The question was frequently asked during the past growing season "how is it that the Station farm has better crops than
the other farms over the country?" The answer is that we perform the work at the proper time. We realize that we are
in a semi-arid country and that in a semi-arid country and that moisture is the first problem in successful farming. It is not that we plow deeper or cultivate oftener but that we do it as nearly the proper time as possible. There are many farmers in the Spur country that spend as much per acre in
producing a crop as the Station producing a crop as the station the soil moisture as effectively as we do.
The statement is often made we can't prepare our land as early as you do". Probably they can not, yet it does not make it any the less necessary, or prevent the evaporation of moisture from the soil any less, or assist in catching the scanty winter rains for summer crops. look forward to the time that he can prepare his land early for the succeeding year's crop.
