HEARD DICKENS' LAST WORDS

Miss Hogarth, Now 84 Years Old, Was at the Deathbed of Great English Novelist.

The most interesting person at the recent Dickens bazaar at Caxto hall, in London, England, was Miss Georgina Hogarth. Miss Hogarth is 84. She was a child when she went to live under the roof of her brother-in-law, Charles Dickens, and she remained a member of his house hold till the final summons came to the great novelist. She was with him when he was struck down. His las' words were, "On the ground." She alone heard them.

It is generally supposed that Mis-Hogarth was in Dickens' mind when he jotted down in his notebook the following outline of a "character' for future use: "She-sacrificed to children, and sufficiently rewarded. From a child herself, always 'the children' (of somebody else) to en gross her. And so it comes to pass that she is never married; never herself has a child: is also devoted to 'the children' (of somebody else) and they love her; and she has all ways youth dependent on her till be death—and dies quite happily."

REQUISITE HOURS FOR SLEEP.

As a race we sleep too little, says writer. An infant's life is nearly all sleep. Gradually, as the child grows older, the hours of sleep are hortened to half the day, or about eight hours. Youth until the age of 20 is reached requires fully 10 hours sleep. Although nature demands less hours of sleep in summer than in winter, it has been proved that eight hours of sleep is required for the average male adult in good health. By this is mean not simply eight hours in bed, by. that amount of good, sound, restfui sleep night after night. Our power to work is intimately related to our ability to sleep and there is no more reliable indication of sound healtl than the capacity to sleep naturally and the more active and energetic the waking life the deeper the sleep

BELONG TO LATER STONE AGE

interesting Find of Prehistoric Dwellings Just Made by Dr. Otto Froedin.

The Swedish anthropologist, Dr. Otto Froedin, has discovered at Omperg, near Alvastra, the remains of a number of lake dwellings, dating from the later Stone Age, and estimated to be about 4,000 years old, being, in fact, the oldest discovered so far in northern Europe. The lwellings were built in the usual manner on piles, but differ from the well-known Swiss lake-dwellings in resting partly on the bank and pro jecting over the water. The floors of the houses, which were of fir and birch wood, were well preserved, the bark still adhering to the birch logs. In addition to weapons and vessels of stone, horn and wood, Dr. Froedin found carbonized apples and grains of corn. The latest finds are stated to be particularly interesting, as hitherto only the imprints of grains had been found in earthenware vessels, and no actual grains have been discovered. Another find was a large amber bead, described as "the symbol of divinity." Dr. Froedin also found he remains of skins with which the looring was covered, and large quantities of nut shells. Various inlications go to prove that the Stone Age men who inhabited these dwellngs were in commercial relations with other races
