ORGANIZATION IS HELPFUL Makes It Possible for Dairymen Who Could Not Afford to Own High-Cerea Sirver & Is Low.

The history of the co-operative bull associations shows that they are especially adapted to small herds where a valuable bull for each herd would constitute too large a part of the total investment. Through these associations farmers or dairymen who have only a few cattle can have joint ownership, use and exchange of pure-bred bulls. The cash purchase and cost of maintenance of the bulls belonging to the members of the association is distribup his herd at a minimum expense.

The typical co-operative bull association, as organized in this country, is tion and should tory is divided into five "breeding blocks," one bull being assigned to each block. As many as 50 or 60 cows may belong to the farmers in each block, and the bull in the block should be kept on a farm conveniently situated. To prevent inbreeding each bull is moved to the next block every two years. If all the bulls live, and if all are kept until each has made one complete circuit, no new bulls need be purchased for ten years. In this way each member of the association has the use of good pure-bred bulls for many years, at a cost of only a small part of the purchase price of one bull. Ordinarily the purchase price and the expense of supporting the bulls are distributed among the members of the association according to the number of cows owned by each.

#### Low Cost of Co-Operation.

That the need of pure-bred bulls is urgent in many parts of the country is evident from the facts brought out by the United States department of agriculture's study of eight districts in the states of Iowa, Minnesota, and Massachusetts in which there were no associations. In this survey informa-tion was obtained regarding 1,219 farmers owning 817 bulls whose average value was \$76. Had the owners of these cheap bulls been properly or-

ganized the same investment would have purchased the recessary bulls of an average value of \$283. On the farms mentioned nearly four times as |. many bulls were used as would have been required under proper organiza-The farmers were therefore tion. feeding four bulls when they should have been feeding only one.

Actual first-cost figures from other co-operative bull associations are more encouraging. In one association having more than 100 members the original cost to each member was only

#### RICE CROP SUFFERS HEAVY LOSS WITH THE HEAVY RAINS

Beaumont, Tex .- According to reports from the rice belt, the percentage of unharvested rice runs 15 per cent in Louisiana, 29 per cent in Texas and Arkansas, and 15 per cent in California. The loss as a result of the rains in Louisiana and Texas is placed at 1,000,000 barrels, valued at \$7,000,-000. The loss as a result of damage to the rice that is harvested is still not known, as the grades under which this rice will be marketed remains yet to be determined. Samples have been sent to Washington. The Rice Growers' Association at Beaumont advises ers' Association at Beaumont advises the farmers to plant earlier varieties of rice and insure early harvest before the wet season sets in. 



There was a doctor there in Dixmude, who certainly deserves a military cross if any man ever did. He was called from his house by the Germans at 5:30 one morning. He left his wife, who had had a baby two days before, in the house. He was taken to the square, lined up against a wall with three other big men of the town.

Then he saw his wife and baby being carried to the square on a mattress by four Germans. He begged to be allowed to kiss his wife good-by, and they granted him permission. As he stepped away, there was a rattle and the other men went West. They shot him, too, but though he was riddled with bullets he lived, somehow, and begged the German officer to let him accompany his wife to the prison where they were taking her. This was granted too, but on the way, they heard the sound of firing. The soldiers yelled, "Die Franzosen!" and dropped the mattress and ran. But it was only

some of their own butchers at work. Doctor Laurent carried his wife and baby to an old aqueduct that was being rebuilt by the creek. There they lived for three days and three nights, on the few herbs and the water flat Doctor Laurent sneaked out and get at night. Doctor Laurent says that' when the Germans killed and crucified the civillans at Dixmude, they first robbed them of their watches, pocketbooks, tings and other things. There was a Madame Tilmans there, who had had three thousand francs stolen from her and was misused besides.

The land tendered follows: Jefferson county, 50,000 acres; Harris, 40,000 acres; Orange, 25,000 acres; Jasper, 25,000 acres. Hardin county will tender 25,-000 acres soon, bringing the total up to 140,000. Other tenders are expected. These lands must have no strings to them. The government will have nothing to do with land on which the oil or timber rights have been reserved.

> The work of the state canvassing board in canvassing the returns of the November general election continues to be delayed by the failure of certain county judges to send in returns as required by law. There are thirteen delinguent counties which have failed to send in any returns on state, district, county or precinct officers, as follows: Anderson, Callahan, Coleman, Foard, Gregg, Ochiltree, Cldham, Parmer, San Jacinto, Stephens, Trinity, Upton and Ward. With these counties included there are seventy-five counties which have failed to send in returns on county and precinct officers.

> A statement prepared by D. C. Reedy, secretary of the committee in charge of the Texas drouth relief fund, shows contributions so far received total \$274,951, of which \$123,750 has been distributed in aid of drouth sufferers, leaving a balance on hand of \$151,201. Aid has been granted to sixty-one counties. One county received \$6,000, four others \$5,000 each and the remainder small amounts, the small est being \$200, going to one county which did not ask for a larger amount

> The sum of \$3,476 has been received by the United States customs office in San Antonio, Texas, from the New Orleans customs office in payment of 350 gallons of alcohol seized at Point Isabel and Port Aransas in 1917, at which points it was washed ashore and picked up by fishermen. The liquor was sent to New Orleans for sale, as it could not be auctioned off in dry territory. The spirits, which were contained in two metal drums, one of which was picked up at Point Isabel and the other at Port Aransas, is supposed to have been part of the cargo from some torpedoed steamer.

> With 10,000 children in Texas out of school last year, Mrs. Ella Caruthers Porter, state publicity chairman for children's year, urges parents, teachers and all organizations interested in child welfare to aid in the backto-the-school movement which is the next thing on the program of the Federal Children's Bureau in Washington
