This looks like the prediction made by the Texas Spur earlier in the season that five thousand bales would be shipped from this section during the year was pretty well founded since there are a large number of bales yet being held in the Spur country for higher prices.

The price of cotton on the Spur market ranged from fourteen to fourteen seventy-five.

The Farmers' Union Cotton yard has weighed up-to-date 3,359 bales during the season, while quite a lot of cotton within the Spur territory has been weighed and shipped from other points on the Stamford & Northwestern railroad.

It brings authorities, yet an appreciation the land disappears altogether, for all of its earnings have been taken in taxes. In other words ground-rent is the income that is left after taxes are deducted. If taxes are increased rent is decreased. If taxes are diminshed rent is increased. The landlord and the state are really partners in the ownership of the land.

It may be said that the landlord will meet any increase in taxes by an increase in rent, just as the taxes on sugar, clothes, or any other commodity are shifted to the final consumer. But this cannot do, as experience has demonstrated. The land tax remains where it is originally placed. Certainly, so far as vacant land is concerned, there is no one but the land lord to pay the taxes. He could only shift the tax by leasing the land to some one to use; and if all the land were thus brought into use, the competition of sellers and users would be such that this of itself would bring down the price of land, just as it does the price of everything

It is this cheapening of land values that is so important in the solution of the housing question or the planning of cities.



And yet that is exactly what the proposition amounts to in its practical application. It would not be a subsidy that would create new business where there was none before. If it would do that, it might be an argument in its favor. Instead of doing so, it would take the trade from the merchants, both wholesale and retail, who are now doing it, and transfer it to new and wholly different agencies, who would be enabled to secure the trade because of direct advantage given to the new agencies by the National Government at the expense of the general public.

The farmers of the new and fast developing West do not want the parcels post. They are settling and building homes in a country where the social and educational advantages are limited. They, in the great majority of cases, are not able to pay cash for their supplies and buy such supplies in quantities that would be necessary if they ordered goods from a distance, and assistance of building roads, scriptions displayed to the eye, the heavy deficit now caused by

The great advantage of the reform suggested lies in the fact that it is automatic. An ounce of taxation will do more to clean up a slum than a score of sanitary policemen. Self-interest is the moving force in all other business. Why should it not be made operative on the land-owner? He has no vested right to be made rich by the growth of the community. Nor has he any vested right to hold land out of use, to block the orderly development of the city, and at the same time make the price of all other land so high that the rents of the whole community are forced up in consequence. For that is what happens. It is the withholding of land from use that explains the high rents of our cites; it is this that lies at the root of the housing problem; it is this that is responsible for the high cost of living—for only a fraction (and a very small fraction) of the land in America is used. And yet it is all owned. And I have never met a land-owner who did not feel that his land was worth from 50 to 100 per cent. more than it would really pro-
