

# **Texas Cotton Acreage Expected to Drop in '15**

By Mary Jane Buerkle As the 2014 High Plains cotton crop draws closer to completion, conversations now revolve around prospective plantings for 2015 and how producers across the Cotton Belt plan to address current conditions.

Results from the National Cotton Council's Planting In-tentions Survey suggested that producers in the United States will plant about 9.2 million acres of upland cotton in 2015, down 15.2 percent from 2014. The largest decreases were in the West, primarily in Arizona and California.

Texas growers, according to the NCC survey, could plant about 5.34 million acres of upland cotton in 2015, down 13.8 percent from 2014 and the least since 2009. The acres shifting from cotton in West Texas are split between wheat, corn, and grain sorghum, the NCC reported.

Although it is likely that less High Plains acres will go into cotton this year, that doesn't necessarily mean less production, especially if Mother Nature plays nice. Growers report excellent soil moisture in some areas, with a few saying they're in the best shape they've been in, at this point, in the last several years. How-

Producers also are closely watching the cotton market, which has been on a slight uptick in the past several days. 

Even though our offense skills weren't as sharp as


on defense allowed us to play Grady within two points at half and within point for three quarters of play.







The docket number and style of this application are Docket No. 44361, Sharyland Utilities, L.P.'s Request for Approval of an Advanced Metering System (AMS) Deployment, AMS Surcharge, and Non-Standard Metering Service Fees.

Sharyland is seeking approval from the Commission for its AMS deployment plan pursuant to P.U.C. SUBST. R. 25.130 and the Commission's order in Application of Sharyland Utilities, L.P. to Establish Retail Delivery Rates, Approve Tariff for Retail Delivery Service, and Adjust Wholesale Transmission Rate, Docket No. 41474 (Jan. 23, 2014). Sharyland is also seeking approval of non-standard metering fees pursuant to P.U.C. SUBST. R. 25.133. Sharyland also requests approval of the AMS surcharges for recovery of the reasonable and necessary costs which Sharyland will incur under its deployment plan pursuant to P.U.C. SUBST. R. 25.130(k).

If approved, Sharyland's AMS surcharges will go into effect on July 1, 2015. The AMS surcharges will apply to electric service to residential customers and nonresidential customers, other than those who have interval data recorder (IDR) meters or take unmetered service. The AMS surcharges will be billed to the retail electric providers (REPs) providing retail electric service to such customers in Sharyland's service areas. The costs recovered through the AMS surcharges will be reviewed by the Commission in a reconciliation proceeding to be held in the future on a schedule to be determined by the Commission. ### Storming the Beach at Normandy

was drafted into the Army in 1943 when he was eighteen. "I never had it so good. I was paid fifty dollars a month. Before I came in I was paid a dollar a day." He became a combat engineer. "Our unit was composed of farm boys who already knew how to string barbed wire, fire every type of rifle and drive every type of vehicle."

He received amphibious training on the coast of England in preparation for the invasion of France at Normandy. "They told us that half of us would be casualties. I looked at the guy next to me and thought that one of us was going to be gone."

He was trained in mines and demolition. At Omaha Beach on June sixth, 1944, his specific job was to clear a path for the twenty-ninth infantry division. "We started off with a mine detector but we had to discard all of that coming in because of the waves and high water. When our squad got ready to go off the landing craft, I was the first one to go down the ramp and as soon as I was off, the ramp blew up."

Getting off the landing craft was dangerous. "We were out quite a ways from shore. When we left the landing craft we were in over five feet of water and the waves were four feet high. They would throw you up and down, up and down. Of course we had to fight the enemy to get in, even though we were soaked, carrying a heavy pack and our weapons.

"We wore a life preserver belt high under our arms. When you would give it a squeeze it would inflate. So love life. Contact him at many of the infantry guys ts@tumbleweedsmith.com

George Hangar of Killeen didn't have amphibious training and their belt was around their waists. When they in-flated the life preserver while they were in the water, six or seven feet deep with high waves, it would flip them upside down because they had all this weight on their shoulders. I saw two infantry guys in the waves with their legs sticking out of the water and their heads under water." He says it is extremely important to give invading troops amphibious training.

Once on the beach, they found a wall of barbed wire in front of them and machine gun fire coming from the Germans. They were pinned down for an hour or so. When the machine gun fire stopped for a moment, a Lieutenant from the infantry unit stood up and was immediately shot in the head and killed. "A half-track vehicle trying to reach the beach got stalled and our squad leader went over to it and called us over there. It had machine guns on it and me and another guy took a machine gun and continuously fired it while two other guys took explosives and blew an opening in the barbed wire so the infantry could move through. We used our bayonets to clear the mines."

George can still wear his uniform and got it out to show me. I took a picture of him holding it. He stays in shape by taking six-mile walks. He has been on six hundred of them. "I'm trying to bankrupt Social Security," says George.
