

THE MAKING OF A GOOD PLAY

Plot, Skillfully or Unskillfully Drawn, is at the Bottom of Suc-

A good plot is that sure edifice which slowly rises out of the interplay of circumstance on temperament, and temperament on circumstances, within the inclosing atmosphere of an idea, writes John Galsworthy, in the Atlantic. A human being is the best plot there is; it may be impossible to see why he is a good plot, because the idea within which he was brought forth cannot be fully grasped; but it is plain that he is a good plot. He is organic. And so it must be with a good play. Reason alone produces no good plots; they come by original sin, sure conception, and instinctive after power of selecting what benefits the germ. A bad plot, on the other hand, is simply a row of stakes, with a character impaled on each—characters who would have liked to live, but came to untimely grief; who started bravely, but fell on these stakes, placed beforehand in a row, and were transfixed one by one, while their ghosts stride on, squeaking and gibbering through the play. Whether these stakes are made of acts, or of ideas, according to the nature of the dramatist who planted them, their effect on the unfortunate characters is the same; the creatures were begotten to be staked, and staked they
