When TV Got To Big Lake

Update Lets Farmers and Ranchers Report Common Acreage Information Once

Farmers and ranchers filing crop acreage reports with the Farm Service Agency (FSA) and participating insurance providers approved by the Risk Management Agency (RMA) now can provide the common information from their acreage reports at one office and the information will be electronically shared with the other location.

This new process is part of the USDA Acreage Crop Reporting Streamlining Initiative (ACRSI). This interagency collaboration also includes participating private crop insurance agents and insurance companies, all working to streamline the information collected from farmers and ranchers who participate in USDA programs.

Once filing at one location, data that's important to both FSA and RMA will be securely and electronically shared with the other location avoiding redundant and duplicative reporting, as well as saving farmers and ranch-

been working to streamline the crop reporting process for agricultural producers, who have expressed concerns with providing the same basic common information for multiple locations. In 2013, USDA consolidated the deadlines to 15 dates for submitting these reports, down from the previous 54 dates at RMA and 17 dates for FSA. USDA representatives believe farmers and ranchers will experience a notable improvement in the coming weeks as they approach the peak season for crop reporting later this

More than 93 percent of all annual reported acres to FSA and RMA now are eligible for the common data reporting, and USDA is exploring adding more crops. Producers must still visit both locations to validate and sign acreage reports, complete maps or provide program-specific information. The common data from the first-filed acreage report will now be available to pre-populate and accelerate completion of the second report. Plans are underway at USDA to continue building Since 2009, USDA has upon the framework with

additional efficiencies at a future date.

Farmers and ranchers are also reminded that they can now access their FSA farm information from the convenience of their home computer. Producers can see field boundaries, images of the farm, conservation status, operator and owner information and much more.

The new customer selfservice portal, known as FSAFarm+, gives farmers and ranchers online access to securely view, print or export their personal farm data. To enroll in the online service, producers are encouraged to contact their local FSA office for details. To find a local FSA office in your area, visit http:// offices.usda.gov.

Coyotes Shine in Lone Star Cup

One of the first things that most people think of nowadays when they think of Borden County is its winning sports teams at Gail.

Why not? The success that the Coyotes have enjoyed on the six-man football field is hard to beat, including three state champion ships.

With most of last year's state semi-final team coming back, don't be surprised to see the Gail Gang kick off the 2016 season as one of the top-ranked Division I six-man football teams in the state.

The Coyotes have not been too bad on the hardwoods or baseball diamond, either.

Coach Bubba Edwards guided the Coyote hoopsters to their first regional tournament appearance in school history this past winter. They also have made it to the Class 2A state baseball playoffs in two of the past three seasons.

Borden County also has had its share of success on UIL academics as well, including last month when Nathan Souder was crowned the Lincoln Douglas Debate state champion. Souder also teamed up with Madi Cole to finish as the second place team in state speech.

It is not hard to see how the Coyotes would fare well in UIL's Lone Star Cup competition, where Borden County finished fifth among all of the state's Class IA high schools.

That UIL Lone Star Cup is awarded annually to one school in each of the six different classifications (IA-6A) based on their performance in district and state in both academics and athletics.

The Lone Star Cup ratings include marching band, tennis, cross country, volleyball, football, swimming and diving wrestling, basketball, soccer, golf, track and field, academics, one act play, softball and baseball.

With its 43 points, Happy is

this year's 1A state champion. Abbott was second with 40, Wink third with 39 and Tilden McMullen County fourth with 38. The rest of 1A's Top 10 are Follett and Nazareth with 34 points each, and Chireno, Coolidge Crumby Miller Grove and Lipan with 30 points each.

While the Coyotes enjoyed another banner football season, winning 13 straight before losing in the state semifinals, they also made it to the post-season in every sport that they offer, including girls' softball in its first year back as a program in over a decade. The Coyotes also made it to the playoffs in boys and girls basketball and baseball.

to regionals in girls' track. The Coyotes finished another season at the state track meet with tree entries, including two relays.

"Right now, we've got the kind of kids who don't want to be great at just one thing, but they want to be as competitive as they can be at everything we do out here," Borden County coach Trey Richey said. "That's something we not only want to continue, but we also want to build and improve on.

"All this says something about the type of kids that we've got out here. They're not only good athletes but they're just smart kids, too. That's a pretty good combination to have. We've also got a good bunch of kids who are just good about participating."

Borden County girls coach Mike Skelton believes the Coyotes' road to success has been a straight and narrow

"Like anybody else, we've got standards for our kids, some of which have been around for a long time. Some of our kids have had to find ways to adjust to them," Skelton said. "One of our biggest things has been to stop making excuses.

"Any time you're talking about schools our size, a lot of it is about finding those special kids who are willing to do the extra. A lot of our girls find themselves balancing their basketball and cross country practices and meets to where they can get to their academic meets."

Any time Borden County can get its name out there in such a positive way is important Coyote Coach Peter Benavidez, a 1997 graduate of Borden County High School.

"This spring, outside of our principal's office, we started putting up a table where we put all of the different trophies we won on it. We ended up having to go three tables deep just to where we can get all of our different trophies on it," Benavidez said.

"We've not only got a bunch of talented kids out here, but also the kind of teachers who do a great job working with our kids year in and year out. It's a lot of fun being a part of something like this right now."

Skelton also believes the Coyotes' lofty finish is also a tribute to the teachers at Gail.

"It helps to have the kind of veteran teachers that we've got who've always done a good job of pushing UIL. We've reached a point where our teachers are teaching kids of kids-second and third generations. We've got a principal (Bart McMeans) whose dad was also a principal out here."

With a majority of the Coyotes returning next year, do not be surprised to see them build on this year's strong showing.

"It'll be interesting to see how our kids respond, but we'll definitely have more opportunities," Richey said.





If you believe others are the reason you are where you are, then you wait for someone else to fix your problems.

If you are not happy with your situation, it's up to you to change it. Events may occur that are beyond your control. Your response however, is up to you. Look in the mirror if you want to see who is in the driver's seat of your life.

Quit being negative. A negative attitude attracts negative circumstances and people. If you are negative, you will find problems in every situation. It's difficult to be happy when you have a negative mindset.

Positive people find solutions for every problem. They don't consider failure as an option. You can start to change your attitude by changing the vocabulary you use when you talk to yourself. Replace terms such as: I can't, it won't work, I don't know how, or I'll fail, with: I can, I will, I'll find a way, and I'll succeed.

Quit being passive. When you are passive, you wait for things to change or get better. For whatever reason, you don't take an active role in your life. By being passive, you accept your lot in life as inevitable and out of your hands.

Take a proactive role in your life. You are in charge. The direction you choose is up to you. Take whatever action is needed in order to make things happen. You can change your path as often as necessary to reach your destination.

Quit worrying. Although worrying may seem like an involuntary emotion, it is pointless. Nothing was ever accomplished by worrying. All worrying does is drain you. Let go of those things you have no control over. Take action for those situations you do have control over.

You win by quitting bad or pointless habits and replacing them with positive behavior. The sooner you do it, the sooner you will benefit. Don't wait, start today.



"Pretenders" only deceive themselves. Whatever is "painted on," will some day he seen for what.



Kids in the Kitchen Cooking Camp


