DEBATING, DECLAMATION

The people of Spur and Dickens county in general were given a rare treat in these contests, and many who had hitherto been unmindful of the many good advantages of these contests went away thoroughly convinced that these county organizations have inaugurated a move that will place Dickenscounty on "the map" in many ways.

In the oratorical contest of Friday night the judges, selected from men from different parts of the county, rendered the following decisions: In the boys contest; Harvey Lee of Spur took first honor, Frank Forbis of Dickens second and Thomas Stephens of Dickens third. These were the only entries. In the girls contest there were also but three entries. Erma Baker of Spur received first honor. Opal Berryman of Spur second and Iosa Ferguson of Dickens third.

No debating team entered the contest except Spur, therefore, Spur was granted judgement by default and awarded the county honors. However, to keep the audience from being disappointed, the Spur team contested with each other and the decision was given the affirmative in the subject, "Resolved that the Women in Texas Should Be Given the Right to Vote on Equal Terms with the Men," this being the subject selected by the state authorities.

These contests were carried on according to the rules and regulations prescribed by the same authorities.

> Some localities in past years, the lands have been shamefully cut over, regardless of our rights, and those of purchasers of land not occupied. Many otherwise honest men, have come to think that what others have done, without a penalty resulting, they can also do, and there is an increasing disposition to appropriate wood wherever it can be found, no matter to whom it belongs. This must and will be stopped. We must protect the people who have already bought Spur Lands, and those who will hereafter buy them, from this wood cuttiug.

> Some people pretend to think there is no objection to it. This is, therefore, public notice that ne one has our permission to cut wood of any kind whatever from our lands anywhere, and that prosecution will certainly follow tresspassers hereafter without favor.

A compilation of the appropriations passed and pending for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918, shows a total of \$16,-971,414,291, of which about \$9,250,000,000 has been authorized by congress and \$7,-750,000,000 is still to be voted.

For each of 20,000,000 families in America this means an average of \$350 in round figures, and for every man, woman and child an average of \$170.

What is Uncle Sam buying with these enormous sums?

The army is the bigegst item, with \$2,684,000,000 already ap propriated and \$5,000,000,000 more required-\$384.22 from the average American family for the army.

Next comes the cost of loans to the allies, \$4,007,000,000 already, including the cost of printing the bonds, etc., and \$2,000,000,000 more to be pro- try. vided. This will amount in all to a loan from each American family of \$250.35. Of course these loans are the debts of our allies, but the money for them must be raised.


The postoffice has \$331,000-000, all of which must come out of the pockets of the nation in the form of postage-\$16.59 per family.

Pensions cost \$160,000,000 -\$8 per family.

The president has a lump sum of \$100,000,000 a large part of which is understood to have been spent for ships-\$5 per family.

War risk insurance funds of \$45,000,000 have been voted -\$2.25 per family.

Finally there is a little item of \$70,000,000 to pay the interest of the Liberty Loans already issued-\$3.50 per family which is just a foretaste of the rapidly mounting interest charges that will have to be raised when the costs are paid with bonds.






