## ALL OF THE SPUR RANCH CATTLE SOLD AND THE SPUR RANCH LANDS LEASED

The Sale of the Spur Cattle and the Lease of all the Spur Pastures Is One of the Biggest Cattle Transactions Since The Early Days of Texas.

### DEAL INVOLVES HALF MILLION DOLLARS CONSIDERATION.

Saturday a deal was consummated in Fort Worth by which W. J. Lewis, of Clarendon, Texas, purchased through Frank S. Hastings, who has charge of the sale of the Spur cattle, and Chas. A. Jones, representing S. M. Swenson & Sons, of New York, all of the Spur ranch cattle and also leased the Spur pastures.

The sale involved about seven thousand head of cattle and the lease comprises something like 438,000 acres of pasture lands for a consideration of about one half million dollars. The delivery of the cattle will begin about the 15th of June and is to be completed by August 1st.

This deal in no way will effect the sale of the Spur Farm lands, but will rather promote the sale of agricultural lands and was consummated with that end in view. The sale of the Spur ranch cattle was begun last year, and during the year some sixteen or seventeen thousand head of cattle were shipped to market and sold to make room for the farmer, and the sale to Mr. Lewis at this time was for the specific purpose of allowing the Spur Farm Lands management to devote their whole time and attention to the development of the agricultural interests of this section and the lease of the pasture lands was made subject to the sale at any time of tracts desired for farming purposes by the public. It means that the sale of the Spur Farm Lands will now be pushed uninterruptedly and without regard to other interests of the Spur holdings, and which will result in the more rapid development of the agricultural and farming interests of the country.

The sale of the Spur Ranch cattle at this time is not only one of the biggest cattle deals since the early days of stock raising in Texas, but is the last step in the total dissolution of one of the largest, oldest and most historical ranches of Western Texas. The Spur ranch was established in the 70s or early 80s and during its existence was an important factor in the stockraising industry of the West, and now, since it has served its day its history will live long in the memory of those who contributed to the life, usefulness and prosperity of its ranch days, and although the passing of the old

Spur Ranch will be noted not without somewhat of regret on the part of old time ranchmen and settlers of the West, yet its dissolution is one of the most important steps in the progress of the country and the development of the agricultural, commercial and industrial interests.

Since the Spur Farm Lands opened for settlement and the city of Spur created, both the town and surrounding country has developed and grown at a rapid rate—in fact it has broken all records in the history of town building and development in Western Texas, and it is expected to continue to push ahead, even more rapidly and substantially in the future than in the past. The country is rich in resources, the soil is varied and productive and the conditions are most promising and acceptable to the farmer and home builder, and all things considered a better location in which to become prosperous and contented cannot be found anywhere. We expect Spur to continue to grow, the country develop more rapidly, and those who are here now and who may come later to prosper beyond their expectations, and we extend a cordial welcome to the landless man and homeless families to come and join our boundless resources and assist in the development of one of the richest bodies of land in America—The Spur Farm Lands.

## LITERARY SOCIETY. SPUR COMMERCIAL CLUB MEETING IMPORTANT PROPOSITIONS DISCUSSED

The Red Mud School Renders Interesting Program at The Literary Society Friday Night

In response to an invitation from our Tap correspondent and others of the Red Mud country,

A. J. Tyler and the Texas Spur representative left the city Friday afternoon and headed for the Tap and the Red Mud school house to attend the literary society which met that night.

After driving over several miles of beautiful country made up of rolling hills and rich valleys, some of which is being cleared for cultivation but the majority of which is now in its raw state and only awaiting the man with the hoe to make it produce in abundance and prosper beyond the greatest expectations those who avail themselves of the unlimited agricultural opportunities, we arrived at the Tap store which is now and has been for many years owned and operated by E. Luce, who is not only one of the old-timers of this western country but one of the most prosperous and highly respected citizens. Mr. Luce carries a varied stock of goods for the accommodation of the citizens of the Tap and Red Mud countries and is also post master of the Tap post-office. Here we refreshed ourselves after the nine or ten miles drive with some of the canned goods kept in stock by Mr. Luce, after which we drove on out to the Red Mud school house which is located about one mile from the Tap post-office.

Arriving at the school house, soon the audience began to gather and a more hospitable and friendly people were never met with at any place. The house was called to order by T. S. Lambert who stated that on account of the threatening weather and the absence of some of the members of the society the program for the night would be somewhat changed.

The minutes of the previous meeting was then read by Miss Lizzie Perkins, secretary of the literary society.

The next on program was a recitation by Marvin Lambert followed by Clarence Day who caused laughter from the first to the end of his recitation, giving in detail the visit of a bashful boy to his best girl.

Booker Martin pleased the audience with a recitation which was followed by a drill made up of ten girls.

It was the intention to have a spelling match from the old Blue Back spelling book, but on account of an approaching cloud and threatening rain the program was discontinued at this time and the audience dismissed with an invitation to visitors to attend the literary Friday night week at which time a spelling match from the old Blue Back speller was promised the audience. It was also announced that an all-day singing and dinner on the ground would be had Sunday, April 3, and everybody is invited to attend.

At the close of the exercises, on account of the threatening rain, Mr. Tyler and the writer decided to not return to Spur, and being invited we spent the night with P. Henson and family who live near the Red Mud school.

Wednesday a little excitement was created when Deputy Sheriff Anderton took a shot at a party who was breaking into the calaboose to release a prisoner. The door had almost been released from the hinges at the time Mr. Anderton discovered the operator at work. However, the shot fired did no injury, and everything is quiet, the prisoner having given bond and will answer for the charges made against him.

At a meeting of the Commercial Club Friday night, March 18, many important matters concerning the welfare of the town and country were discussed, chief of which were propositions put before the club to establish a Farmers Union cotton yard at Spur, and working the Emma and Dickens road over the Cap Rock.

Messrs. Carlisle, Hagins and Booth on the part of the Farmers Union asked the town thru the Club for a donation of \$300 with which to assist in establishing a Union Yard at Spur for the purpose of weighing, grading and creating or holding until there be created a suitable market for the staple.

Mr. Booth as spokesman for the union said that if the town would furnish the \$300, the farmers would secure the site and establish the yard for caring for the next year's crop. The proposition met the hearty approval of the members of the club and a committee of business men were appointed to canvass the town for the needed funds and confer with the committee of farmers later.

The club went after the road proposition with a vim and willingness that speaks of good roads leading into Spur from all directions in the near future, which is the logical way of making Spur the trading center of Northwest Texas.

Since all industry must derive its activeness and support from agriculture nothing can be more wise and business like than the close union of the farm with the market for farm products by building good roads.

A committee was appointed to agitate the school question and take the initiative in securing an election for the purpose of incorporating Spur in an independent school district, but as it is, nothing can be done at present but to agitate the matter and have things prepared for an active beginning when we shall have been a town long enough to qualify 20 petitioners for the elections. Since the school laws require a petition of this kind to be signed by at least 20 property tax paying voters, who shall have lived in the town proper, for at least six months.

The question of a secretary was over for the time being because of the absence of C. A. Jones who seemed to possess all the data relating to the applications of parties for the position of secretary.

There is a wide field for the Commercial Club to work in and it is to be hoped that every member will put his best efforts to the front for the successful building of a hustling, wide awake, interesting city of Spur. We have much faith in the broad minded citizenship of Spur, and firmly believe that selfishness will be a foreign characteristic not known to our business men, and all things will continue in harmony and good will.—Ex.

### FITTING TRIBUTE TO THE VANISHING COWBOY.

The story of that conquest is the story of the West as it has been, the wild, free West of yesterday. The work is done, the cowboy is a vanished type. We boast of him in stories and we draw his picture to remind ourselves of a splendid past. In the halo of the picturesque his economic value has been lost sight of. Like many other men who have found life's keenest pleasures close to death, he was a constructive soldier. Probably he was the finest that the world has ever known.

He was a product of conditions in the East. He was lured westward by the hazards which the country offered him. It seems to be the case always that when industry needs a large body of men for such special duty as this, civilization has just brought about conditions which supply the recruits. The hard times in the North, the ravaged farm lands in the South, the tameness of the Mississippi valley whose elder generation of pioneers had brought restlessness. Also there was common then a certain well-

known spirit, hard to describe, which makes boys rowdies when they stay at home and men of action when they go away. The West called and the East stood ready with a few thousand lean, hard-boned young men, endowed above all other things, with that fine quality of moral courage known as "sand." They straggled to the cattle ranges, some with shoulder damp from the tears of fond goodbyes, others hard-eyed with memories of what had driven them from home.

And then they got their tryout sometimes it was a vicious horse, sometime a pistoled bully taking fine delight in the baiting of a tenderfoot, again a circle of unshaven ruffians round a campfire, keen-tongued, searching the homesick soul's last depths with caustic, drawling wit. Always the West took the East, examined him to find his weakest, sordest spot, then tested his endurance to the uttermost by probing this. And when the West gathered his bruised frame from the sage brush to remount the bucking animal, or clenched his whitened jaw before the ugly revolver muzzle, or wanly smiled

back at the jeering faces—when he did this for the tenth time perhaps—he found himself no longer East, but West, accented suddenly and among his fellows. By such rude, thorough processes they made the cowboys from the best and strongest of the men whose restless spirit had led him to the range. Those who were too weak or small were winnowed out, rejected to drift away to gambling hells, to cattle stealing, or to highway robbery. A few went back home.

The cowboys soon became a race apart, distinct in dress and speech from all those classes whence they had sprung. Their garb—from high-heeled boots to wide-rimmed sombreos, adapted to their work's peculiar needs—has become symbolic of the country where they rode. Ages yet to come will know it as the draping on a coat of arms proclaiming the new West. Their speech nearly obsolete. The drawl of the South lurked in many of its vowels and slurred many of its consonants. It borrowed idioms from the Italian and the Mexican. Some of the words—as "latigo," "pinto,"

"passear" and "bronco"—will linger as long as men use lariats and two cinched saddles. Others are now seldom uttered except occasionally upon the stage. Clad in the regalia of the range, with their long, single-action Colt revolvers swinging by their thighs, they spoke the dialect from North to fatherest South.

As a rule they were young men: after thirty one begins to lose that toughness of bone essential to riding such as theirs.

Their life was hard. It developed high quality of courage, quick minds and iron bodies. It needed these. Their swift, civilizing movements across half a continent was a march replete with stern endurance testing periods, full of fierce emergencies—Frederick R. Beehdolt in Colliers.

### COMPARISON ON COTTON.

A few figures of the Manufacturers Record show clearly how the proposition of planting more cotton should be avoided because that article sold so high last year. A number of farmers perhaps would not stop to consider that it cost them a great more in the out-come, and that more money was expended for other things—that could have been raised at home—than their entire cotton crop came to, even at the high price received.

"If all cotton growers were able to live at home, that is, to raise such food supplies as corn, wheat, beans, rice, live stock, potatoes, etc.; if every one had his own granary and smokehouse of drawing upon the West in those particulars, there would be little use in comparing the relative prices of cotton and other farm products. But in view of the fact that some cotton growers pay too little heed to raising other products and plowing the sod early and keeping it well prepared and ready for the planter which will be started as soon as the spring months seem close at hand, which evidences are already beginning to dawn. With another crop like that of 1908 the farmer here will be far ahead of any other business, which insures prosperity for any country.

It is interesting to note that cotton, in spite of its increased price, could buy less corn, less cornmeal and fewer beans, at wholesale in 1908 than 1898, and that, of course, there was even a greater difference when it came to retail prices. Between 1898 and 1908 the dollar value of a bale of cotton increased more than 76 per cent, but its value in exchange for other direct or indirect farm products was nothing like as much, the bale of cotton being able to buy in 1908 at wholesale only 60 per cent more of wheat than in 1898, only 70 per cent more flour, 33 per cent more beef on the hoof and 47 per cent more fresh beef, 18 per cent more live hog and 16 per cent more bacon, 44 per cent more sheep and 49 per cent more mutton, 25 per cent more butter and 26 per cent more potatoes. In other words, although the increased price of cotton enabled it to buy more of most of the commodities mentioned in the list than in 1898, the increased price of these commodities diminished more or less the advantage to the cotton grower in the advance in the price of the staple, even without taking into account the coincident increase in the cost of making a bale of cotton.
