Cities are planning varying events and mayors have been asked to issue proclamations honoring local ambulance and emergency room personnel.

Just eight years ago, Emer-gency Medical Services (EMS) began being organized across the South Plains to bring the advanced treatment methods pioneered in M\*A\*S\*H units to the civilian population. Community leaders knew that life saving equipment, rapid com-munications, and skilled personnel could, in effect, take the emergency room to the site of injuries or accidents, and death rates from trauma were falling in cities where they operated.

To organize such services for scattered population centers, concerned citizens established the South Plains Emergency Medical Services, Inc. (SPEMS) in 1977 to secure state and federal funding for the purchase of equipment and the training of personnel.

Since that time, thirty emergency services, largely staffed by volunteers, have been trained and equipped to serve the counties surrounding Lubbock.

Today all of the counties of the South Plains have access to a Basic Life Support System and eight of these have advanced Life Support capabilities.



ment of 1,724. According to the school administrator, this has caused some problems in meeting the 22:1 student/teacher ratio required by the stae in grades K-2.

The school district has already employed an additional kindergarten teacher on a semester basis, said Fuller, to bring the kindergarten class into compliance with the new state law. Also, a search is underway at this time for a first grade teacher and additional classroom space to bring the first grade into compliance.

The second grade is in compliance with the required student/teacher ratio, he said. According to the superintendent, the district has until 1988 to establish the same 22:1 student/teacher ratio in grades 3 and 4. With projections made by the administration, this will necessitate at least three and possibly four additional class-

## Disappointing **Quail Year Is Predicted**

Texas quail hunters should see improved conditions for this year's quail season, but they still might have difficulty achieving the 12-bird-per-day bag limit and possessions limit of 36.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission set the bag limit Friday after hearing a report that quail populations have only partially recovered from the freeze and drought of 1983-84.

Don Wilson, quail program leader for the Parks and Wildlife Department, said quail counts ranged from extremely good to poor in various regions of the state, but the overall population estimate still is below the long-term average.

"There was good nesting conditions in most of the state during the spring and the birds responded with a good hatch," Wilson said, "but brood stocks were so low it's going to take another favorable nesting sea-son in 1986 before we'll have a bumper crop."

Wilson said the eastern portion of South Texas showed the most improvement in quail counts. Some of the better counties include Bee, Live Oak, McMullen, Stascosa, Brooks, Kleberg, Starr and Willacy. Wilson added that the Rolling Plains ecological area of West Texas showed impressive gains in some areas but remained below par in others.

The statewide quail season is November 2-February 23.

study of the effects of water quality on the performance of both gas and electrical house-hold water heaters, she says.

The study measured the energy consumption of six gas and six electric water heaters that has been in household use for 5 to 15 years in the Las Cruces, N.M., area.

The gas and electric heater groups were chosen so that half of each group had been opera-ted exclusively on the area's untreated hard water. The other half had been operated exclusively on water that was softened in the home to remove harsh minerals, such as calcium and magnesium.

The gas heaters operated on hard water used 29.57 percent more Btus than those operated more Blus than those operated on softened water, reports Quiring. Likewise, the electric heaters operated on hard water used 21.68 percent more Blus. The researchers then removed

and weighed the sediment and scale that had accumlated in each of the tested heaters, says the specialist. In those operated only on softened water, the amount of scale weight from 1.09 to 4.27 pounds. But the. heaters operated on untreated water had scale buildup weigh-ing from 3.86 pounds in a 6-year old unit to almost 40 pounds in a 10-year-old heater. Quiring advises Texans living in hard water areas to prevent such residue buildup either by installing a water softener or by draining enough water softener or by draining enough water out of their water heaters each six months or so to remove sediment. "People who live in areas

with extremely hard water and high sulfer content, may find it advisable to drain the water heater as often as every other month," she adds.

The specialist also recom-mends following the manufacturer's instructions that come with the heater and observing all safety precautions when draining a water heater.



Tech University Health Sciences Center, SPEMS has trained more than 1,400 persons in lifesaving skills, has published regional treatment protocols, oversees operation of the EMS radio network, and provides workshops for individual com-munities. SPEMS also sponsors an annual regional educational conference on emergency care which will be held at Tech's Health Science Center on October 26 this year.

The 21-member Executive Board, comprised of representation from each county, is currently developing a uniform recordkeeping and evaluation program which will develop the statistical data base needed for future planning and grant applications. Plans are also un-derway to introduce a computerized billing program to assist the volunteer services

with billing procedures. Goal of the South Plains Emergency Medical Services is to see that every citizen on the South Plains has access to the best emergency care available. By working together as a region, a great deal of progress has been made, and that is reason for celebration, said Ms. King.

Training is a big part for the volunteers, and there are four levels of EMS certification:

(1)Emergency Care\*Attendant (ECA), 40 classroom hours; (2)Emergency Medical Techni-cian (EMT), 100 classroom hours, 40 hospital hours, and five supervised ambulance runs; (3)Specially Skilled Emergency Medical Technician (EMT-SS), EMT certification, plus 60 classroom hours and 50 hospital hours; (4)Paramedic EMT (EMT-P), EMT certification, plus 160 classroom hours, 140 hospital hours, and 100 ambulance runs.

A minimum number of continuing education hours is required each year for an individual to retain certification. This number ranges from 12 hours for the ECA to 40 hours for the paramedic. Many services to purchase

sophisticated patient care equipment for their vehicles (defibrillators, oxygen, immobilization devices). In fact, Westworld Community Healthcare, Inc., the operators of West Plains Medical Center have recently purchased a \$40,000 ambulance, which is in effect, a mobile emergency room. The West Plains Hospital and Nursing Home Auxiliary has pur-chased sophisticated heart monitoring equipment to be used in the ambulance; and West Plains Medical Center has constructed a new building to house the 'ambulances, the emergency personnel and training rooms, located at the rear of the hospital.

week announced the awarding contracts totaling of 54 \$2,254,706 to weatherize the homes of low-income people, with priority given to the elderly and the disabled.

Under program guidelines, as much as \$1,600 can be spent to weatherize a single dwelling by applying caulking, weatherstripping, and insulation and by replacing windows or doors.

South Plains Community Action, Inc. received \$19,458 to be distributed to the program in Bailey, Cochran, Garza, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Terry and yoakum counties.

In the past 11 months, 8,560 dwellings have been weatherized under this program.

The weatherization contracts, which are administered by the Texas Department of Community Affairs, uses funds from the U.S. Department of Energy and U.S. Health and Human Services. The Texas Legislature also designated a portion of the accrued interest on oil overcharge funds awarded to Texas for weatherization programs.

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


