CARBON 1967-68 TERM NOW IN PROGRESS

Faculty and student body beheld a bright new look when clesses resumed at Carbon Public School Monday, Aug. 28.

Thanks to the hard work and dedicated effort of local supervisors and youngsters, a lot of floors, walls and ceilings have been scraped clean and re-painted, making for an over-all generally spruced-up appearance.

Under the general supervision of Supt. Jimmy Hughes, the fix-up project has been accomplished through the County School Superintendent's Office and the Neighborhood Youth Corps.

Among the projects were the re-decorating of the homemaking cottage, refinishing and painting in the gymnasium, and painting in the cafeteria. A new football dressing room has been constructed. The school building, ag shop and bus barn has been provided with additional storage space.

Classes will begin Monday at 8:45 a. m. with a six-period school day until Oct. 31. Custodian I. D. Hogan has been instrumental in overseeing the program. He and Supt. Hughes were busy this week helping the ten youngsters in the program get things back in place in time for the school opening.

Tuesday also saw work being done on the system's water well pumping equipment.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Eastland with the Rev. Haston Brewer, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in the family plot at the Fastland Cemetery under the direction of the Arrington - Hamner Funeral Home.

Dr. Poe was born in Columbia County, Ark., Jan. 3, 1883, he came to Eastland County in the fall of 1894. He lived on a farm and ranch in the Long Branch Community until grown, and attended Brittian Academy of Scranton.

Dr. Poe taught his first school at "Lone Cedar" in 1901-02. The Lone Cedar Country Club was named for this school.

On Dec. 1, 1907, he married Bertia Evelyn Holbrook in Eastland.

He was also active in Eastland Church and civic affairs. He was a member of the First Baptist Church, president of the Men's Bible Class, president of the Lion's Club of which he was a charter member and he also held a life membership in the Lion's Club.

During World War II, he received four citations from the President of the United States, one for each year of the war, for his services of the soldier boys. He was also made honorary Captain of the National Guard after the war for his services.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Galand of Midland; two sisters; Mrs. Frank Lovett of Eastland, and Mrs. Virgil Been of Plains; one brother, J. N. of Eastland; two grandchildren; and four great grandchildren.





Adults will have an opportunity to brush up on basic reading and writing skills this fall under a new program sponsored by the Ranger Min-isterial Alliance and Ranger Junior College.

Ranger Junior College will supervise the program and rovide classroom facilities. The program is offered under Division of Adult Basic Education of the Texas Education Agency.



Peanut Growers To Convene In Stephenville September 1

D. B. Warren, President. Southwestern Peanut Growers Association has announced that the Annual Meeting of the big peanut growers organization will be held at Stephenville, on the campus of Tarleton State College beginning at 9:30 a. m. on Sept. The meeting will be held in the Student Center. Warren explained that this year's

meeting will again feature production research findings of scientists at Texas A&M University and Oklahoma State University as these findings relate to practical everyday application of the peanut grower on the farm. This, he said, has proved to be the

most popular type program with peanut growers in previous years. For example, the topic of "Disease Prevention" will be discussed by Dr. Wendell Horne, Plant Pathologist, Texas Agricultural Fatension Service, one of the noted authorities in this field. Peanut growers are known to have lost from 23 to 30 percent of their production in the field the past two years because of plant diseases. Therefore, this top-ic should be of prime interest

to all peanut growers because to some degree all growers in peanut producing areas in the Southwest experience serious difficulties due to diseases. Another common problem, that of "Insects in Peanuts' will be explored by Mr. Philip J. Hamman, Assistant Entomologist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In the area of peanut quality the most critical period probably exists from the time that peanuts are dug until the time that they are actually processed by shellers. This phase of maintaining quality

through the best known prac-tices will be discussed
