

AND HIS DUTIES

The County Agent is the representative of the County, the State Agricultural College and the United States Department moved from the Powell ranch D. C. He should assist the farmer and ranchman in every way possible, and should foster and encourage every enterprise or organization that is for the betterment of the county.

Symptoms: The animal separates from the herd and stands with its head down and when made move usually drags one leg, which on examination will be found to be swollen up near the body. However, it is possible to be found anywhere on the body. When the case ad-vances, the animal lies down. The effected parts continue to enlarge and will show signs of fever. On rubbing or massaging, a crackling sound as of crushing parchment paper can be noticed, due to the collection of gases in the lesion. The coagulated blood can be seen if the animal is skinned and it will have the appearance of a severe bruise.

Blackleg is caused by a germ known as bacillus of symptomatic anthrax, for which there is no known cure, but a very good preventative is available in the form of vaccine will only hasten its death, but if vaccinated two or three weeks before exposure eighty-five to one hundred per cent will never show any indications of the disease. Animals should be vaccinated from six months to two years of age. twice a year. Do not wait until the disease is in your herd to vaccinate.

As indicated there is no cure and the germ will live for years in the soil, therefore, it is dangerous to drag the dead animal after being skinned, or to leave the carcass lying around even in the most remote places. as the germs may be scattered by birds, dogs, hogs, wolves, etc. Burning the carcass, or burying very deep is the safest method to control this dreaded stock disease. They can easily be burned by saturating them with oil and laying them on an iron wheel, or digging small trenches under them so the air can pass through easily. It is evident that this disease is spreading throughout Dickens county and every precaution should be used to stamp it out before it spreads farther.

The government vaccine isfurnished free upon application and can be obtained by writing to Doctor L. J. Allen, First National Bank Building, Fort Worth, Texas. However, the County Agent usually has a supply on hand, and when an outbreak of blackleg is noted, advise him at once and he will be glad to help in any way possible to control the disease. Through him you have access to specialists along this line.— G. L. Crawford, County Agent, Dickens County.


