### Homecoming Set On Sept. 30

The annual May Homecoming will be held Saturday, Sept. 30, according to a report. Activities will begin at 10 a. m. and go through the afternoon with a parade ex-student business meeting, and pep rally. The football game between May and Rising Star will begin at 8 p. m. and the day's festivities will end with a dance following the ball game.

Organizations and merchants from the surrounding area have been invited to enter a float in the parade. Prizes will be given, the report said.

With the county about to go into another year's operation, and scheduled to consider the new budget Monday, Eastland County tax payers might like to know "how things are shaping up?"

Good to average, a look at the figures in the county tax office reveal. Tax values are down a little, but the resulting revenue is just a few dollars less than last year, based on the traditional anticipated tax collections.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Edgar Altom reports that the 1967 tax roll has been finished and a letter of approval has been secured from the State Comptroller's office in Austin. Altom and his deputies are now preparing tax notices to be mailed Oct. 1.

Property values are holding well considering the decreases each year in oil and gas production and utilities. For example, the tax roll value for 1967 is \$21,924,040 against a value of \$22,012,150 for 1966 — a decline in values of only \$88,110.

This will mean an actual decrease in tax revenue for the state of \$414.12 and for the county of only \$794.88.

That first listing, residential, includes rendered residential and oil production, and its interesting to note that new construction, fairly heavy in homes throughout the county, helped offset the loss in oil values, bringing the 1967 lists considerable up.

The unrendered listing continues to decline yearly as more and more is rendered. Naturally the railroad listing is self-explanatory with the two railroads in the county reporting less rolling stock. The bank lists is bright for the five county bank's stocks and holdings.

The county's revenue for 1967 is expected to be \$175,392, 32, slightly down from 1966's \$176,097.20.

For the past ten years or more the county has collected more than 92 per cent of the tax roll currently. Even with a change in the economy and decrease in population, the

Tax Collector Edgar Altom and two of his deputies were in Austin last week, delivering the tax roll, and touring the Texas Highway Department, being briefed on changes coming up in licensing procedures for automobiles, trucks and trailers in 1968.

The county saves a tidy sum every year with Altom doing the oil and gas roll, a chore for which other counties pay professional firms thousands of dollars.

### Old Age Grants Are Raised \$4

State Senator Tom Creighton announced today that effective with the October payment, all Old Age Assistance grants will be raised \$4 above the amount currently recommended by the local worker. The maximum Old Age Assistance grant will be raised to \$104 per month.

Effective on the same date all aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled Assistance grants will be raised \$5 above the amount currently recommended. Maximum aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled Assistance grants will be \$79.

These increases are possible due to increased appropriation for these two programs made by the recent session of the Texas Legislature.

### Auction Report

A total of 941 head of cattle went through the ring at the Eastland Livestock Auction on Sept. 19. There were 242 hogs and 94 sheep and goats. There were 221 consignors and 77 buyers.

Prices reported were: butcher bulls, 19 to 23; stocker bulls, 20 to 29; butcher cows, 17 to 19.60; canners and cutters, 12 to 18; butcher calves, 23 to 26.50; stocker steer calves, light choice, 27 to 33; and heavy choice, 23 to 30; stocker heifer calves, 23 to 27.

Yearling heifers, 20 to 25; stocker cows, \$110 to \$165; pairs, \$140 to \$230; butcher hogs, 10 to 19.90; sows, 16 to 18; packer goats, 4 to 6; stocker goats, 2.50 to 5.00 per head.

### Texas Tortoise, Horned Lizards Now Protected

AUSTIN—The slow moving Texas tortoise and the bizarre horned frog or toad are now protected from commercial exploitation by laws passed by the 60th Legislature, according to Howard Lee, director of programs for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Senate Bill 336 protects only the Gopherus berlandieri or Texas tortoise. The Texas tortoise, found only in South Texas and Northern Mexico, is completely harmless and eats fruits from the common cactus and young plants.

Lee said commercial exploitation of the land tortoise is rapidly depleting the population from South Texas and Northeastern Mexico. He said the slow reproduction rate of the tortoise could lead to its extinction and could possibly upset the ecological balance. Violation of the law carries a misdemeanor penalty and a fine from \$10 to \$200. The law protecting the Texas tortoise can also include confinement in the county jail for not less than 10 days and not more than 60 days in addition

to the fine of the limited area where it is found.

Senate Bill 331 protects all species of the horned toad or frog, which is neither a toad or a frog but a lizard and member of the same family as the Iguana found in Mexico and Central America.

A handbook of lizards indicates there are some 13 species in the United States with three found in Texas. The book lists wide variances in the species. Some are egg layers while others are live bearers. Some squirt blood from their eyes which ruin a white shirt or a pair of khaki trousers, Lee said.

"Otherwise, they are harmless—except to the ant populations," he said.

Both laws provide that each tortoise or horned lizard taken, killed, or possessed for commercial exploitation shall constitute a separate offense.

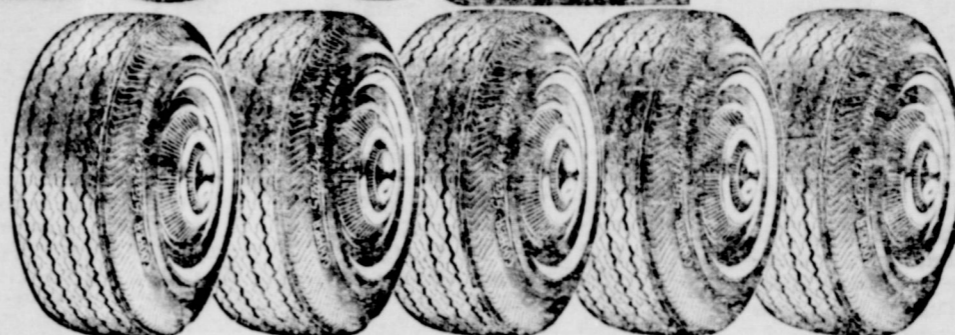

A camera crew making color still and motion pictures for use of the Texas Tourist Development Council in nationwide advertising and publicity programs visited Lake Cisco Tuesday afternoon to take scenes.

Manager Jim Smithers of the Chamber of Commerce accompanied the photographers and assisted them. They obtained the services of Miss Marilyn Roberts, who recently was named Miss Cisco of 1967, who was used in scenes at the swimming pool — the world's largest man made pool.
