## TEXAS AND CORN.

From one point of view would ge a good thing for Texas if the price of cotton and seed remained at the high figure prevailing this season. The result might be to turn the attention of livestock raisers to the value of other feeds, and stimulate farmers to raise them.
The most needed feed in Texas at the present time is corn. Train loads of corn are shipped into the state ever year and thousands of dollars in Texas money go out into other states. Every bushel of corn consumed in Texas could be raised at home. Corn ought to be raised so plentiful that livestock producers could afford to feed it as well as cotton seed products.
The cotton seed advocate may preach until he has gray hair that cotton seed products are the equal of any in the production of beef gains and from a scientific or rather theoritic standpoint he Is correct. But in the cooling room, or the butcher's block and in the roasting pan beef from a steer fed on cotton seed will not stand up beside a cut from a steer finished on corn. In the cooling room the cotton seed beef will shrink more thon the corn fed, with that much consequent loss to the butcher or packer. On the butcher's block the cotton seed beef does not and cannot show up that "marbled" finished so dear to the eye of the experienced purccaser. And in the roasted purccaser.
