



**BROOM CORN CROP** SIGNED AT \$100 A TON

Ringling, Okla., Jan. 19.-Contracts for 1917 broomcorn two sows. at \$100 a ton are being made by bankers in the region of Carnegie. Not in years at this season has there been a forecorn that would warrant such a price, seven to eight months before the broomcorn harvest and weeks before the planting of the current year's crop.

"This indicates to me," says H. C. Bluhm of the Creel Grain Company, "that before much of the year's crop of brush has gone to market the price of this will have advanced to \$150 a ton. Evidently the warehouses are not fully stocked and manufacturers see that the supply of brush is likely to be nearly exhausted before the new crop comes in. This is the best argument I know of for the planting of broomcorn in Southern Oklahoma.
