into another year's operation, and scheduled to consider the new budget Monday, Eastland County tax payers might like to know "how things are shaping up?" Good to average, a look at

the figures in the county tax office reveal. Tax values are down a little, but the resulting revenue is just a few dollars less than last year, based on the traditional anticipated tax collections.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Edgar Altom reports that the 1967 tax roll has been finished and a letter of approval has been secured from the State Comptroller's office in Austin. Altom and his dupties are now preparing tax notices to be mailed Oct. 1.

Property values are holding well considering the decreases each year in oil and gas production and utilities. For example, the ttax roll value for 1967 is \$21,924,040 against a value of \$22,012,150 for 1966 - a decline in values of only \$88,110.

This will mean an acual decrease in tax revenue for the state of \$414.12 and for the county of only \$704.88.

\$21,924,040 \$22,012,150 That first listing, resident, includes rendered residential and oil production, and its interesting to note that new construction, fairly heavy in homes throughout the county, helped offset the loss in oil values, bringing the 1967 lists considerable up.

The unrendered listing continues to decline yearly as more and more is rendered. Naturally the railroad listing is self-explanitatory with the two railroads in the county reporting lass rolling stock. The bank lists is bright for the five county bank's stocks and holdings.

The county's revenue for 1967 is expected to be \$175,392, 32, slightly down from 1966's \$176,097.20.

For the past ten years or more the county has collected more than 92 per cent of the tax roll currently. Even with a change in the economy and decrease in population, the

Tax Collector Edgar Altom and two of his deputies were in Austin last week, delivering the tax roll, and touring the Texas Highway Department, being briefed on changes coming up in licensing procedures for automobiles, trucks and trailors in 1968.

The county saves a tidy sum every year with Altom doing the oil and gas roll, a chore for which other counties pay professional firms thousands of dollars.

Old Age Grants Are Raised \$4

State Senator Tom Creighton announced today that effective with the October payment, all Old Age Assistance grants will be raised \$4 above the amount currently recom-mended by the local worker. The maximum Old Age Assistance grant will be raised to \$104 per month.

Effective on the same date all aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled Assistance grants will be raised \$5 above the amount currently recom-mended. Maximum aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled Assistance grants will be \$79.

Texas Tortoise, **Horned Lizards Now Protected**

AUSTIN-The slow moving Texas tortoise and the bizarre horned frog or toad are now protected from commercial exploitation by laws passed by the 60th Legislature, according to Howard Lee, director of programs for the Texas Parks and Wildlife De-

Senate Bill 386 protects only the Gopherus berlandieri or Texas tortoise. The Texas tortoise, found only in South Texas and Northern Mexico, is completely harmless and eats fruits from the common cactus and young plants.

Lee said commercial exploitation of the land tortoise is rapidly depleting the population from South Texas and Northeastern Mexico. He said the slow reproduction rate of the tortoise could lead to its extinction and could possibly upset the ecological balance

Violation of the law carries a misdemeanor penalty and a fine from \$10 to \$200. The law protecting the Texas tortoise can also include confinement in the county jail for not less than 10 days and not more than 60 days in addition

Senate Bill 331 protects all species of the horned toad o frog, which is neither a toad or a frog but a lizard and member of the same family as the Iguana found in Mex ico and Central America.

A handbook of lizards indicates there are some 13 species in the United States with three found in Texas. The three found in Texas. book lists wide variances in the species. Some are egg layers while others are live bearers. Some squirt blood from their eyes which ruin a white shirt or a pair of khaki trousers, Lee said.

"Otherwise, they are harmless-except to the ant popu-

lations," he said. Both laws provide that each tortoise or horned lizard taken, killed, or possessed for commercial exploitation shall constitute a separate offense.

LEGAL NOTICE

In compliance with the Texas Election Code as amended which fixes a minimum of 50 voters for each precinct, ascertained by the number of receding Presidential Election Year, the Eastland County Commissioners' Court passed the following order:

Effective January 1, 1968, all qualified voters now residing in Precinct No. 7 at Kokomo shall vote in the Gorman Election Precinct, it being the intention of this court to annex the present Kokomo Precinct with the Gorman Precinct; it is further ordered that the Election Precincts of Pioneer and Nimrod be annexed to the present Rising Star Election Precinct and voters who now reside in the Pioneer and Nimrod Precincts shall vote in the Rising Star Election Precinct after January 1, 1968; and it is further ordered that the Scranton Election Precinct be annexed to the Cisco Election Precinct and voters now residing in the Scranton Election Precinct shall after the 1st of January, 1968, vote in the Cisco Election Precinct.

It is further ordered that various Election Precincts of Eastland County be renumbered as follows:

Precinct No. 6 — Carbon.
