REALLY A SOUND INVESTMENT

Sanatorium Where the Tuberculosis May Be Cured Is Worth Much to Any State or City.

Dr. H. L. Barnes, superintendent of the Rhode Island State sanatorium, has recently demonstrated by some in teresting studies of patients discharged as "apparently cured" from that in stitution, that a sanatorium is a sound investment for any state or city. The gross earnings of 170 ex-patients obtained in 1911 amounted to \$102,752 and those of 211 cases in 1912 to \$112, 021. By applying the same average earning to all ex-patients of the sanatorium living in 1911 and 1912, Dr. Barnes concludes that their income in these two years was \$551,000. This sum is more than three times the cost of maintenance of the sanatorium including interest at 4 per cent. on the original investment and depreciation charges. Dr. Barnes concludes, however, "While institutions for the cure of tuberculosis are good investments, there is good reason for thinking that institutions for the isolation of far advanced cases would be still better investments."

DICKEN'S COUNTY SET-TLING AND DEVELOPING

A recent sensus compiled by the State Department of Education reveals the fact that the scholastic population of Dickens county is 1057, and that of the Spur Independent School District is 230. The total apportionment of the state school funds to Dickens county schools, at \$6.81 per capita. is \$7,240,45 for 1912-13 term. Figuring on the same basis the Spur Independent Shcool District receives state funds to the amount of \$1,556.30.

The total number of school children over seven and under seventeen years of age in Texas is 1,017,133, and 812,896 are white and 204,237 are colored. The males number 515,603 and the females 501,530. The total apportionments are \$6,967,361 for the state.

The announcement of the compeiton has been sent to the superintendents of schools in rural districts. No further information can be obtained from the Office af Public Roads. This announcement should be plain to everyone, and all children will thus start on a basis of equality.



Devere, isolated as it was from the main route of travel (the Santa Fe stages still following the more northern trail), heard mere-My rumors of the prevailing condition through tarrying hunters, and possibly an occasional army courier, yet soon realized the gravity of the situetion because of the almost total cessation of travel by way of the Cimarron and the growing insolence of the surrounding Comanches. Details from the small garrison were, under urgent orders from headquarters at Fort Wallace, kept constantly scouting as far south as the fork of the Red river, and then west to the mountains. Squads from the single cavalry company guarded the few caravans venturing still to cross the Cimarron desert, or bore dispatches to Fort Dodge. TWO FINE DISHES OF VEAL HAS A PETRIFIED WATERFALL

Best Methods of Preparing Meat That Requires Particular Care in its Preparation.

Curried Veal, Indian-Cut about two pounds of lean, raw veal into pieces, place in a saucepan, cover with warm water, and season with two pinches of salt and a pinch of pepper, add a garnished bouquet and half a dozen small onions and cook the whole for twenty-five minutes. Prepare a gill of white roux in a saucepan, moisten it with the liquor from the veal, stir well, and add one teaspoonful of moistened curry and three raw yolks of eggs, beating them up as they are put in. Place the veal on a hot dish, strain the roux over it immediately, as it must not cook again, garnish with a border of boiled rice, and serve at once.

Veal Cutlets, Lyonnaise-Trim the cutlets and dust them on both sides with salt and pepper. Place a lump of lard in a stewpan and when it has melted put in the cutlets and fry oved a brisk fire till done on both sides. Drain the fat out of the stewpan, and pour over the cutlets one-half teacupful of rich broth and boil it quickly until reduced to a glaze. Turn the cutlets, pour in the same quantity of broth as before, and reduce that to a glaze. Now arrange the cutlets in a circle on a hot dish. Pour into the stewpan in which they were cooked one-half pint of brown sauce and one teacupful of Madeira wine; boil and then add one teacupful of chopped gherkins, two or three tablespoonfuls of chopped parsley and a small piece of butter. When the butter has dissolved pour the sauce over the veal and serve immediately.

TO BE USED IN MODERATION

Garlic is a bulbous plant formed with a thin husk containing several bulbs known as cloves. This condiment is little appreciated by people of the north, who consider it rather as a medicine than an aliment.

Turkish Croquettes.

Chop a pound of veal fine, grate white bread to the amount of one cupful with it, and mix the whole together with an equal amount of mince ham and half a cupful of chopped chicken if the latter is convenient—it is not absolutely necessary. Season well with pepper and salt and "bind" it with two tablespoonfuls of rich gravy and two beaten eggs. Butter a mold and line it with macaroni that has been previously boiled and then turn the veal mixture into it, pressing it well down. Place the mold in a dish with boiling water within an inch of its top and steam for half an hour.

Remove and turn out of the mold on to a hot platter and pour over it any rich gravy.

Maraschino Cheese,

Whip a pint and a half of cream to a thick froth and mix with it a little gelatin dissolved in hot water, the strained juice of a lemon, and three wine glassfuls of maraschino. Stir this mixture over ice until well mixed and at the point of freezing (or mix in a freezer), then turn out into a mold and pack in ice till quite firm. When ready to serve dip the mold in tepid water, wipe and turn the cheese on to a fancy dish.

Pea Soup.

One cupful or one-half can peas, one tablespoonful sugar, one pint cold water, one pint milk, one slice onion, two tablespoonfuls flour, two teaspoonfuls salt, one-eighth teaspoonful pepper. Drain liquid from peas and rinse, add sugar and water and boil slowly twenty minutes. Rub through sieve, reheat and add flour, butter and seasoning cooking together. Scald milk with slice of onion and strain, add milk to first mixture and serve very hot with croutons.

Broiled Chops.

Few meats are more generally relished for breakfast than well-broiled chops and potatoes fried in deep fat to a delicate brown. Rib chops can be nicely Frenched by scraping the long bone of each one until entirely denuded of fat and meat. There are many who prefer loin chops. These simply need the trimming off of super fluous fats. The broiler is rubbed with a bit of fat, the chops arranged in it and cooked over a clear, very hot fire. It is best to season them when half

One of the Natural Wonders of the World That Is Located in Country of Algeria.

With all the beauty of a cataract of living water, there is in Algeria a remarkable petrified waterfall which recently has been engaging the attention of scientists. This is the Ham-mam-Meskhutin, which means "The bath of the damned," and is located 62 miles from Constantine. This solidified cascade is the production of calcareous deposits from sulphurous and fer ruginous mineral springs, issuing from the depths of the earth at a temperature of 95 degrees centigrade.

"The bath of the damned," even from a near viewpoint, looks for all the world like a great wall of water dashing into a swirling pool at its foot, yet its gleaming, graceful curves and the apparently swirling eddies at its base are as fixed and immovable as if carved from the face of a granite cliff.

Many centuries have, of course gone to the making of the deposits, and the springs were well known to the ancient Romans. The name Hammam-Meskhutin was given to the stone cataract in an allusion to a legend that the waterfall was petrified by Allah, punishing the impiety of unbelievers by turning all the members of the tribe into stone. At night, so the story runs, its stone dwellers of the remote ages are freed from their strange fetters, come to life and resume their normal shapes.

Rice Rorridge the Children Eat Without Protest-French Muffins a Second Course-Lemon Biscuits Have Piquancy of Flavor.

Rice Porridge.—Place one-half pound of rice into three quarts of boiling water, and let it stand until the rice has softened into a jelly. Add to this a quarter pound of oatmeal, mixed with water, and stir it well in. Add also about an ounce of finely chopped onion, one-half ounce of bacon fat or butter, salt and pepper to taste, and boil all together in a double boiler, stirring every little while until done. If desired, the quantity of oatmeal may be larger. This porridge will be found to be an agreeable change from the usual ones, and children who have tired of the plain oatmeal or rice usually take to it with zest.

Real French Muffins .- Put an ounce of butter in a saucepan with half a pint of milk and warm slowly. Beat four eggs until they are frothy and add them to the milk. To this mixture add a medium sized cake of yeast which has been dissolved in warm water and then stir in very gradually a quart of flour. Butter well the muffin pans, pour each about half full and set in a warm place to rise. When well risen bake lightly in a modern oven. An appetizing method to serve is to pull them apart while they are wery hot, place a generous piece of butter in each and put on the table at pnce. Never cut them, as to do so makes them heavy.

Lemon Biscuits.-Into three and a half pounds of flour rub one pound of butter, mix in one and a half cupfuls of sugar, and when the whole is absolutely smooth add eight drops of lemon essence, a teacupful of honey, water and sufficient milk to form a thick dough. After breaking the dough smooth, divide it into pieces about the size of a walnut, flatten, and cut out with a biscuit cutter, and bake till lightly colored in a moderate oven. Serve cold, when they are delicious, and keep in a tin canister.




