Muleshoe High registration

Muleshoe High School will register students for the 1999-2000 school year on April 12-13.

Austin ISD indicted

AUSTIN — The Austin Independent School District was indicted Tuesday in a case stemming from alleged manipulation of testing data used to rate Texas Schools.

It was an action that Travis County Attorney Ken Oden called the first of its kind in the state.

A Travis County grand jury handed up 16 indictments against the district and a 16-count indictment against a deputy superintendent involving records of students taking the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test.

If convicted of tampering with a governmental record, the school district could face fines of up to \$160,000. The deputy superintendent, Margaret Kay Psenick, could face up to a year in jail, a \$4,000 fine, or both.

AISD officials insist Psenick did nothing illegal or improper.

Oden said the Austin school district is an organization that, like a corporation, can be held legally liable for criminal acts of its employees.

Superintendent search narrowed to pair of finalists

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees has narrowed its search for a superintendent down to two finalists.

After three days of interviews, the board selected David Loren Hutton of Tahoka and Charles E. Carter of Grandfalls-Royalty as their top choices to replace Bill

Moore, who will step down from the Muleshoe post in June.

A third finalist candidate withdrew his name for consideration, citing family concerns.

The board interviewed six candidates this week before narrowing its choices, according to board president Cindy Purdy.

Hutton has served as the superintendent of the Tahoka school dis-

trict for the past five years.

He earned his bachelor's degree from West Texas State University in 1969 and earned his master's degree in education from Abilene Christian University in 1989.

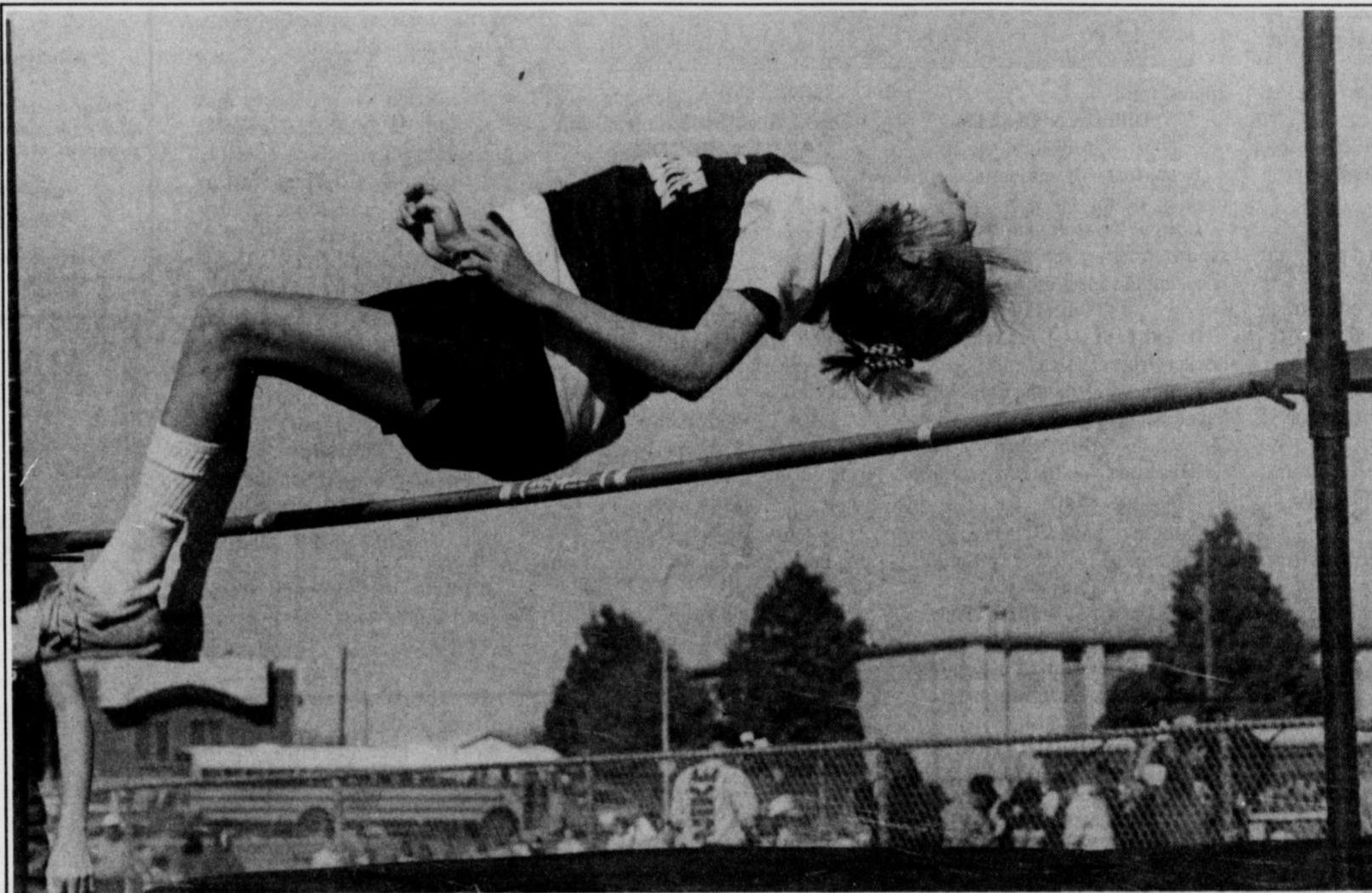
Carter has served as superintendent at Grandfalls-Royalty for the past three years.

He received his bachelor's degree from McMurry University in

1974 and his master's degree in education from West Texas A&M in 1985.

The MISD school board will conduct a second interview in the next two weeks, according to Purdy.

The board also plans to visit the school district and community of its top candidate before extending a job offer according to Purdy.

Wilhite signs with Panhandle State

Erin Wilhite is not the first, nor will she be the last, to be discovered by accident.

By being in the right place at the right time, the Muleshoe senior is now getting the opportunity to pursue her dream of playing college basketball.

The two-time all-district post signed a national letter of intent Wednesday to play basketball at Oklahoma Panhandle State University in Goodwill, Okla.

"I love it up there," Wilhite said of the 1,700-student school located outside Guymon. "It's not for everybody because it's such a small school and a small town. But that's not a drawback for me."

The Lady Aggies recently moved up to NCAA Division II and play as an independent.

Wilhite's stellar play in the Class 3A playoffs drew the attention of Lady Aggie coach Kevin Emerick, who

actually was scouting a player on a team the Lady Mules were playing.

A starter since her sophomore year, Wilhite enjoyed a solid career before blossoming in the playoffs. The 5-10 post averaged 17 points a game in the playoffs, helping Muleshoe advance to the regional quarterfinals.

During the run, Wilhite showed she could play fac-

USDA forecasts lower corn planting in 1999

Recent USDA forecasts indicate growers will be reducing their corn acreage this year.

Nationwide, corn acreage is projected down by almost 2 percent.

Total corn acreage for all uses has been pegged at 78.2 million acres compared to 80.2 million acres in 1998. Most of

the total acreage loss will occur in the upper Midwest and the Southern U.S.

Texas is expected to see the largest acreage reduction, with farmers there indicating that they will plant 500,000 less acres this year. Minnesota corn acreage is expected to be reduced by 300,000 acres. Iowa

and Nebraska producers indicate they will plant 200,000 less acres each, while corn acreage in North Carolina and Wisconsin will drop between 160,000 to 150,000 respectively.

On the plus side, the eastern

Cornbelt is expected to see modest increases in corn plantings. Look for acreage increases in Illinois where farmers have indicated they will plant 200,000 more acres, other states projecting slight corn acreage increases include Indiana and Kansas which are projected at 100,000 each.

Adverse spring planting weather conditions are a wild card which can influence price

and force changes to growers' crop decisions. The USDA will issue a revised crop acreage report in June.

third Muleshoe High athlete to sign to play in college. Matt Turney and Dustin Cleavinger signed to play football in February.

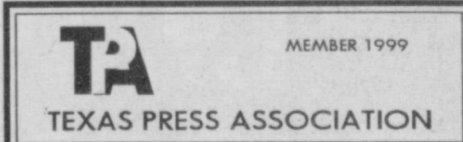
Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey call Emerick a class act.

Little League president clarifies rules

Dear editor,

I would like to take the opportunity to thank Dana M. Barthol for her letter in last week's newspaper concerning Little League.

I enjoyed reading the information that she made available to your readers found on the Little League Web Page (www.littleleague.org). I would recommend that everyone can find a world of information available at this site about all aspects of the National Little League Organization. I want you to notice when reading this information that it involves a very short explanation of the Divisions of Little League Baseball.

To fully understand how Little League Baseball works in the local community, you need to consult more detailed information.

The national Little League organization and the state Little League organization present a

broad spectrum of rules and regulations that offer the foundation for each local league. They realize that this "glove" of rules and regulations does not always "fit" the same everywhere. To provide an equal solution, the national Little League organization provides to the local league organizations the "OPTION" to vary or change these rules and regulations to "fit" its circumstances.

If you would like to check this information, it can be found in the Little League 1999 Operating Manual page 51 under the heading "The Divisions of Little League" and the sub-heading of "Tee Ball Baseball and Softball" paragraph two, verse one. I quote "Tee Ball is for youngsters of league age 5,6,7 and/ or 8, to be decided by local league option."

I must apologize to the general public for the information that was published in the sign-up information that was given

to the *Journal* for publication on March 18, 1999. This baseball sign-up notice stated "Children that are currently enrolled in Kindergarten thru 12 years old on or before July 31, 1999 are eligible to participate."

I checked with the district administrator and found that we could not use grade discrimination as a basis for registration to play. Age had to be used as a basis for each league.

The Board of Directors of Muleshoe Little League corrected this error and set the league age of 6 years old by July 31, 1999 as a minimum age for sign-ups in Tee Ball.

The Board of Directors of Muleshoe Little League voted to make several changes in the operation of our league. We realize that anytime you change the system that has been in use for several years, it becomes most difficult to please everyone. Before these changes we made our Board of Directors

spent long hours considering the effects on our local league.

Good facilities, excellent equipment, qualified coaches and umpires, fair and equal playing conditions and a healthy and wholesome playing environment are our goals as elected officials.

The Board of Directors of Muleshoe Little League is composed of volunteer adults that give very generously of their time. We are totally committed to the goals and purpose for which we were elected. Each year in June we have an annual meeting. Election of Officers to the Board of Directors is done at this meeting and suggestions for the improvement of our League are presented.

The date and time for this year's meeting will be published in the Bailey County Journal. I cordially invite you to attend.

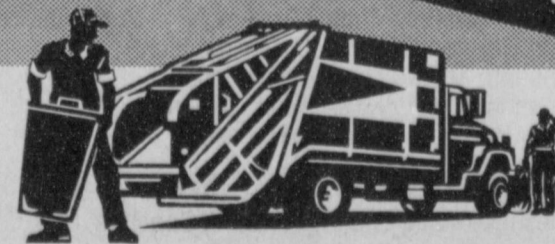

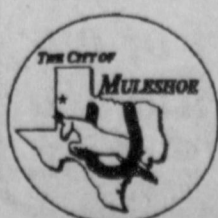

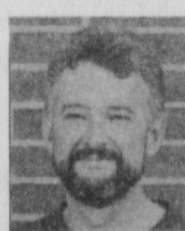

The tones ascend in the sanctuary, winged praises launched heavenward by the band of assembled worshipers.

"When my love to Christ grows weak, / When for deeper faith I seek, / Then in thought I go to thee, / Garden of Gethsemane!"

J. R. Wreford's familiar words lead them in praise,

recalling the scenes of that dark evening in Gethsemane when the salvation of the world hung in the balance awaiting the decision of one weary figure. Through the shades of Gethsemane, past its gnarled olive trees, the thoughts of the worshipers proceed until the eye of faith rests on one man suffering, weeping, praying alone.

The notes of the hymn lead the worshipers up the hill of Calvary to stand at the foot of the cross with Mary and John and the soldiers, a small band of people, a microcosm of humanity, some crying, some gambling, some taunting while the Author of Life tastes death.

But as he pronounces Heaven's verdict concerning the

work of our redemption, "It is finished," and dies, the melody leads the celebrants from death back to life.

"Then to life I turn again, Learning all the worth of pain, / Learning all the might that lies / In a full self-sacrifice."

"The worth of pain, the worth of pain" The words echo through the sanctuary and reverberate in the hearts of those present. They are more than empty words to the widow whose life has been so changed by the unwelcome hand of death. Those words are full of meaning to the middle-aged lady whose marriage has died a death just as painful as any physical demise. They mean something to the father who sings them and thinks of the pain of his drug addict son--and his own pain.

None of those singing are strangers to pain. Even the little ones understand skinned knees. Most of the older ones are well-decorated with unseen purple hearts bought by the deeper wounds of life.

On they sing of "the worth of pain," with the assurance of Heaven itself that, for those whose faith is placed in the Christ of Calvary, no pain need be meaningless.

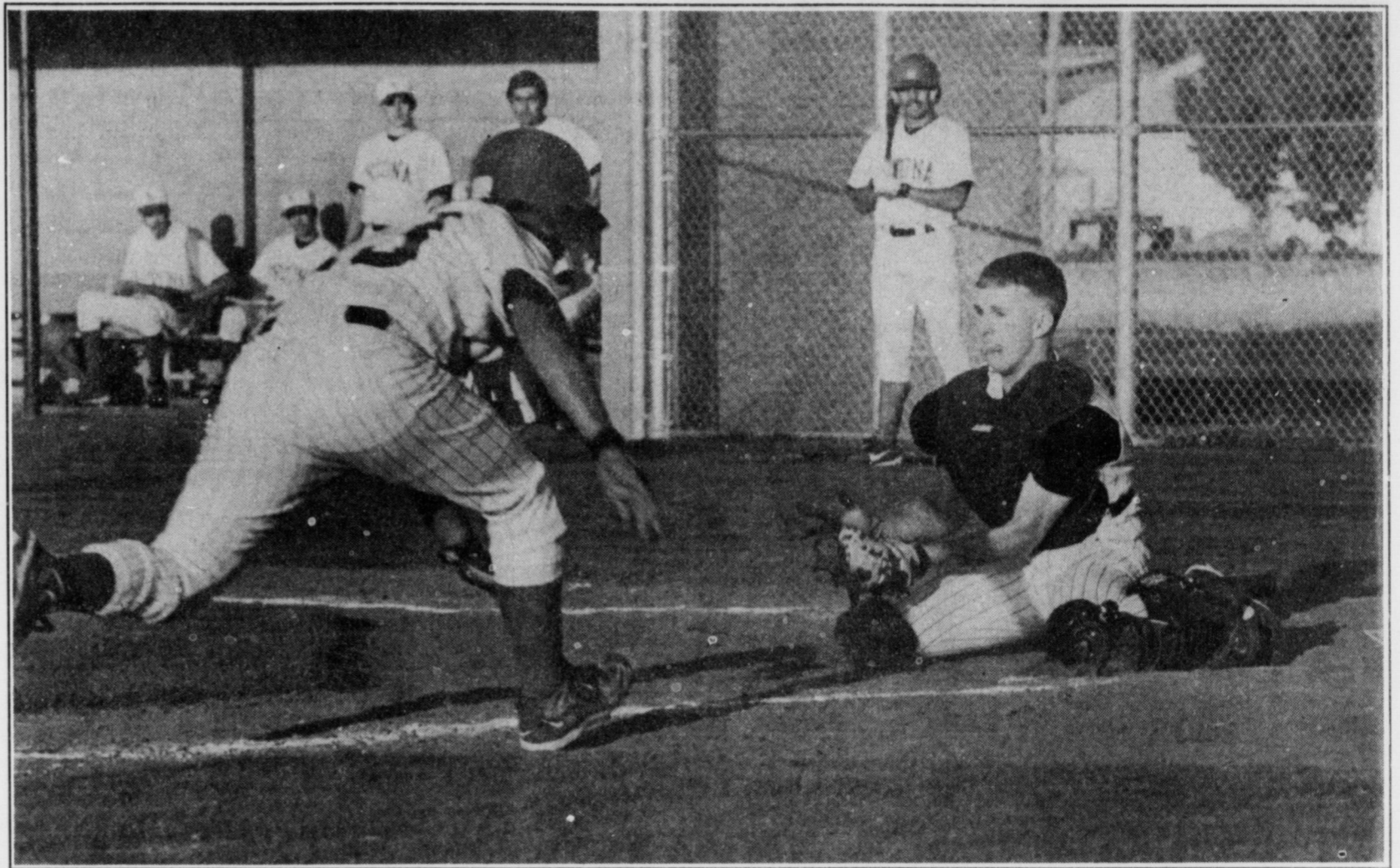
