they asked me what I thought—that it is useful for the American government to show in practice that it is ready to help other people rather than issuing propaganda as some other countries do."

That was in indirect attack upon the Cominform countries.

PHILIPPINES: Danger of Collapse

Americans who still consider the Philippines this country's little brother, were startled by the report of Daniel W. Bell's mission on conditions in that republic.

In his forthright report, Bell said the Quirino government was in such a critical situation that only the most far-reaching program of reforms and self-help, supported by technical and economic assistance from this country, could save the Philippines from total collapse.

As a result, the United States offered the Philippine republic up to \$250,000,000 in closely supervised loans and grants over a period of five years on conditions which included:

1. The whole agricultural economy of the islands be overhauled.
2. The economy of the country should be diversified by the introduction of new industries.
3. Non-essential and dollar-consuming imports should be discouraged through the imposition of a surcharge.

Reforms should include "programs for improved health, urban housing, education, and land reform."

The administration should be required to "insure honesty and efficiency."

Bell's report was attacked by some members of the Philippine government, but most observers agreed the terms of the proposed loans would be met by Quirino.

RELIGION: Pope Proclaims Dogma

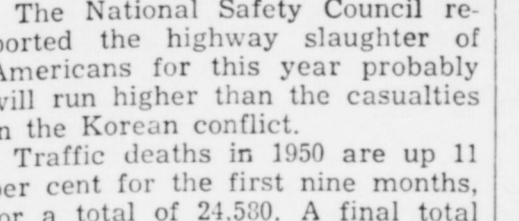
In the most spectacular and important ceremony of the 1950 Holy Year, Pope Pius XII proclaimed as Catholic dogma that the Virgin Mary was "assumed body and soul into the glory of Heaven."

The dogma was approved by 35 cardinals and more than 500 bishops from all parts of the world. It was the first in nearly 100 years to be proclaimed by a Pope.

Some Protestants, notably leaders of the Church of England, have protested that the pronouncement of the bodily assumption of Mary would be another impediment to Christian unity.

More than eight million lay Catholics had added their pleas in the past to those of thousands of clerics for pronouncement of the dogma, it was reported.

AEC Chief



Atomic energy commission chairman Gordon Dean told newsmen during a press conference that "you may be sure we are stronger than Russia" and that our A-bomb stockpile is "much better off today than a year ago." Dean added, however, that "ten or five or one atomic bomb is too many for an unfriendly nation to have."

TRAFFIC DEATHS: At Postwar High

The National Safety Council reported the highway slaughter of Americans for this year probably will run higher than the casualties in the Korean conflict.

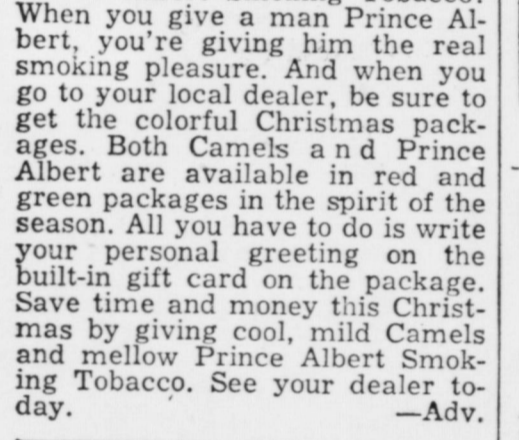

Guard Against Colds

AUSTIN, Texas.—Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, estimates that there are 500 million colds a year in the U. S. A. and they take an economic toll of two million dollars. This does not take into consideration the inconvenience suffered, or the fact that following or during a cold, other serious illness such as pneumonia, tuberculosis or mastoiditis gain a foothold. And the common cold is only one of the many winter enemies that encounters everyone from the crib to the coffin; some of the others are influenza, bronchitis, ear infections, sinusitis, and pneumonia. These are all respiratory diseases and they are caused by many different germs. Some of these germs are called bacteria, and some are called viruses.

Just because you have had a cold is no reason you won't catch another. Two out of three people have three colds a year, and two of eight people have four colds a year. Wet feet, drafts, chilling, exposure to bad weather, etc., do not cause your cold but they do weaken the body's resistance to a cold. So we say that there are favorable conditions for germs, one is the strength and number of the germs, and the other is body resistance which includes undernourishment, fatigue, irritation of the nose and throat by airborne substances, or chilling of the body.

The best way to avoid catching cold is to:

1. Avoid people with colds as much as possible.
2. Beware of fatigue, avoid work, get plenty of exercise moderately.
3. Keep feet warm and dry.
4. Keep out of drafts.
5. Eat a well balanced diet.

If you have a cold, help yourself and others by staying home, eating light foods and calling your doctor if necessary.
