W. F. McCarty, for the best oats; Mrs. A. J. McClain for best peaches and plums; S. W. Rathner for peaches; Tom Harrison for plums; C. M. Buchanan for best broom corn; S. W. Odom and H. T. Garner best kaffir corn; J. N. Self best watermelon; J. E. Johnson best collection of farm produce; Tom Gilmore best tomato; W. J. Clark and B. F. Yeates best Indian corn; B. F. Yeates best June corn; Mr. Whitaker best sweet potatoes and best maize; J. E. Johnson best peanuts; J. N. Self best cotton; R. C. Forbis best alfalfa.

The list of prizes offered is on file at the Commercial Club and those who have been awarded premiums can see Secretary Jeff D. Reagan and secure the prizes as listed.

The exhibit brought in by the farmers of the county was carried to the Dallas Fair by Mr. Reagan, and although failing through technical omissions to secure the prizes offered at the fair, the Spur and Dickens county exhibit attracted much attention and will result in greatly advertising this country as a superior farm, orchard, garden and agricultural section and it is hoped will contribute to the more rapid settlement of the surrounding country with substantial and thrifty farmers. Mr. Higgins is one of the oldest citizens of the country and is now one of the most prosperous farmers and stockmen.

SPUR LEADS IN TELEGRAPH BUSINESS

The Volume of Business Justifies and Demands an Up-Town Office.

During the past year Spur has paid more revenue for telegraph business than any other town on either the Stamford & Northwestern or Wichita Valley Railways, and in view of this fact efforts are now being made by Secretary Jeff D. Mr. Reagan is now in communication with Mr. Smith, general manager of the Western Union Telegraph business in Dallas, with a view of having an office conveniently located in Spur and it is very probable that the request will be granted and that at no distant date Spur can boast of an up-town telegraph office in connection with her many other advantages.

Not only in telegraph lines has Spur excelled other towns of Western Texas. Spur today stands at the head of the list in rapid and substantial growth and development and her progress is unparalleled in the history of town building and development of the country, and as a noted character of the country says, "there's a reason." NEW BUILDINGS GOING UP.

One New Business House and Several Residences Now Building in Spur.

A new business house is being built this week on the east side of Burlington Avenue adjoining the Campbell & Campbell furniture store and is expected to be complete by the first of the month. The building will be occupied by J. W. Hodges with groceries. G. C. Pass is building a residence in the northeast part of town, Floyd Caylor has just completed a five-room house near the hill and two other residences have just been completed in the northwest part of the city.

FARMING IN SPUR COUNTRY

Farming Pays in Spur Country When Laboring Under Disadvantages.

While there are a number of instances of successful farming in the Spur country this year, there is one which was brought to our notice particularly this week. Mr. G. L. Barber fenced a place near Spur, cleared up the land and put in a number of acres in cultivation. On one piece of five acres Mr. Barber reports that he made twenty-two hundred bundles of sorghum which he sold at five cents a bundle, which paid him about one hundred and ten dollars. The land for this sorghum was broken in April and planted the last of May.

This is only one of a number of instances of successful farming under disadvantages in the Spur country.

The cotton crop of the country, it is said by those in a position to know, will average from one third to one half bale to the acre, while there are some farmers who will make near three-quarters of a bale to the acre. All have made good crops of sorghum, maize, kaffir corn and other stuff and will have some to supply the new comers who settle here to make crops another year. Take the Spur country as a whole and it is the equal if not superior to any country.

NO DUMPING GROUND.

HOG FARMING IN SPUR COUNTRY

One Man Raises Two Hundred Head of Hogs For The Market.

Wednesday W. A. Craddock, a prominent farmer of near Wake, brought a load of hogs to Spur to deliver to Tom Davis of the Spur Market. Mr. Davis bought forty head of the hogs and intends to butcher them here for home consumption.

Mr. Craddock said that he had about two hundred head of hogs ready for market and that he could deliver them here at any time.

This is another instance where the farmers of this country are diversifying to their own advantage, and while there are a number of other farmers in the country who raise hogs as a side line on the farm, there are none who devote their whole attention to the business. The experiences of all who have raised hogs demonstrates that there is big money in the business. Here the hogs are not subject to cholera and other diseases common to hogs and since the country will produce all kinds of feed in abundance, can be raised cheaper here than in other sections.

Considering the advantages to be had in the hog business in this section, within a very few

years a sufficient number of farmers will engage in that business to support a packery at Spur, and before many years have past the Texas Spur expects to make the announcement that a packery is being located in the city.

The Spur country today is offering more inducements to the agriculturist and diversified farmer than any section of the state and when these facts become generally known you will see them coming and taking advantage of such inducements and developing the wonderful resources that abound in this section. Let us all cooperate and work together to that end.

NEW LIQUOR LAW

A new rule in regard to shipments of intoxicating liquors, goes into effect in Texas on the 17th of November. This law requires the expressman at the depot to keep a separate book containing a complete record of all liquor shipments, the amount the price paid, consignee and consignor, size of receptacles, etc. He cannot deliver the goods except to the consignee, and he must sign up for the same. This book shall at all times be open to the officer of the law, and the books may be used in court as a witness. Agents all over the state have been notified of the change.—Ex.

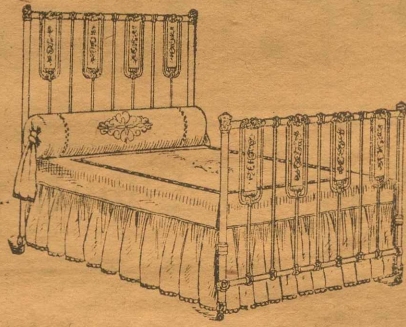

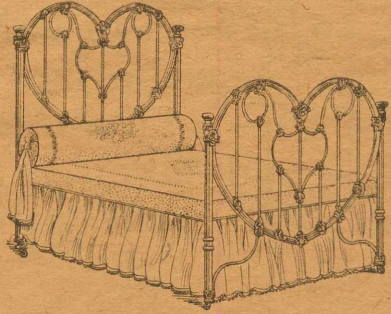

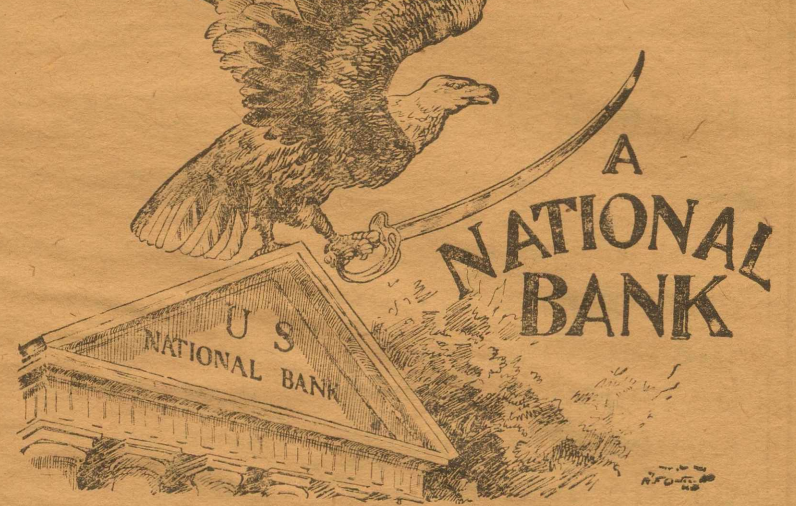
