# BHS Qualifies 28 Individuals, Six Teams to UIL Regionals 

## To be held at Angelo State University

Riding the new blood of a strong freshmen class along with some returning veterans in the literary arena, Borden High School dominated last week's District 12-A Literary meet. BHS hosted the one-day meet for writing events, objective testing events, along with speech and debate.

Also factored in to the final team totals were points earned earlier from One-Act play and CX debate. Though an official event, Congress is still not tabulated towards team totals.

Students have two week now to prepare for their chance for the Holy Grail of UIL Academics, the State Meet scheduled for May 23-25 on the University of Texas Campus.

Out of the ten team events that advance to regionals, the Coyotes will be sending six first place finishes: Accounting, Calculator Applications, Current Issues and Events, Computer Science, Number Sense, and Social Studies. All four team members of these events will advance to regional.

BHS also won the overall Team Journalism title as well as the overall Speech and Debate category.

## Borden County Softball Making Historic Progress

The Borden County Softball squad has been taking some huge steps this season. These young ladies have stepped up to the plate (pun intended) and made sure that the softball world takes notice.

After an initial stint in the world of high school softball in 2005-2007 where the Lady Coyotes started out in an Outlaw schedule, which simply means that they were UIL recognized, but since the startup year came in between redistricting years, they were simply not put into a district until the following year. And what a district they received! The last year that the Lady Coyotes were in a district, they were put into a district with much larger schools with the likes of Seagraves, New Deal and Ralls. The girls fought but in two years were unable to come out with a single victory. Soon the support for softball waned and was cancelled after the 2006-07 season. Bats, gloves, nets, and uniforms were stored away for almost 10 years.

Flash forward to 2015. New faces breed new enthusiasm and support. News spread fast that Borden County would field a girls' softball team. After digging out the old uniforms and bats that were outdated, it was clear that this would indeed be an endeavor that would have to be taken on as a "from the ground up" venture. Equipment, uniforms, and other gear that didn't even exist the first go around was purchased. It was made clear that the program would not be a step-child sport. It would be taken as seriously as any other sport here at tradition-rich Borden County. One of the biggest changes or advances this time around would be that we would have our own field here on the campus of our school. It must be mentioned that in the beginning the girls that decided to come out for softball during the 2005-2007 season, had to practice on the football practice field with throw down bases and a portable backstop. "Home" games would be played in

Snyder at Cates Field. While Cates Field was a well-kept field it just was not home. Few fans that were not parents would show up, but now, the girls had a field to call their own. Enthusiasm began to spread. Initial meetings were called to get a "feel" of how many young ladies would be interested in playing. There were at least 3 such meetings called. The first meeting yielded a number of 15 with some "maybe's". The second meeting increased the number to 18 with some still "maybe's" teetering on the fence. The last meeting called garnered the true number of 24 young women who wanted to test the softball waters.

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## 4 Ways to Eat Your Way to Lower Cholesterol

Many people can reduce cholesterol levels simply by changing what they eat. For example, if you are a fan of cheeseburgers, eating less meat (and leaner cuts) and more vegetables, fruits, and whole grains can lower your total cholesterol by $25 \%$ or more. Cutting back on saturated fat (found in meat and dairy products) and trans fat (partially hydrogenated oils) can reduce cholesterol by $5 \%$ to $10 \%$.

Here are four steps for using your diet to lower your cholesterol.

Stick with unsaturated fats and avoid saturated and trans fats. Most vegetable fats (oils) are made up of unsaturated fats that are healthy for your heart. Foods that contain healthy fats include oily fish, nuts, seeds, and some vegetables. At the same time, limit your intake of foods high in saturated fat, which is found in many meat and dairy products, and stay away from trans fats. These include any foods made with "partially hydrogenated vegetable oils."

Get more soluble fiber. Eat more soluble fiber, such as that found in oatmeal and fruits. This type of fiber can lower blood cholesterol levels when eaten as part of a healthyfat diet.

Include plant sterols and stanols in your diet. These naturally occurring plant com-
pounds are similar in structure to cholesterol. When you eat them, they help limit the amount of cholesterol your body can absorb. Plant sterols and stanols are found in an increasing number of food products such as spreads, juices, and yogurts.

Find a diet that works for you. When a friend or relative tells you how much his or her cholesterol level dropped after trying a particular diet, you may be tempted to try it yourself. If you do, and after a few months you discover that you're not getting the same benefits, you may need to chalk it up to genetic and physiological differences. There is no one-size-fits-all diet for cholesterol control. You may need to try several approaches to find one that works for you.

Although diet can be a simple and powerful way to improve cholesterol levels, it plays a bigger role for some people than for others. Don't be discouraged if you have followed a diet but not reached your goal blood level. Keep it up. Even if you do end up needing medication to keep your cholesterol in check, you likely will need less than if you didn't make any dietary changes.

The Terry Scholarship Program was born of Howard and Nancy Terry's desire to help young people help themselves. Knowing that universities are more than buildings and classrooms, Howard Terry had repeatedly declined to allow the universities to honor his previous contributions by placing his name on campus structures: "Mortar and bricks will eventually be torn down," he reasoned. The Terrys believed, in the long term, that a university - like the state it represents - is only as good as the educated citizens it produces. Thus was born a desire to invest in the students who would attend the public colleges and universities in Texas.

The Terrys' desire to help young people was influenced greatly by Howard Terry's own college experience: he had attended the University of Texas on an athletic scholarship, becoming captain of the football team and graduating in 1938. His family origins in Cameron, Texas were modest and it was only through the generosity of others that his college educa-

Mr. Terry never forgot the
helping hand that he had rehelping hand that he had rewas determined to extend that was determined to a new generation of students.

After seeking counsel from sources that included former UT coach Darrell Royal (an original Foundation Board Member) and Houston attorney Rhett Campbell (Board Member since inception and now Board Chair), the Terrys determined that their most lasting contribution would be through a perpetual endowment that would provide college scholarships for students who had demonstrated the capacity to become outstanding future leaders and who needed financial assistance to achieve their goals in higher education. From this simple concept, the Terry Foundation was created in 1986 to be the source of a perpetual scholarship program. The first scholarship recipients, known since then as "Terry Scholars," were selected at interviews held in the spring of 1987
During the first seventeen years of the Foundation's history, Scholars attended only the University of Texas at Austin or Texas A\&M University. In the fall of 2004, the Foundation Scholarship Program expanded for the first time, when Terry Scholars were named at the University of Houston and at Texas State University-San Marcos. Two years later, additional growth provided scholarships in the fall of 2006 at the University of Texas at Dallas and the University of Texas at San Antonio. In 2010, the program was expanded to include the University of North Texas and in 2011, Texas Tech University. In 2013, Texas Woman's University was added to the family of Terry universities, followed by Texas A\&M at Galveston and Sam Houston State University in 2014 and

University of Texas at El Paso and University of Texas at Arlington in 2015.
