### GRAVELING THE AUTO HIGHWAY THROUGH SPUR

The Fort Worth-Roswell Auto Highway is being gravelled through Spur, the work having been completed at this time.

The grading east of Spur and to the county line has been completed and the workmen are now grading from Spur west to the county line.

Other counties are making preparations in carrying the road work on through. Crosby county is preparing to issue bonds in the sum of sixty thousand dollars, the greater portion of which will probably be used on this roadway. Stone-wall county is considering the proposition of bridging the Brazos River which will be necessary to make the connecting link in this highway.

This highway means much to this section of country, and the citizenship along the proposed route now fully realize the importance of building the necessary first-class roadway.

### METHODIST PREACHER SERIOUSLY CHARGED

T. A. Jackson, of Clairemont, pastor of the Clairemont Mission M. E. Church, including the Methodist churches at Clairemont, Girard, Duck Creek and Red Mud and Watson, was arrested Friday of last week on charges of attempted criminal assault on two small girls and placed under \$1000 bond pending his appearance before Justice Wade for a preliminary hearing.

The offense is alleged to have been committed Wednesday afternoon near the Lower Red Mud school house at which place Jackson was conducting a protracted meeting.

The complaining witness are daughters of Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Gaddis, of Red Mud, and their ages are said to be six and nine years, respectively.

It is said that the accused had no statement to make when arraigned.

The meeting being conducted by Jackson at Red Mud was discontinued following his arrest and another meeting was scheduled to have commenced at Clairemont Saturday night is not being held.—Girard Reporter.

In the first primary election ex-Governor O. B. Colquit led the ticket by fifteen or twenty thousand plurality with five candidates in the race.

Seven other brick business houses have just recently been completed in Spur, and the probability is that two or three other brick houses will be contracted before the end of the fall season.

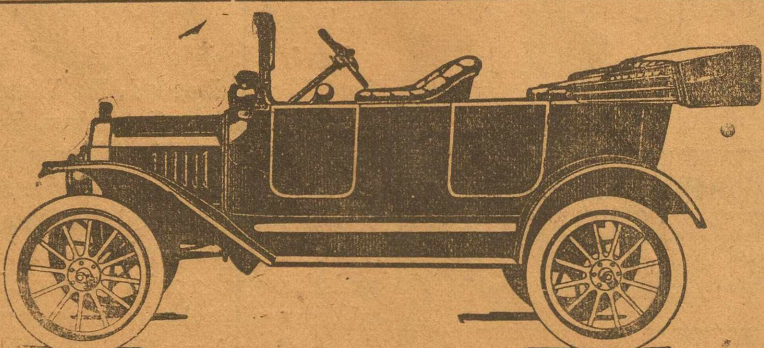
We said in the beginning that Spur was destined to become one of the best towns in all of Western Texas, and this prediction is now coming true.

# Wood Cutting Prohibited On Spur Lands!

Notice is Hereby Given That Any Person Who Cuts Wood of Any Kind Whatever From Any of Our Lands Any Where Now or Hereafter will Be Prosecuted to the Fullest Extent of the Law Without Favor or Consideration

**IN** Some localities in past years, the lands have been shamefully cut over, regardless of our rights, and those of purchasers of land not occupied. Carl Patton returned the first of the week from Dallas and other eastern markets where he spent a week buying fall goods for the Hogan & Patton firm.

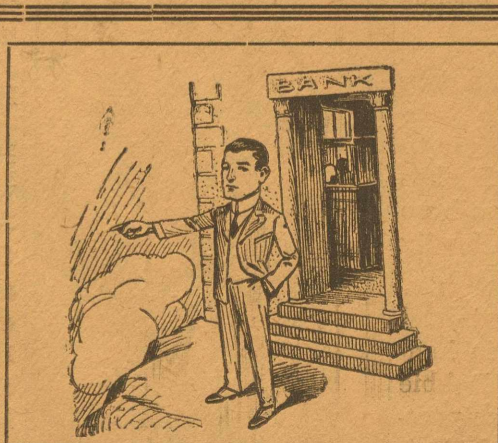

Great preparations are now being made to entertain the largest crowd that has ever been in Spur.

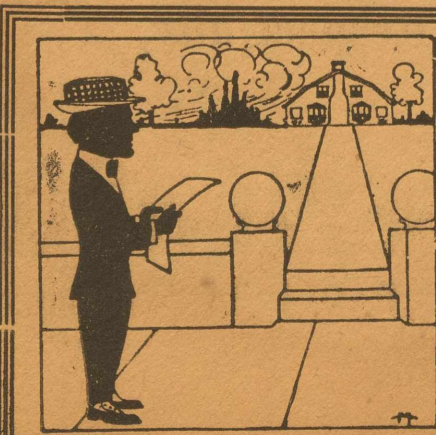

few of which will be mentioned. In the first place, every child in the district should be started to school on the opening day if possible. One who comes in a week or month late hampers both himself and the class. He has perhaps failed to get some principles that are necessary to his advancement, and as a consequence he finds that he can not proceed. He loses interest and is a drag the rest of the year, oftentimes, or has to work in a lower grade.

Again, we consider it exceedingly important that every student be in school every day, and on time. A week out of school for a student is just like taking a link out of a chain. Many of the subjects are just like stairways—each step leads up to another, the lower being

necessary to reach the higher. Then if a boy is absent and misses a few steps to the stair, his advancement is impeded. Who of you parents would like to climb a tall ladder out of which numerous rungs had been taken? It is often the case that children are out of school without the knowledge of the parents, or the child is out on some excuse that is absolutely trivial. I used to be troubled with a good mother who would send a note every Friday afternoon to have her daughter excused; but the daughter was always able to be in town or go to the picture show. In looking over the records for the past year, I found one instance where a student out of the nine months had been absent or tardy just one

hundred times. The school authorities were so swamped with work that they had not sufficient time properly to look after such things. But I think that such conduct on the part of a student is very harmful both to himself and to the school. He should either be in school or should be out for good. Again, many pupils and parents do not seem to realize the harmfulness of being tardy. The school is profoundly disturbed by a late comer, and the child himself builds up habits of the wrong kind. Of course, absence and tardiness are some times unavoidable, but you can help us by seeing that they do not occur when they are not unavoidable. We will work against them in the school, but we will have to have the help

of the home if we are successful in eradicating these wrongs.

Another way in which you can help us is to provide your children with sufficient books without any grumbling on your part. The man who long ago was confined to his arithmetic and speller sometimes forgets that we have to have more tools than he had, and that we can not go over and over the same book as he did. If your child never needs a higher book, it is a pretty good sign that he is making no progress. And if he is making no progress, he had better be out at work some where. In this connection, I will say that you can help us wonderfully by seeing that these books are studied at home. We can assign lessons and punish students for not bringing them up; but we can not force them to study at home. If he studies at home, he will be interested and we can do something for him when

he comes to school. Many parents say that it does no good to force a child to study unless it wants to. There is where you are mistaken. You had as well say that it does no good to force the child to learn to do any other kind of work unless it wants to. The habit of work is necessary to all success. And, further, provide your children with a place where they can study. A boy cannot do his algebra in the family room where the other children are playing, or where you are talking. The writer once knew a man who whipped his children for making low grades in school, though he had them to study in the family room where he spent about half the time reading aloud to his wife the interesting things he found in the Dallas News. And do not forget this: children can not study at home at night unless they are at home. If you think the habit of going to par-

ties or picture shows during the school nights is more important than their school work, we can not help your children much. All we ask is that you become thoroughly awake to the welfare of your children, and we will do our part with joy. Come to the school and visit it; know how your child is doing from first hand observation. Some times you will discover things about him that you never knew before.

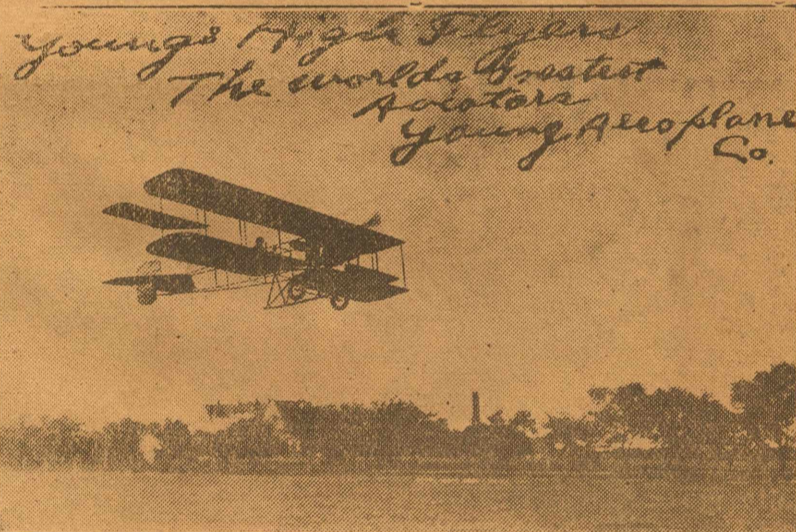
