CLASSIC BARBWIRE DISPLAY IS FIRST PERMANENT ITEM IN HISTORICAL COLLECTION

By PAT COLLINS Mr. Berry Greenwood wholives nine miles south of Carbon has the first barbed wire collection for the Eastland Co-

unty Historical Museum. Mr. Greenwood said he started his collection in November of 1966 but did not really get started until after the first of the year.

This reporter asked Mr. Greenwood about himself. He said, "Nothing of the ordinary." He said his grandfather

Mr. Herrington was principal at Tiffin School and taught at Ward School, holding these capaci years. He was a former tax accessor - collector and 'tax consultant for Eastland County for 15 years. He was also a former owner and operator of a variety store in Rising Star for 16 years.

Mr. Herrington had served for the past six years as hospital administrator for the Ranger General Hospital. He was a member of the Ranger Lions Club and the IOOF

The standard length of the species of wire is 18 inches. He has over sixty pieces of wire to put on this collection. Mr. Greenwood said he hoped to have Mrs. Morgan assist him in labeling the wire.

Some of the wire dates back to about 1869. The collectors have payed as high as \$31 for the wire, an 18 inch piece, being bought by a collector-in Kansas. There is still some of the wire being used in Eastland County.

This being the first piece for the museum, the committee is looking forward to other items given to the museum.

Cisco To Vote January 23 On City Sales Tax

An election has been ordered for Tuesday, Jan. 23, on the proposition of passing a one per cent sales tax in the City of Cisco, according to an announcement today. The election was approved at a special meeting of the City Commission on Wednesday, Dec. 20, according to the election order.

order.

A legal notice in connection with the election will be published in The Press on Thursday, Dec. 28, and again on Thursday, Jan. 4.

The question in the election will be for or against an ordinance providing for a local sales tax of one per cent (1%) within the city limits. Authority for the election is a state law approved by the last Texas Legislature, giving this authority to cities.

Under the law, cities are permitted to levy and collect a general sales tax not to exceed one per cent. The state presently collects atwo percent sales tax, and the city sales tax will be handled by the state collection agency.

City officials were running a survey to determine an estimate of the yield of a one per cent sales tax. This information will be published in the near future, according to Mayor W. W. Sawyers.

The city sales tax covered the identical items as the state

Breckenridge, Abilene and other area cities have recently adopted city sales taxes. Ranger will vote on the matter January 9. Eastland is reported to bestudying the tax with no decision to date.


