The challenges and opportunities for agriculture and rural America are changing. In 2015, American farmers persevered in the face of drought and an unprecedented animal disease outbreak. Demographics are also changing in rural America and across farm households. Meanwhile, tech-nology is rapidly opening new applications for producers and throughout the marketing chain, and new markets are emerging for U.S. agricultural

Herb Cavness of Brady was a teenager when he entered World War Two in 1943. He was a waist gunner on a B-17 and flew 25 missions in Europe with the 8th Air Force.

"We were stationed in En-gland and flew out of there," he says. "Our missions were

Targets included Dresden, Frankfurt, Bremen, Hamburg, Dortmund, Hanover, Nuremburg and 14 other places. His squadron lost 13 planes. He had to make two emergency landings but was not hurt. His plane had a young crew. "My pilot was just two months older than me. It was in the B-29 and go to the Pa-cific and join the fighting there. "But they gave us 30 days leave and while I was at home

Happy Frowns as Borden Coyotes Win Regional Quarterfinal Championship

If these Borden County Coyotes have not proven themselves as being tough enough to beat on high school football's customary Friday nights, now Coach Trey Richey's troops have proved they also are not bad when it comes to Monday night football, as well.

Richey's Borden County Coyotes and the Happy Cowboys flip flopped places at the top of last week's Division state six-man poll, with the Coyotes being promoted to the top of the pack and the Cow-boys slipping a notch to sec-ond after holding down that top spot a majority of this 2015 season. If Monday's D I state quarterfinal playoff game at Frenship High School's People State Bank Stadium had anything to do with it that was the right move.

The No. 1 state-ranked Covotes took another big step closer to bringing home a fourth state six-man championship back to Gail after blow-ing out those Cowboys, 64-22, at Wolforth.

It was the fewest amount of points that these normally high-powered Cowboys have put up all year. Before Mon-day, Happy had been averag-ing around 60 points per game.

This state quarterfinal play-off game originally was set for last Saturday night at Wolfforth, but was postponed until Monday after last weekend's inclement weather conditions.

These Coyotes had to overcome somewhat of a sluggish start before celebrating their 13th straight win of this season. These Coyotes, who have not even punted this season, spot-ted the 12-1 Cowboys the first 14 points before the Gail Gang even got its initial first down.

"We had to be a little worried at first, especially with the way this one started out, but one thing we're never worried about is how these guys are ing somebody that second time going to compete," Coach in a season and right now these

After giving up nearly 180 yards in a sluggish first quar-ter start, the Coyotes held Happy to just over 120 yards in the final three quarters combined. After finding them-selves down 14-0 late in the first quarter, the Coyotes outscored the Cowboys, 64-8, in the final 36 minutes and 59 seconds on Monday at Wolfforth.

"What makes our kids so amazing to watch is just how they just always keep on bat-tling," Richey said. "They proved that again tonight in the way that they keep on work-ing to make good things hap-

Now, Richey's Coyotes hope that those good times continue to roll at 6 p.m. this Saturday at Abilene's Shotwell Stadium when they take on 9-3 Crowell. Crowell, the two-time defending D I state sixman champs, won Monday's other D I state quarterfinal match up over Garden City, 94-86, at McMurry University.

The winner of this Saturday night's game returns to Shotwell on the 12th of this month in the D I state title bout where they will take on the winner of this Friday's game at Hico between 11-2 Abbott and 11-2 Zephyr.

The Coyotes already have beaten these Crowell Wildcats once this season back in their Aug. 28 opener when Borden County kicked off its season with a 58-48 win over Crowell as part of Jayton's annual Kickoff Classic

"As excited as everybody is out here right now, we can't help but also be a little nervous-it's always tough beat-

Richey said. "We just kept tell- guys are as healthy as they've been all season long. Plus, these guys are the defending champs until somebody proves otherwise," Richey said of this re-match.

After failing to Happy, 37-22, and then Calvert, 37-34, on back-to-back weekends I the middle of this season, Crowell rallied back to win seven straight by an average of nearly 42 points per game. The Wildcats' Justin Hayes threw for 423 yards and seven touchdowns to lead Crowell's attack on Monday against Garden City. Crowell's Daniel Clark ran for 177 yards and four TD's on Monday night.


"They just always play such great defense but, more than anything, these guys just know how to win," Richey said of the Wildcats, who rolled past May, 78-52, in the 2013 D I title game and then May, 62-16, in last year's state championship game

"Really that last game against them doesn't mean anything anymore. Everything comes down to this one. The winner of this next one goes on to next weekend's title games, while the loser will get those (state) bronze medals on their way back home again.


After putting up 154 points on the scoreboard in its first two playoff games, the Coyotes did not find pay dirt until 2:09 left in the opening stanza when junior running back Corbin Sumners scored the first of his seven touchdowns on Monday night from 43 yards out. Easton Edwards then kicked the first of his eight PAT kicks to cut Happy's lead to 14-8. BC did not take its first lead until on the final play of the first quarter when Sumners broke loose on a 47-yard sprint to the end zone. Edwards kicked the PAT to give the Covotes their first lead at 16-14.

The Coyotes made this a 22-14 game with 5:44 left in the



first quarter after Trace Richey powered his way into the end zone from a yard out. Edwards also tacked on the PAT kick.

Happy scored what turned out being its final TD of this 2015 season with 4:36 left in the second quarter on a 44yards run. The Cowboys kicked that PAT, closing the gap to 24-22.

BC took a 32-22 halftime lead after scoring its third TD of the second quarter on an 18yard run by Sumners with only37 seconds left in the second quarter. Edwards' PAT kick gave the Coyotes their 10point halftime edge.

Sumners scored two more touchdowns in the third quarter from 22 and 14 yards out. Two more Edwards' PAT kicks put the Coyotes ahead 48-22

Sumners scored his sixth TD of this game with 9:01 left in the fourth quarter on an 18yard run. Another Edwards' PAT kick extended the Coyotes' lead to 56-22.

Sumners scored his seventh TD of this game with 8:20 left on a 24-yard run. Edwards' eighth PAT kick made this final 64-22. BC's Jayton Lewis picked off a Cowboy pass to set up the Coyotes' final TD play.

play. By rolling up 324 yards and seven touchdowns on Monday night, BC's Sumners now has surpassed the coveted 2,000yard rushing barrier for the third straight season. After Monday's explosion, Sumners now has rolled up 2,323 yards this fall.

"Corbin's a great runner, but he'd be the first to brag about how far our lines came this year," Richey said.

Sophomore Trace Richey ran for 20 yards and one TD. Junior Hunter Jones ran for 37 yards on two carries, while

sophomore Brian Torres ran for 22 yards on nine rushes. The Coyotes ran for all 417


