

Fort Worth, Tex., July 7 .-Henry N. Pope, president of the 'exas Farmers' Union, yesterday issued the following statement:

The annual meeting of the Farmers' Union to be held in Houston August 8, has among its most important problems that of marketing the present cotton crop. This involves bonded warehouses, and finances for the distress cotton, and for holding the surplus crop. The greatest of the marketing problems is finances, for many farmers cannot hold their cotton unless the money is advanced.


