TWO MILLION INVOLVED IN RANCH DEAL

Values around \$2,000,000.00 were involved in the sale of a ranch in ValVerde and Terrell counties, from Sidney Webb of Bellevue to Julian M. Bassett of Crosbyton.

The ranch contains about 400,000 acres, of which about 300,000 was held by Webb and the balance by lesses. With the land sold was included 7,-000 head of cattle, 20,000 head of sheep and several hundred horses, and all ranch supplies and equipment.

In part payment, Bassett gives Webb his entire holdings at Crosbyton and in Crosby county, including the famous Silver Falls ranch, formerly the headquarters ranch of the Kentucky Cattle Company, embracing approximately 20,000 acres and also about 12,000 acres of improved farms in Crosby coun-
