#### 18 NEW FARMS A DAY

Washington, D. C., Dec. 28-Eighteen new farms are opened up, 2,135 acres of virgin soil are turned under and farm property increases \$344,000 each day in Texas according to a report recently issued by the Federal Census Department. According to the report Texas has more farms than any other state in the Union, the total number being 417,770 and having increased 65,580 or 18.6 per cent during the past ten years.

The total value of all farm property is given at \$2,218,645,-164 which is an increase of \$1,-256,168,891 or 130.5 per cent over 1900.

The total acreage of improved land in the state is 27,360.666, compared with 19,576,076 in 1900 which is an increase of 7,784,590 acres or 39.8 per cent.
