HIGHEST PRICES FOR COTTON.

Throughout the week the Spur cotton buyers have been paying from 13.37 to 13.55 for all the cotton coming to this market. The prices being paid in the Spur cotton market range from fifty cents to one dollar per hundred pounds more than is being paid elsewhere in this section of country.

The Spur buyers are not figuring on making money in the cotton buying business, but are paying every cent and more than there is in the staple to make this the leading cotton market of the country, and how well they are succeeding up to date is evidenced not only by the high prices being paid but by the number of bales coming to this market from every section of the country and also from a distance.

While the cotton picking season has not fully opened up at this time there has been quite a number of bales ginned and marketed here during the week. Up to Thursday night the Farmers Union Cotton Yard had received seventy bales and something near that number of bales had been ginned at the Spur gin We consider this a very good showing for the first week of ginning and you might say the opening of the cotton season in this section of country.

Throughout the fall Spur will continue to lead in paying the very highest prices for all cotton brought to this market, and aside from the cotton market the merchants of the town have prepared for an extensive trade and have large stocks of goods to select from and will make prices to compete with any commercial center.

CROSBY COUN-TY ELECTION.

At the county seat election held Saturday in Crosby county to determine whether or not the county seat should be moved from Emma to Crosbyton there were 318 votes polled, 198 of that number voting for Crosbyton and 120 voting for Emma, thus giving Crosbyton a majority of 78 votes.

It requires a two-thirds majority vote to remove a county seat without a five mile radius of the center of the county, and since Emma and Crosbyton are ten miles apart one of the two places is without the five mile radius. Recently an opinion was given out from the Land Office at Austin by Commissioner Robinson that Crosbyton was within five miles of the center of Crosby county, and in view of this statement it was thought by those who desired to move the county seat to that place that only a majority vote would be required to establish Crosbyton as the county seat of the county. However, since the election it is stated that an opinion was handed out by a former Land Commissioner years ago stating that Emma was within the five mile radius of the center of the county. Thus it is and the county seat proposition of Crosby county is yet unsettled, and until it is decided which of the two opinions from the Land Office is correct the removal of the county seat will be in doubt and will probably remain at Emma until a final decision or survey of the county is made.

PAYING MORE FOR COTTON.

W. A. Adams, a prominent citizen and prosperous farmer of the Afton country, was in Spur Wednesday with two bales of cotton which he sold to Spur buyers. Mr. Adams was paid thirteen dollars and forty-seven and a half cents per hundred for his cotton, the price being something near one dollar per hundred more than the prices being paid by other cotton market towns of this section of the country. The cotton buyers are making good the statement heretofore made by the Texas Spur that this market point would be the best of the country and that the buyers would pay even more than the regulation market quotations and prices elsewhere. Meat can be raised at 5 cents a pound or less. He can grow pigs just as easily as he can grow the plant to buy it with. Now he has got to raise \$15 or \$20 worth of something or other to get money with which to buy \$5 worth of for commercial purposes but for feed. It is next to cotton seed meal as a dairy food. The peanut is also a soil builder. Irish and sweet potatoes are being raised now from 150 to 300 bushels to the acre, and if Maine, California and Colorado can find a market here in Texas for these products certainly our farmers ought to be encouraged to supply at least the home

> Our department is charged with the destruction of the insect pests of the state. Unfortunately for us at this time we are without the proper funds with which to carry out this work as it should be done in view of the fact that the whole state is now more or less infestmore money or more men. Take

situation and come to the relief of the department of agriculture in its fight upon the insect pests. We now have in our orchards many different insects, including the San Jose scale. We also have insects attacking the trees, the leaf and the fruit. We also have other diseases called "fungus" that are destroying thousands and thousands of fruit trees. Besides this almost every kind of a crop is now attacked by some kind of an insect pest. Among the pests we have the boll worm, the melon louse, the potatoe weevil, the onion thripps, red spider on strawberries, cane borer, and quite a number of others. It is estimated by the United States government that the annual damage to crops and orchards in the United States will reach near \$800,000,000, and I believe Texas is losing between \$30,000,000 and \$50,000,000. Therefore the department of agriculture will welcome the assistance of every known agency to aid in its work.-Brownwood Banner Bulletin.




