Arts degress in biology. A graduate of Carbon High School in Carbon, Tex., he attended Cisco Junior College where he received his Associ-ate of Arts degree in 1963 and the University of Texas at Austin where he received his BA in microbiology in 1965.

"The graduate study awards for the coming year represent the largest number given by TCU," Dr. Sandy A. Wall, associate dean of the Graduate School, announced. "This year more than 280 students will receive more than \$500,000 in financial aid with funds made available by the University and such sources as National Aeronautics and Space Agency, National Defense Education Act, the National Science Foundation and research grants. Those named as fellows and assistants for 1967-63 represent 31 states, 3 foreign countries and Hong Kong. Texas is represented by 120 students with 42 of these from Fort Worth. Pursuing work in 16 fields of study, the appointees have earner their bachelor's degrees from 28 Texas colleges, 50 out-of-state institutions and 24 foreign universities. Sixty eight of the award recipients hold bachelor's degrees from TCU.

## **SBA Official Tells Countians That** New Industry Requires Effort

"It takes effort to get new industry" interested county residents were told at a specaal information meeting Wednesday morning at the courthouse. Financing new industry in Eastland County was the subject, and M. Ray Smith of Dallas, loan officer for Indus-trial Development loans of Small Business Administration, was speaker. He was introduced by O. M. Boyle, lo-cal Farmers Home Administration supervisor, and chairman of the county Technical Action Panel.

The small Business Administration's local development program is based upon a simple philosophy-self-help, Mr. Smith said.

SBA's local development company loan program is bas-ed on the principle that each

community bears a major responsibility for its own health and economic growth.

It is designed as much to help the progressive community move forward, as it is to help the depressed community rebuild its economy and grow stronger, he added.

It was authorized under Section 502 of the Small Business Investment Act of 1958. Under this program, SBA loans are made exclusively to local development corporations chartered under state laws for the primary purpose of assisting small businesses, t h e speaker noted.

A local development corporation is formed by a group of citizens and it's main objecttve is to attract new industries to the community or to expand existing ones, creating jobs and stimulating the local eco. nomy.

Program requirements require that at least 75 per cent of the corporation's stock must be owned by the townspeople. In addition, the corporation must provide at least 20 per cent of the cost of any project it undertakes. This means that for every \$2 of local money provided, the development corporation can borrow.\$8 from SBA.

Loan funds may be used to buy land, acquire or build a plant, convert, modernize or expand plant facilities, or purchase machinery and equipment. The loan proceeds cannot be used for debt payment or working capital.



Service, that acreage diverted under the 1967 feed, grain and cotton programs may now be grazed. The dates were changed from Nov. 1 to Oct. 1, but no hay can be harvested from the area. He added this grazing provision does not apply to soil bank or cropland adjustment programs. ASCS regulations require hat in order to maintain full history for peanuts, 75 per cent of the allotment must be picked or threshed in the current or either of the two pre-ceding years, Mr. Meredith said. If this provision applies to a farm in 1967 and failure to plant or pick and thresh was due to abnormal weather conditions farmers may re-quest a waiver of this provision not later than Dec. 1, 1967. Producers who overplanted their 1967 peanut allotments are reminded again that the area must be disposed of before harvest, in an acceptable manner in order to prevent marketing quota penalties and loss of price support. It is most important that this be




