In a wire feceived by the B. W. Wyat family of East-land from Washington D. C., Friday, Sep. 29, at 8:30 p.m. it was learned that their son had heap interved in Wiesen had been injured in Vietnam. The wire read:

"This is to inform you that Bruce W. Wyatt, U. S. Marine Corps, was injured in the vacinity of Quang-Tri, Republic of Vietnam.

"He sustained a fragmen-tal wound to the head from a hostile artillery round while in a defensive position. His condition and prognosis were excellent. He was treated in the field and returned to duty. -

'In view of the above report, no further report will be sent to you.'

Pfc. Wyatt is the son of Mr. and Mrs. B. W. Wyatt of Eastland, who reported that Bruce receives no mail ex cept by helicopter and that ammunition and chow were considered first. Also, that there was no candy or ice there and that the only news the boys there received was in the form of personal mail.

County Bond Sale lops \$15,000

Mr. Guy P. Parker, Chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bonds Committee announced today that sales in Eastland County totaled \$15, 555 during the month of Aug-

ust. Sales for the first eight months of 1967, totaled \$139, 342 and this is 38 per cent of the 1967 goal of \$370,000.

Series E & H Savings Bond and Freedom Share sales in Texas during August totaled \$13,863,163 which is an increase of 8.3 per cent over the same period last year. Sales for the first eight months totaled \$111,942,171 and this is 62 per cent of the 1967 sales goal of \$181.3 million.



peanut farms was conducted Thursday morning by De Gordon, Eastland County agricultural agent. The tour began at 9 a.m. with the Wallace peanut digger demon-stration on the D. D. Warren farm.

Next stop was at the Claude Fuller farm for a check of ir-rigated peanuts. Fuller has harvested an early crop of peanuts with 60-bushel-per acre yield, which is below the 1966 average but still a good yield.

Irrigated peanuts were also checked at the Gene Snyder farm north of Gorman. He harvested nine acres that produced 129 bushels per acre with a grade of 73.

Results of Di Syspon for thrip control were checked at the Durwood Burgess farm. Last on the Gorman tour was the J. O. Jackson farm west of Gorman.

These peanuts have been treated with Terroclor for control of southern blight.



Tidelands Case Is Coming To **Forefront** Again

Texas Tideland litigation is coming to the forefront again, State Attorney General Crawford Martin said in impromptu remarks during a speech in Eastland Monday.

Scheduled to argue before the Supreme Court next week, Gen. Martin said the case is one in which the federal government is sueing the State of Texas for some \$200 million involving some 46,000 acres of

When the tideland bill was passed in the late 1950s, it provided that all other states bordering open water would relinquish all off-shore holdings further than three miles out, and Texas, beyond 10.5 miles out.

Now the federal govern ment in its suit, wants that arrangement set up, and based on the coast-line of 1845. This would involve choice Salt Doom oil areas, Martin said.

Gov. Martin will argue before a seven-man court, he said, with Chief Justice Earl Warren and Thurgood Mar shall sitting the hearing out. Warren was attorney general

"About half my time is spent with the federal govern-ment," Martin said, "half the time they're suing us and the other half, we're suing them."






