Mr. O'Reiley will be joined in the wall on one side by J. D Powell who at a later date will cover the adjoining lot with a concrete building.

SEWERAGE SYSTEM.

Surveys Being Completed and Actual Work Will Begin Within The Next Few Days.

Surveyor Northrup, of Fort Worth is here this week completing the preliminary survey formerly made for the installation of a first class sewer system in Spur. Sewer mains have been unloaded along the alleys and will be put underground within the next few days; and it is thought that within the next ten days or two weeks the system will be in operation.

Two main problems in most western towns are the sanitary and water supply propositions, and in these Spur is handling the situation in an unsurpassed manner. There are no other towns within the state the size and age of Spur which can boast of a first class sewerage system and the other public improvements being made and in contemplation here at this time. A deep well is being drilled with the intention of securing artesian water with good prospects. The well at this time is some thing near fourteen hundred feet, the greater part of this depth being drilled through a solid, hard rock. It is thought that when the drillers pass through this rock that an abundance of water will flow from the well. Of course such a belife may be founded only in the ed that the drilling will continue limit of the drill is reached. DWARF PEARS IN MUCH FAVOR

Eastern Orchardists Report Them as Profitable and Trees Bear for Several Years.

many years, and many large and profitable orchards are of this kind. Many are in good condition after having been planted 50 years. This does not bear out the common notion that dwarf trees are short lived. Then, dwarfing induces early bearing, and



with pears in particular, extra size and quality are secured because of the greater ease with which small trees may be pruned, thinned and sprayed.

There is no mystery connected with the dwarfing of trees. Scions of standard varieties are grafted or budded on small growing species within the family, or upon dwarf forms of the same species. In the case of pears the stock used is the quince. The quince is slow growing and seldom attains a height of more than 12 feet: usually less. Some varieties of pears will not unite with the quince, so what is known as "double working" is resorted to. This consists first in grafting a pear variety which is known to unite with the quince, such as the Vicar; then, when this has attained sufficient size, again grafting to the desired kind.

Dwarf pears should be planted deepthan standards. Dwarf pears should not be allowed to attain a height greater than 12 feet, else the end sought in planting them will be defeated. Severe pruning must usually be practiced, often as much as onehalf to two-thirds of a season's growth must be removed, especially during the early life of the tree. By careful training the top may be spread so that a comparatively large amount of bearing surface is secured. Dwarf pears are often planted as close as ten feet apart each way, making 435 trees to the acre. At this distance, the trees will be too close together; 15 feet away each way, or 193 trees to the acre, would no doubt be prefer-

CONCRETE FOUNTAIN IS BEST

Will Produce an Everlasting Article and One That Will Give Excellent Satisfaction.

While many similar fountains for the poultry have been made of tin cans, that soon rust and are useless, yet this same principle applied to a concrete fountain will produce an everlasting article and one that will give excellent satisfaction. A large flat dish is used to mold the bottom, into this lay a one-inch course of concrete and have it come up on the sides, as




Concrete Fountain.

shown in sectional illustration, about two inches high. In the center set a short section of stove pipe and inside this place a smaller piece that has a less diameter so that the wall of the tank will have a thickness of at least three-quarters of an inch all around the same; for the center core an old tomato can or even a round piece of wood of the right size is excellent. The holes for the water are made by inserting a large spike about one-half inch from the bottom, through the outer core or section of stovepipe and so it will mold a small hole through the concrete; four or six of these should be made, but placed below the top edge of inside dish. The concrete is placed between the stovepipe and the core, thus molding the wall and bonding with the concrete bottom so the fountain is all in one piece. BRACING FENCE GATE POSTS

Very Effective Way, and One That Will Not Require Much Extra Material Shown.

The posts of a gate placed in a straight line of wire fence requires just as much bracing as a corner post. A very effective way, and one that

The two posts of the gate will need to be extra long and well set in the ground. 

Saw Himself Pictured as Others Saw Him.

Remington once told a story of the county offices and select a himself that will bear retelling. One of his cowboy acquaintances in the west was known as Hollering Smith because of his favorite way of enjoving himself. 



Storing Celery.

If your celery is to be stored and seld for late marketing it will keep petter if not blanched too much in he field. getting the heat from the lamp to the eggs may be by a tank of hot water or by a circulation of warm air.

The first method has in the past been the more common. The tank of hot water retains the heat and the eggs are less subject to sudden varia tions in temperature.

The ventilation of an incubator is of vital importance. The rate of evapo ration must also be considered Eggs lose much of their water during incubation. If the evaporation varies much from the normal amount good hatches cannot be secured.

The rate of evaporation is de termined by three things: the tem perature, the humidity, and the cir culation of the air. Theoretically it would be best to supply air at a giver rate and containing a certain per cent of moisture, but in the commercial in cubator such an arrangement is impractical.

The most practical system of con rolling evaporation is a system of forced ventilation, in which the air is heated around the lamp flue and has many of these simple houses rate determined by ventilators in the bottom of the machine.



Portable Pig House.


