 ountry, was in Spur Monday and hile here was a pleasant caller the Texas Spur office.Mr. Shaw said that he had been engaged in the farming business during the greater part of his ife. He has farmed in the Red River and other bottom lands of Eastern Texas, and has made more than twenty successive crops in Dickens county. His experiences and results in farming in Dickens county in comparison with his farming returns in the bottom lands further east reveals the fact that, one year with another, the Dickens county land leads all others in successful and successive production. In the bottom lands, he savs, a more abundant harvest mav be had in an ideal season, but that insects, weevils and worms depredate on the crops to such an extent that the average er yield is less than in Dickents county where no insects and weevils exist and the only drawback to abundant harvests is a possible lack of rain
