THE HOG TRAIN.

The Fort Worth & Denver Special Hog Train Visits Spur Last Week.

For some unknown reason we failed to note in last week's issue the Fort Worth & Denver special hog train to Spur. The train arrived here on schedule time and spent the greater part of the night in Spur. On board the train were James C. Hestand of Sherman, J. Garfield Crawford, West Texas Editor of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, and N. S. Davis, traveling agent of the Fort Worth & Denver Railway Company.

In the hog car were six hogs, one pair each of Duroc Jersey, Poland China and Berkshire. The hogs were about ten months old and weighed from three hundred and fifty to four hundred and fifty pounds. Mr. Hestand had charge of the hog car and made an interesting talk not only on hogs but on crop diversification and development of Western Texas. He said the thing most needed in this section was more people and when the people came to supply them with hog pens and they would prosper and stay with us.

Whichever one is found to have spoiled eggs in his posession is subject to prosecution.

Each person will buy his eggs "loss off," that is, the person he buys from will have to stand any loss if eggs are found bad. The new ruling is calculated to make farmers bring their eggs to town oftener and not to rob old nests. Dealers will also have eggs they sell.


