# Two Texas Clinics Get Cancer Support

HOUSTON, (Special) - Two Texas medical clinics have just received financial support from the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, Dr. G. V. Brindley of Temple, chairman of the Division's executive committee, has announced.

One of the recipients of Texas Cancer Crusade funds is a newly established tumor clinic at Waco. Organized by the Mc-Lennan County Medical Society, the clinic will serve cancer patients of several central Texas counties. In addition to \$3,000 in American Cancer Society aid, the clinic is receiving support from the Junior League of Waco.

The League is assisting financially during the first year's operation and is supplying volunteer workers to the McLennan center in Downtown Waco.

The Waco clinic brings the total of full and part-time tumor clinics in the state to 28. Texas Cancer Crusade funds aid 12 of these clinics.

Cancer Crusade funds went to service at Hermann Hospital in Houston. The funds, amounting to \$1,200, will help finance the cost of a part-time "follow-up" worker, who will compile records of all surgical cancer cases who have been treated at the hospital and will bring case histories of cancer patients up to date in an effort to encourage postoperative checkups and treatments if necessary, for these patients. The "follow-up" work-

er's activities will also help to acquire valuable statistical research data, which are proving a valuable source of cancer clues for scientists.

## OUR WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

By Congressman O. C. Fisher BERLIN. - It's nearly 300 miles from Frankfort to Berlin, an outpost 120 miles inside the iron curtain. Along the route can be seen some evidence of Russian military activity. Directly in the center of the air corridor is a jet air field. At another point, the Reds are busy building a new runway, presumably for use by fighter

Berlin, which before the war had 4.3 million people now has about a million less. About 40% of the city was totally destroyed by bombs, including every factory. At present, there are less than 300,000 unemployed here and that number is being steadily reduced as more public works and reconstruction is attempted.

The Soviet-occupied zone, which takes in about a third of the city, is a shambles, and there has been very little re-building going on. Berlin people pass freely into the Soviet sector. There are no guards and ordinlong as the visitor does not go A-You may claim your wife, their loved ones clean and green. arily no questions are asked as beyond the city limits.

But the difference in the two argas is amazing. In the Russian zone, there is much less work going on, the shops are poorly stocked and the people actually look more haggard and distressed. On that side everything is rationed except what is bought in H-O stores. These stores are government operated and the prices are much higher. They are actually government-sponsored black markets.

The schools in the East sector are government-dominated. Every text book must be approved by the Russians. The Reds are making a terrific drive to enlist young people in the Comunist Youth organizations. And they are making some pro-

When the Russians sponsored the youth "invasion" of the Western zones a while back, they actually transported a half million German youths from all parts of the East into their section of Berlin. But the big march fizzled, thanks to the German police force recruited to meet the threat.

A huge industrial exhibit sponsored by the Berlin Germans and ECA is to take place soon. It will include manufactured products from over Germany and nearby countries. An estimated 300,000 will attend. The Russians don't like this.

One thing we have noted is that not very many people notice any sort of a sign. Some seem as if they can read, others do not take the trouble to read on the assumption it tells them to "stay off the grass." ### Casserole Cookery Helps Cut Down Soaring Food Bills

WHEN THE FOOD budget evades all your efforts to keep within its necessary limits, then it's time to start fixing those nourishing, appetite-satisfying casseroles. There's

PROTEIN-RICH eggs and milk extend less than a pound of ham in this tasty casserole dish:

\*Deviled Ham Puff (Serves 6) 8 slices, day-old white bread


- 34 pound cooked ham, ground 3 tablespoons prepared mustard
- 1 tablespoon horseradish, if desired.
- 4 eggs, slightly beaten
- 2 cups milk 1/2 teaspoon salt Pepper to taste

Spread bread out and let stand several hours to dry out; then toast lightly. Cut crusts from the slices and place crusts in a greased, shallow pan, 9x9x11/2 inches. Combine ham, mustard and horseradish and spread in an even layer over the crusts, then arrange the whole slices, cut in half diagonally, on the top. Mix the eggs, milk, salt and pepper and pour slowly over the bread so as to saturate the top slices; allow to stand for one hour. Bake in a moderate (350°) oven for one hour. Serve

- (Serves 6) 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup chopped celery 1/4 pound dried beef, shredded
- 1/4 cup fat 4 tablespoons flour
- 2 cups milk 2 cups cooked macaroni
- 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup cooked peas 1/3 cup grated American cheese



## Stimulating Idea

Seth Myers, of Pennsylvania, has come up with a challenging idea for American sportsmen and one which may have considerably more merit than first appears. Seth

"The state of Pennsylvania, or any other state where good hunting is enjoyed, has within its boundaries, many thousands of expert marksmen. They are mostly, self trained hunters, having received little or no special training in the handling of firearms. They are, however, fast and sure in their shooting because both qualifications are necessary in bringing down the fleet footed animals they hunt.

"In America, there are perhaps, 20 million of these men. The majority are older than those taken into the armed services to fight the wars but not too old to serve in good stead on the home front. They could deal severe punishment to a possible parachuted enemy in this coun-

"During World War I there was the John M. Phillips Shotgun Brigade with the hunters organized and trained for action against sabotage.

"When World War II came, the hunters were enlisted in a sepcial auxiliary known as Minutemen. They were carefully selected to make certain that fifth column members did not sneak in. They were given special training which qualified them to meet any emergency that would develop.

"Armed with their own pet guns and able to do expert shooting they would have dished out severe punishment to the enemy bent on sabotage. With the knowledge of sign reading in the forest, extremely little activity could go on without being discovered in time to prevent

"Should a World War III come, it is far more likely the enemy will be here in great numbers. We have reason to believe they are already in our midst. They may be in much greater numbers than we suspect.

"We must be ready to take care of them when the time comes. It is not too early to start organizing to meet this unseen enemy. Every state should organize its expert outdoorsmen into a dependable war time home front guard. There are many leaders who are well qualified to do it.

"The important key to the whole plan would be to make sure that all hands were true Americans, and knew exactly what to do with those who proved to be enemies. If every true American hunter and farmer will do this, we need not worry about the slinking enemy we know is already in our home ranks, working day and night to ruin our form of government."

# **WAKE ISLAND:**

Talks Lack Something

On the hot, lonely little island of Wake in mid-Pacific, President Harry S. Truman and Gen. Douglas MacArthur, two men who have had much to do with world destiny in the last few years, had a talk.

After it was over a statement was issued which said the two discussed a number of subjects vital to world problems. According to the press release they talked about from Britain, the United States reconstruction of Korea, the possiand Canada," Winston Churchill reconstruction of Korea, the possibility of a Japanese peace treaty, and the general agreement to strive toward peace in unity with other U.N. nations.

The meeting was of great interest to the American public from another angle. MacArthur and Mr. Truman had never met and their conflicting views on a number of sublects had been reported in the press during recent months.

Reports of the meeting indicated that MacArthur had only a general idea of the topics to be discussed when he was asked to meet the President. It was also reported that Truman conducted the talks from an agenda scribbled on a pad.

Observers believed these reports gave an indication of the how and why of the meeting. The President had a number of topics to discuss with the U.N. commander and he limited the talks to that agenda. It was also suggestive, some observers believed, that Mr. Truman was acting in his capacity as President and commander-in-chief and not as a man seeking advice.

On the surface the meeting was cordial. In farewell, MacArthur said: "Good-by, sir. Happy landing. It has been a real honor to talk

with you." But the other MacArthur seemed revealed when he said good-by to Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff: "Goodby, Omar. Don't let them get you

Duty to Vote

**ELECTION:** 

As the date of the national election nears, the American Heritage Foundation, the non-profit citizens' group that sponsored the Freedom Train, stepped up its campaign of turning out a large vote.

The foundation is sponsor of the contest in which prizes of historical papers are being awarded to communities, counties, and civic organizations doing the best job in turning out the vote.

The campaign was designed to combat widespread voter lethargy which in the presidential election of 1948 saw more than 45,000,000 of America's voting population fail to go to the polls.

Two years ago, only 52 per cent of the voters took the trouble to cast their ballots, a poor record when contrasted with other countries. In the last national elections held in Sweden, 82 per cent of the voting population went to the polls. The turnout in France and Italy exceeded 80 per cent. In Great Britain it was 76 per cent and in Canada, 74 per cent.

Thomas D'Arcy Brophy, foundation president, said in launching the contest: "In this year of crisis it is more necessary than ever before that every citizen of voting age vote. A large turnout at the polls is the most effective answer free citizens can hurl at those who would enslave

Soon after election day a threeman board of judges will start reviewing the efforts of various communities and organizations in raising the voting levels in their regions. The judges are Lt. Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, director of the central intelligence agency; Charles E. Wilson, president of General Electric company, and William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor.

In 1948, Utah had the best voting record with 74.6 per cent going to the polls.

# SECURITY ACT:

Confusion in Europe

The new U. S. internal security act threw Europe into a state of confusion that bordered on the fantastic. Hundreds of businessmen, artists, and tourists scheduled to sail for America suddenly found themselves without permits to enter this country as a result of the state department's order that all visas be canceled.

The order required all visas be revalidated and hundreds of travelers, thousands of miles from home, were told they would have to return to their native lands to secure new

# MOBILIZATION:

A Fight for Survival

A new cry for an all-out effort in the fight for survival was made by W. Stuart Symington, economic mobilizer. He called for higher taxes, stiffer curbs on credit and longer working hours.

He reported his agency is now getting organized for such price and wage action as may be needed, but hastened to add he believed it might be possible to avoid general pricewage controls in the immediate future "if we could get over the psychology of scarce buying."

Many observers believed that Symington was making a desperate appeal in an effort to head off furth-

er curbs. Symington said: "We must have strong credit controls to cut down civilian buying . . . We must have much higher taxes, on a 'pay-asyou-go' basis, to keep purchasing power down to a level of available civilian goods."

To cope with Russia's superiority in man power, he suggested: 1. A "great step-up" in American production.

2. Return of older workers and women into the labor force. 3. Restoration of work hours, "at least part way" to the levels that prevailed during World War II.

# PARCEL-POST:

Rate Increase Asked

Invoking a little-used statute, Postmaster-General Donaldson has asked the interstate commerce commission for an increase in parcel-post rates amounting to \$105,-000.000 a year.

The proposed increase would up mailing charges for the first pound from four to nine cents, depending on postal zone. Additional poundage would be increased up to three cents

### Nobody Produces Any Toys, Plaint of Soviet Mothers

WASHINGTON - Government officials report that mothers in the Baku area of the Soviet Union are complaining that government run cooperatives have "completely forgotten about the manufacture of toys for children."

One co-op tried to manufacture dolls but mothers rejected them as "monstrosities." The complaints were published in a Soviet publication, The Baku Worker.






