Everyone to Register For Voting in 1968

J. M. Cooper Buried In Final Rites Saturday

James Major Cooper, 60 former Eastland County Agricultural Agent, died at 7:20 p. m. Thursday, Sept. 14, in Eastland Memorial Hospital where he had been a patient two days.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the First Methodist Church in Eastland, with the Rev. Len Layne, Pastor officiating. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery under the direction of Arrington Hamner Funeral Home.

Born April 19, 1907, in Center, he married Betty Jo Siders on May 29, 1934, in Marietta, Oklahoma.

He had lived in Eastland for 23 years, moving here from Breckenridge. In 1966, he retired as county agricultural agent following 22 years of service in that office.

Mr. Cooper was a member of the Lions Club and past president of the Texas Agricultural Association of Agents. He was president of the Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association and was known as "the father of the Pecan Show" which he started and which has since spread across the state.

He was a member of the First Methodist Church and served as assistant teacher for the Men's 9:45 Bible Class.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Jody of Bryan; one daughter, Mrs. D. L. Kinnaird Jr. of Eastland; one sister, Miss Lida Cooper of Center; and two grandsons, Jimmy and Dwight Kinnaird of Eastland.

Pallbearers were Ben Freeman of Ranger, Herman Schaefer of Cisco, Pat Miller of Eastland, Travis Hilliard of Olden, Cecil Schultz of Rising Star, and Sam Kimmell of Cisco.

Everyone in Eastland County who wants to vote in 1968 is going to have to register in order to be eligible.

It will mark the first time that the county will be able to evaluate accurately its voting potential, because for years, overage persons have not had to register. Recently enacted legislation is changing all this and every voter will have to have his name on the registered rolls in order to be eligible to cast ballots in 1968.

That's the word from County Tax Assessor-Collector Edgar Altom, who cites amended voter registration law, passed by the 60th Legislature, and interpreted by Secretary of State John L. Hill.

The new laws amend the election code to require that all voters must be registered in order to vote at elections held on or after Feb. 1, 1968. This change is in keeping with the constitutional amendment voted on at the general election in 1966, Altom said.

This amendment which does away with the exemptions from registration previously accorded to persons over 60 years old, living outside cities of 10,000 or more, does not become effective until Feb. 1, 1968, and those persons may continue to vote without registration until that date in Eastland County but must register if they wish to vote in elections held in the voting year '68. There are no towns with as many as 10,000 people.

Voter registration for 1968 will begin at the tax office at

Annual Eastland County Pecan Tour Scheduled For Sept. 22

The date of the annual tour of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association has been set for Sept. 22 with visits to four orchards in the Cisco area scheduled for inspection, it has been announced by J. M. Cooper, Eastland, president of the association.

The group will leave from The Spot Cafe in Cisco at 9:30 a. m. on the above date with the first stop to be at the Howard Cole orchard, west of that city. Cole has been developing this orchard for a number of years.

Second stop will be at the Leon Valley orchard just east of Scranton, managed by R. L. Ricks and owned by Jim Jennings, Abilene, Hobby McCall, and Bob Yarbrough, Dallas. This is one of the larger planted orchards in the county. It has made great improvements under Ricks management, according to Cooper.

The third and last stop prior to lunch will be at the Dale Carlile orchard, east of Nimrod. This orchard was set out and managed for many years by Lee Lieske, Cisco.

Following lunch a business meeting will be held dealing principally with plans and the site of the annual county pecan show to be held in December. Those desiring to invite the group to hold the show in various towns in the county are invited to do so at this

time. A large pecan crop will be harvested in the county this fall.

The Earl Walker orchard, a mile south of Cisco will be the fourth and final stop. Plans here call for the demonstration of some machinery for harvesting pecans.

Dr. Wendell Horne, Extension Plant Pathologist for Texas A&M will be on the tour to discuss pecan diseases. Tom E. Denman, Horticulturist for West Cross Timbers Experiment Station at Stephenville will answer questions on pecan insects. County Agent De Gordon, R. L. Ricks, A. D. Ellington served as a committee to plan the all day affair.

Farm Bureau's Tour of Europe Has 100 Texans

One-hundred persons will be leaving the Lone Star state within the next few days to participate in Texas Farm Bureau's third annual Market-Builders Tour to Europe.

For 15 days the group will be visiting six European countries. They include France, Switzerland, Germany, Belgium, Holland and England.

"As a result of TFB's 1965 and 1966 European Tours, markets have been opened for such Texas products as fresh beef, grapefruit, turkeys, feed grains, carrots, pecans and onions," TFB Commodity Director Walter Meyer said. This year's group will stay in Europe's luxury hotels and dine in its finest restaurants. Participants on this year's

trip represent every section of the state from the farm West to deep East Texas and from the Panhandle to the Lower Rio Grande Valley. "With this number of persons participating who have interest in selling and promoting various Texas products I look forward to a fruitful as well as enjoyable 15 days," Meyer said. "I feel that we have only scratched the surface as foreign marketing is concerned. In certain areas the opportunity is there, provided that we have the products that fill the bill. Our tour, combining business and pleasure, I feel, is one of the better ways to let the farmers and ranchers of Texas see for themselves what can be done in the exporting field," Meyer said.

The following Saturday, the Rangers will be on home turf for their first conference tilt against Wharton Junior College. Game time for all the games this year will be 8 p. m. Home games will be played at Ranger Stadium on the RJC campus.

Other conference games this fall include on Oct. 7 battle with Tyler Junior College at Tyler; an Oct. 14 clash with Kilgore Junior College at Kilgore; Oct. 21 game against Henderson County Junior College at Ranger; an Oct. 28 session with Navarro
