LOOKING

Last week I spent three days at our state office in College Station. I carried all 1966 aerial photograps for Eastland County to photocopy individual farms to be used for certification of acreages in 1968. I returned with 44,000 prints of farms and part farms in Eastland County. I was able to visit with section heads in the state office, which I am always happy to do, so that we can discuss our farm program problems. The State Office Compliance Division has been most helpful in working with the Eastland County Committee to try to have the tolerance provision for 1968 changed. They were of the opinion, last week, that the tolerance provision would not be changed for 1968.

1968 peanut allotments were mailed out last week and several producers have been to the office inquiring about them. The peanut allotment factor was just in excess of 100 percent and small increases resulted in individual farms. The 1968 allotment for Eastland County is 39,004

Several producers have inquired about sale and lease of peanut allotment for 1968. So far as we know this bill has not been approved by Congress. If it is approved pro-ducers will be notified as quickly as possible.

Applications for 1968 new farm allotments are currently being accepted by this office. Details on eligibility are available and will be furnished interested applicants.

I would estimate that peanut harvest is better than 90 percent complete as of Dec. 7, and should be complete by

Catfish Farming Is Continuing To **Expand In Texas**

Production of catfish for commercial purposes has continued rapid growth in 1967, conservation at Texas A&M announces W. G. Klussmann, Extension specialist in wildlife conservation at Texas A&M University.

From 300 acres in production in 1960, catfish farming has grown to an estimated 3. 000 acres in 1967. Klussmann says about 20-25 million pounds of catflish were harvested in 1966 compared to a few thousand in 1963.

"By 1970, the number of farm-raised catfish will likely increase from 100 to 2 percent," he said.

For many people in Texas fish farming is a profitable sideline, but for many more it is a full-time business. A few are losing money fish-farming but this si mainly because of merchandising and marketing problems, Klussman points

At an initial stocking rate of 1,500 yearling catfish, the farmer can expect an average yield of 1,600 pounds per acre, per year.

With prevailing market prices between 35 to 75 cents a pound and the costs of raising the fish, including feed, from 25 to 30 cents a pound, Klussmann said the profit may vary between \$80 and \$800 a year per acre.

Railroad Taxes Total \$27,435 in This County

to the various government agencies by Texas railroads in Eastland County totaled \$27,-435, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

That amount was the county's share of the more than \$10,000,000 the railroads paid in Texas on their own right of way and other property. The biggest railroad contri-

bution was to the school systems throughout the state Large sums were also distributed to city, village and county governments and for road and bridge funds.

In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the railroads' 33,410 Texas Em ployees contributed on their own property. The vast majjority of rail workers, many of whom live in Eastland




