OPENING ROADS BUILDING BRIDGE

Road and Bridge Work Being Done in Every Section of Spur Country

Wednesday T. A. Smith, a prominent citizen of the Cat Fish country, was in the city and reported that he with others of his section of country had succeeded in having the commissioners of Kent county allow funds for opening up a road and co-operate with Spur in building a bridge over Big Red Mud Creek, and the work on this bridge and road will be commenced at once. Secretary Jeff D. Reagan, in the absence of a surveyor, went out the first of this week, surveyed the route and made an estimate of the cost of the bridge.

This road and bridge will not only convenience a great number of people but will extend the trade territory of Spur. There are numbers of citizens in Kent and even Garza counties who desire to get in touch with a live commercial center, and when this road and bridge are completed will have access to Spur and will do much of their trading here.

Since the opening of Spur more than a year ago the business men of the town and the people of the surrounding country have been most active and liberal with funds to secure the very best roads into every section of the country, and this fact is highly commendable in that good roads are a most important factor in the building of a town and the development of a country.

In looking over the country for a location the homeseeker will find in the Spur country not only a rich and fertile soil but the advantages of good roads, a live commercial center and every accommodation and convenience in the mercantile line and the most enlightened and hospitable citizenship on the face of the globe.

At this meeting it was decided to organize a Mother's Club and on November 19, Mrs. Scurry acting as temporary chairman, the organization was perfected, a constitution adopted, and the following officers elected: Mrs. Burgoon, president; Mrs. York, first vice-president; Mrs. Standifer, second vice-president; Mrs. Senning, Treasurer; Mrs. Reagan, secretary; Mrs. Scurry, parliamentarian.

The object of this club is to secure co-operation between mothers and teachers for the betterment of pupils, also to provide a public school library. An initiation fee of ten cents and monthly dues of ten cents will be charged, the money secured to be used for the benefit of the schools. The meetings are to be held the first and third Saturdays in the month.

Anyone interested in the welfare of children is eligible for membership, and all mothers who have children in the school are especially urged to join.

The work taken up by the club at present is to provide clothing and books for children whose parents are unable to do so, that they may attend school. Any one knowing of such children will please notify any member of the club, or Mrs. Burgoon, president.

DICKENS COUNTY BANK DEPOSITS.

Individual Deposits Amount to More Than Two Hundred Thousand Dollars.

FOUR ISSUES ONE MONTH

The election is now a thing of the past and the Democrats once more claim the victory.

PRACTICAL FARM- ING ENCOURAGED.

A Community of Interests Ex- ists Between the Town and The Country.

The resolutions adopted at the recent meeting of the Farmers' Congress at Haskell is well worth reading and observing by the people of the western country in general. The resolutions follow:

Whereas, the farm is the basis of prosperity in West Texas, and realizing that the development of agricultural resources is paramount in the growth of this section of the State: Therefore Resolved that, we pledge ourselves to use our influence and devote our energies to the encouragement of practical farm-

ing, as demonstrated in the idea of dry farming, believing that it is nothing more than correct

2. We believe that a dissemination of a practical knowledge of agriculture is necessary to the best development of this country and we pledge ourselves to lend every encouragement to that end, we invoke the aid of the State and National Departments of Agriculture and of the Press of West Texas to that end, and we call upon the Commercial organizations as well as upon all other industrial organizations of this portion of the State to join in this movement.

3. We recognize the splendid work being done by the State Department of Agriculture through its efficient Commissioner and his able corps of assistants, and, knowing of the good

that has already been accomplished by that department and the great possibilities that are before it, we urge the Thirty-Second Legislature to make liberal and adequate appropriations for its support and maintenance so it may give the greatest possible assistance to the agricultural interests of the state.

4. We appreciate the usefulness of the A. & M. College of Texas, and especially do we felicitate that institution on the establishment of its correspondence department whereby the farmers and others interested are able to get some of its benefits at a merely nominal cost, and we recommend that all progressive farmers avail themselves of this course of home study.

5. We are profoundly impressed with the community of interest that exists between the town and country, and we urge that this be fully recognized by both and that each look to the other for the support and encouragement that should be given. With confidence and co-operation given, there can be no barrier between the town and the country, and we submit that it is to the mutual interest of both to work together in harmony.

6. We realize that the study of agriculture and horticulture

in Texas is being encouraged by the State and we recommend the institutions and agencies that are being employed in that direction. We further commend the efforts that are being put forth by the educational associations and the legislative bodies of the state to secure the teaching of Agriculture in the public schools. We also commend the conductors of teachers' normals for having lectures delivered on agricultural subjects as a part of the study in such normals. The initial results have proven the importance of the movement in the development of the agricultural resources and progress of our state; therefore it is the sense of the Northwest Texas Dry Farming Congress that the legislature enact a law requiring all teachers in our public schools to pass examinations on elementary agriculture and horticulture before certificates are issued to them and, be it resolved further, that the elements of agriculture and horticulture

shall be included in the course of study in our public schools and enforced by the proper authorities as rapidly as possible.

7. Realizing that experiment stations and demonstration farms afford a most effectual method of giving practical lessons to the farmers of the state, we ask the Thirty-second Legislature to pass a bill providing for the establishment of such stations in all counties in the state where substantial co-operation shall be offered by the county desiring such station.

8. We believe that such meetings as the one we are holding are of inestimable value to the farmers of West Texas and we earnestly recommend that Farmers' institutes be organized in each county in West Texas to co-operate in this work, and that annual meetings of the Northwest Texas Dry Farming Congress be held and that all county institutes be well represented at such meetings.

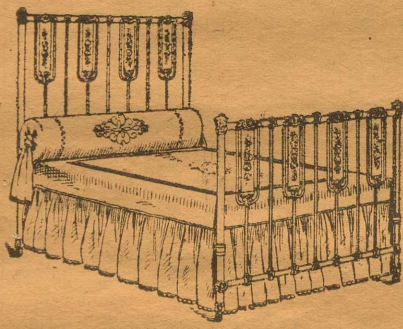

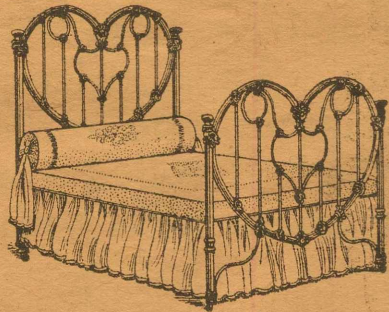
