Worthless Brush and Weeds Waste Much Water In Texas

Carbon, Eastland County, Texes, 76435

"Worthless brush and weeds waste nearly as much water as is used for all other purposes in Texas," according to H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, Temple. "One of our greatest potentials for saving water is reducing this waste by non-economic plants."

Smith said at least 10 million acre-feet of water could be saved annually by a complete grassl and restoration program in Texas. This is about three-fourths the amount now used by all consumers. This saving would go a long way to assist in easing future

water shortages, he said. This is part of the information in a new publication just released by the SCS, "Grassland Restoration, Part V, Effect of Water Yield and Supply," by C. A. Rechenthin and H. N. Smith. The booklet is the fifth in a series dealing with Texas rangelands. It documents hug e water losses that occur each year from brush and weed infestation. It shows how municipal, industrial, and agricultural water supplies are reduced on watersheds infested with brush and weeds.

In a 1964 survey, SCS found that 88 million acres, or 82 percent of Texas' 107 million acres of grassland, are infested with brush. Range conservationists say that four out of every five acres are producing less than half their potential.

More than one-third of the rain that falls in the State each year is being used up by non-economic plants, according to estimates made by Dr. J. R. Johnston of the Agricultural Research Service. He says that 138 million acrefect are being wasted by weeds and brush each year.

Since grass uses less water than most other plants, there are vast opportunities for cutting water losses by improving infested grasslands. Using the limited research

Using the limited research available, Bechenthin and Smith give a detailed study in the new booklet of the effects of grassland improve ment on water supplies. For example, treating salt-cedar infested afcas could save as much as three fect of water per year for each acre treated. Savings on upland would vary from more than 6 inches in the eastern part of the State to smaller amounts in drier sections.

Annual water savings could total 2 million acre-feet each in the Brazos and Colorado River watershed; one million each in the Nueces and Red River watersheds (Texas portion); three-quarter million each in the Rio Grande-Pecos and Trinity watersheds; and more than onehalf million acre-feet in the Guadalupe-San Antonio Water sheds.

The 1967 marketing year for shorn wool, mohair, and unshorn lambs ends Dec. 31, 1967. All producers have until Jan. 31, 1968 to turn in their receipts to the ASCS office and file an application for incentive pay. Payments will be made in March or April of '68 for the 1967 marketing year.

There will be a referendum on cotton marketing quotas Dec. 4-8. The referendum will be by mail or you may return your ballot in person to the ASCS Office. Ballots will be mailed to all eligible voters Dec. 1. If quotas are approved in the referendum, price support will be available to all growers who do not exceed their 1968 cotton allotment. If the vote is unfavorable there will be no quotas or penalties for the 1968 Upkand Cotton and no price support or diversion payments.

The lease or sale of cotton allotments will be in effect for the 1968 crop year regardless of the outcome of the referendum. Farmers desiring to sell or lease their allotment must file their transfer documents with the county office not later than Jan. 2, 1968.

Requests for cost-shares on winter cover crops are still being accepted by the ASCS Office. However, 1967 pro gram funds have been depleted and all new requests will be charged to 1968 program funds. If funds do become available after Jan. 1, due to state underearnings under the Agriculture Conservation Program for 1967, the requests






