

Nothing pays better than to be on friendly terms with the brood sows at farrowing time, and for the reason it is best to remove them to their farrowing pen at least two weeks before they are due to farrow.

Many pigs are lost by accident at the time the sow is farrowing, some by feeding the sow to much soon after farrowing, and others from damp, filthy nests and sudden changes in the weather.
