### *Noisy TV Commercials*

I thought it might be just on my television, but everywhere I go I see it: the explosion of commercials featuring people yelling at the top of their lungs. Do they think the audience is deaf? And when you mix yelling with the increasing WPS (words per second) the spot, in my humble opinion, loses its effectiveness.

When I taught advertising I urged my students to talk into the microphone like they were talking to their boyfriend or girlfriend during a romantic time together. In other words, a low voice with feeling. I suggested the two and half WPS (words per second) speed. That would produce some 75

words in a 30-second commercial. Plenty. Some half a minute commercials have more than 120 words.

Ads for automobiles are first rate. They are well written and well produced. The audience immediately gets emotionally involved and wants to watch the commercial to its conclusion. The music matches the words and pictures. Most of the award-winning ads have less than 90 words. They do not sound like an announcer at a horse race.

Some ads for car dealers, on the other hand, are mindless, senseless pieces of video trash

The Borden Blue squad jumped out to a 16-0 first quarter lead. Cam Edwards scored eight points in the quarter. Borden increased their lead 26-4 at the half. Cam Edwards added four more points in the quarter as did Will Yarbro. The Coyotes had another big quarter outscoring the Hornets 14-0 in the third. Trey Edwards hit a couple of three point goals and a two bucket scoring eight points in the quarter. Mason Cole hit a shot from behind the arc to win the fourth period, 3-0.

Cam Edwards led all scorers with 12 points followed by Trey Edwards with eight points. Will Yarbro and Keigan Benavidez added six points while Mason Cole contributed five points. Tommy

Kingston finished with four points and Trent Lewis with two points. Borden Blue is 1-0 on the season.

Miles Wilson helped the Borden Red squad jump to a 4-2 first quarter lead scoring both the field goals. In the second period, Wilson added four more points as did Latham Huckaby. Jason Robinson nailed a three point shot and J.R. Partney made a paint shot. The Coyotes outscored Highland "B" team 13-2 giving the Coyotes a 17-2 halftime lead. built up inside of the Coyote players and they came out with a chip on their shoulder. Borden County kicked the ball off to start this contest and the tone for the evening seemed to be set on the opening kick-off as the Coyotes swarmed the Patriot kick returner and tackled him inside the 20 yard line. The significance of this is that the Patriots average a kick return a game. On this particular night, the best starting position for the Patriots would be the one time the ball was kicked out of bounds and they started at the 30 yard line.

So, after starting inside the 20 yard line, the Coyotes would force a 4 and out as their defense stuffed the Patriots on a 4<sup>th</sup> and 1 play. The Coyotes would show their quick scoring ability as they scored in three plays with Corbin Sumners sprinted 9 yards behind some nice blocks by Braxton Coor, Diego Bernal, Korbin Martinez, Trace Richey and Hunter Jones. Easton Edwards split the uprights with the first of his 9 consecutive kicks on his perfect night to make the score 8 to 0. Nathan Souder snaps for the extra point and Morgan Wilson holds.

The Patriots would answer, but Ben Justice would block the extra point and the Coyotes would maintain the lead at 8 to 6. Borden County quickly answered the score as Sumners sprinted untouched 66 yards to pay dirt and with the kick they had an all important two score lead at 16 to 6. The Coyote defense of Martinez, Jones, Sumners, Pennell, Justice and Jayton Lewis again forced a turnover on downs. On the next Borden offensive possession the Coyotes committed the first of their two turnovers which would be the only times during the game that they would not score. This possession ended with an interception and

the Patriots made the Coyotes pay cutting the lead to 16 to 12. The visiting team would answer as this time Trace Richey found the endzone as he bulled his way in from 20 yards out and again with the Edwards kick, the Coyotes found themselves up 24 to 12. The Borden County defense would again stiffen and force the ball over on downs as Martinez broke a pass up to thwart a scoring opportunity for the Patriots. Moments later, they extended their lead to 32 to 12 as Richey sprinted his way toward a 60 yard touchdown. The Coyotes would now have to do something they haven't done in the previous four meetings with the Valley Patriots as they have managed to score in the final minutes of the last four meetings. This time, the Patriots got close but as Trace Richey tackled the Patriot receiver at the 2 yard line the Coyotes would finally get that stop to end a half and gave the Coyotes a 32 to 12 lead and the ball to start the second half.

The boys wasted no time in extending their lead as Sumners raced 60 yards on the first play from scrimmage to extend the lead to 40 to 12. The Patriots would not go away though as they answered to cut the lead to 40 to 18, but could not convert the point after as Nathan Souder blocked the point after. The Coyotes would

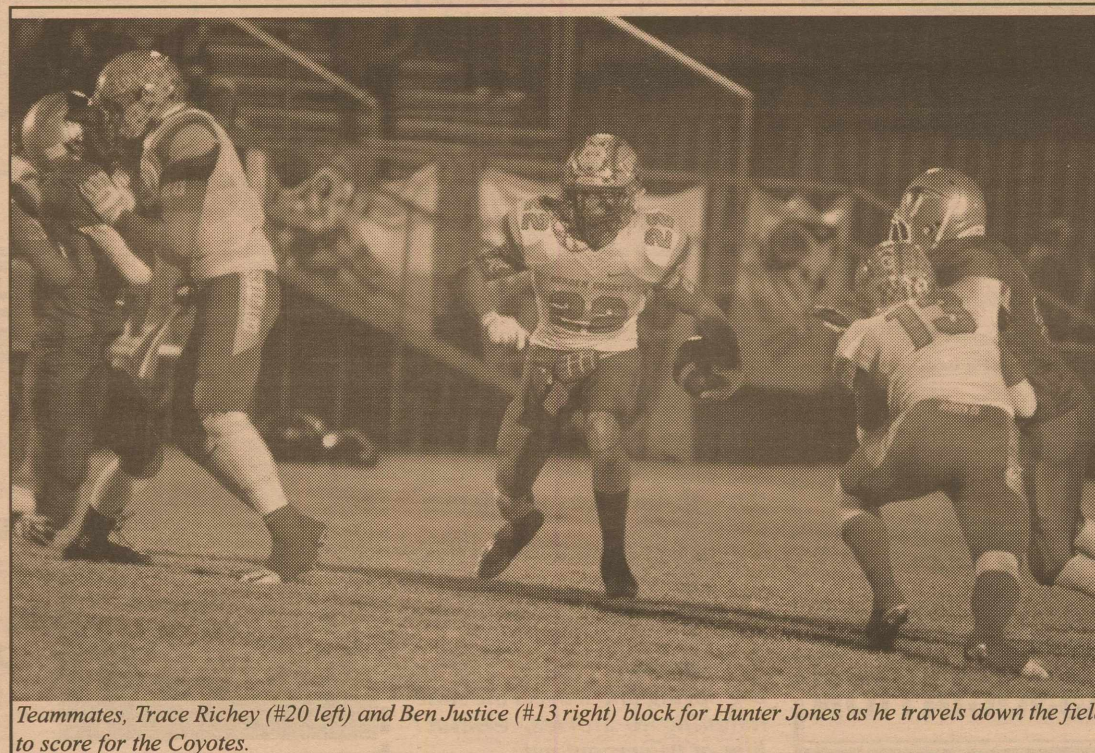
again answer quickly this time through the air as Trace Richey found Ben Justice in the corner of the endzone for Ben's first varsity football touchdown of the season to give them a 46 to 18 lead. Edwards would again hit the point after kick to push the lead to 48 to 18. The Patriots managed to answer again as a couple of penalties allowed the Patriots to keep their drive alive and eventually end up in the endzone to cut the lead to 48 to 25. The Coyotes would

answer again through the air as Hunter Jones would connect with Corbin Sumners and with the extra point kick the Coyotes extended their lead to 56 to 25. After the Borden defense got a stop Corbin Sumners got lose again from 57 yards out to extend the lead to 64 to 25. The defense got another defensive stop, but this time they couldn't do anything with the ball and turned the ball over with a fumble. With

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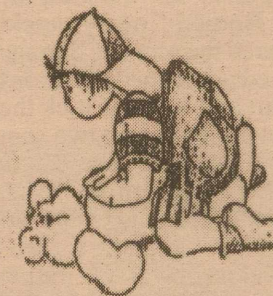

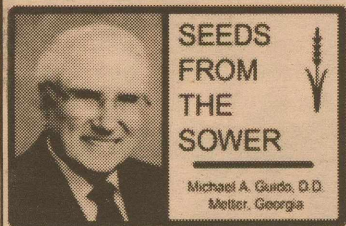
# Tahoka Annual Christmas Craft Show December 5th

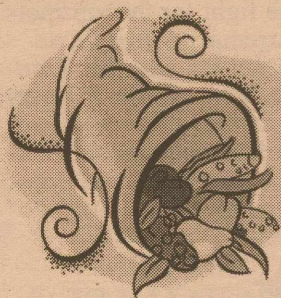

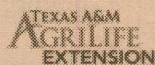

- An optional community service opportunity is to bring a pair of pajamas for the Buckner's Children's Home (size newborn to age 18).

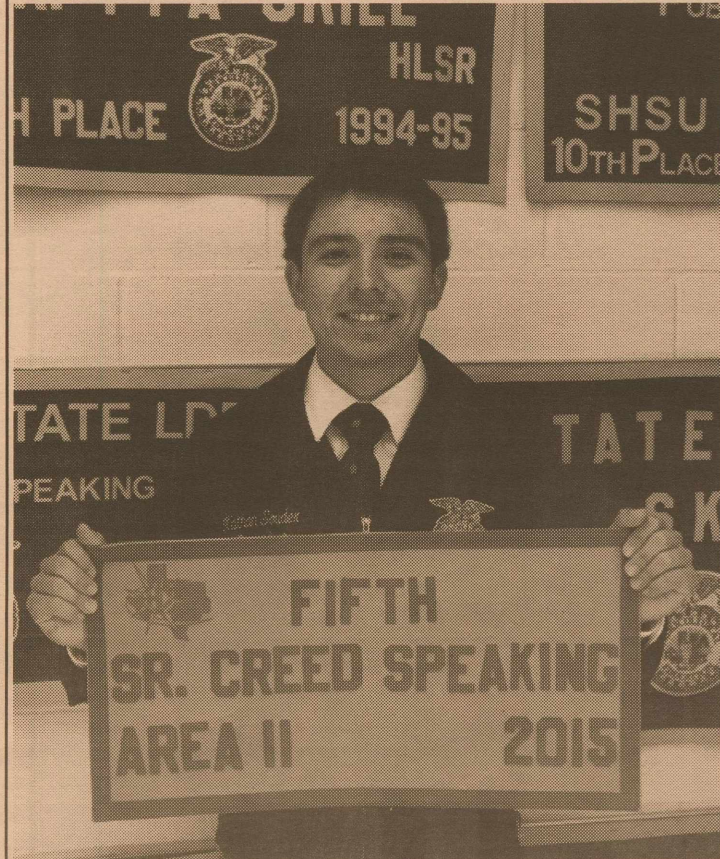

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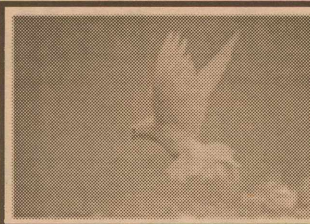
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## Dare to Live Without Limits

### All the Ingredients

There are a variety of similarities between life and cooking. In order to create a meal you must go through a number of steps. The first one is deciding what you want to make. The ingredients then have to be combined in the proper amounts. If you change the proportions for any reason, your meal will be different than you expected. This is not to say you can't experiment or create your own unique dish. You just need to be aware that

whenever you change what you put in you impact what you get out.

In life, you have to take the appropriate steps to accomplish your desired goals. You can't skip a step. Change the steps and you will change the outcome.

So you have all of the ingredients combined and put into a pot on the stove. What's next? You have to turn on the burner. Without taking this action, your meal will never cook. Even with the best intentions and a positive attitude, nothing will happen without heat under your pot.

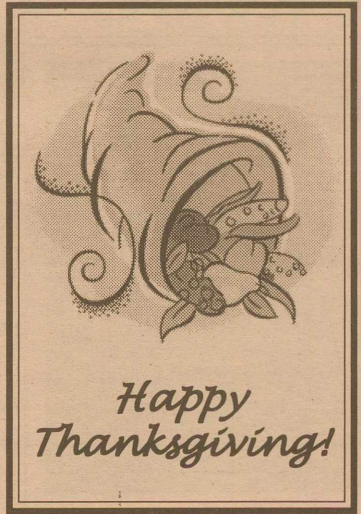
Reaching your goals also takes action. You will never attain your goals without effort. Knowing what steps to take is not enough. You must take the first step.

The final phase is to allow the food to cook for enough time. You can't speed up the process by turning up the heat. All you will do is burn your meal and it will be just as inedible as when it is undercooked.

Attaining your goals also takes time. One reason people fail to reach their goals is because they don't allow enough time to complete all the steps. Their impatience leads them to erroneously conclude that they have failed. Another cause of failure is burnout. This occurs when people don't pace themselves and don't take breaks to recharge.

Analogies can be very helpful in understanding concepts and relationships. It's easy to lose track of where you are or why certain things need to be done. Use this cooking example to stay on your path to attain all of the things you want in life.

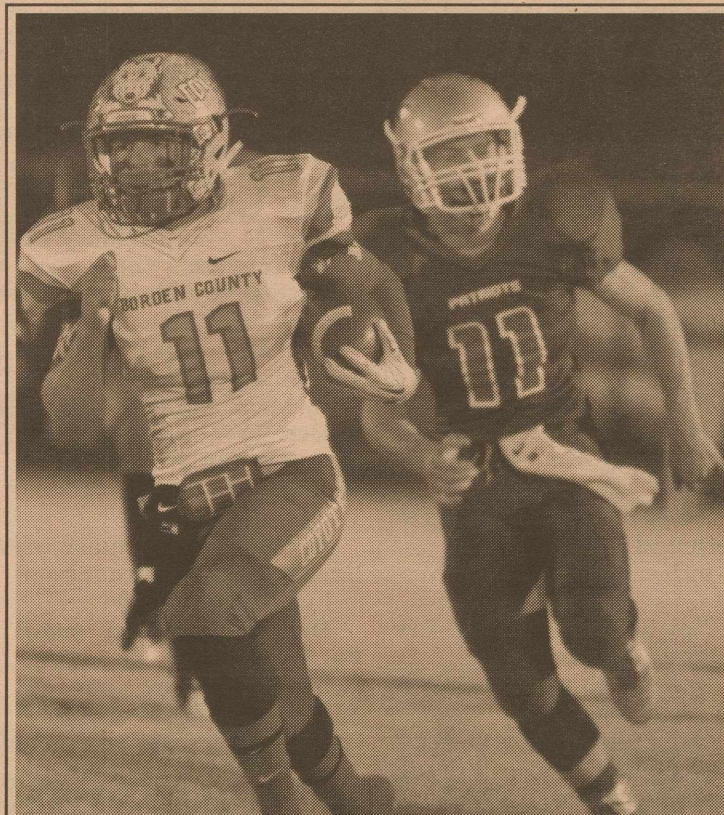
Leading the way for the
