

The maize did make a good crop by reason of the fact that it was worked. The dryer it gets in this country the more crops should be worked. We remember a number of years ago during one of the dry years, one man of the country worked his cotton crop continuously-just as soon as he finished plowing, he turned back to the first rows and commencing plowing it again. We are confident that this man plowed over his cotton crop a dozen times without a drop of rain falling, and he was the only man in that section who made a good cotton crop that year. His neighbors made fun of him for plowing so much in the crop where there were no weeds or anyhing but cotton to plow. His reply was that he had nothing else to do, and if he failed to make a crop he would have his land in fine shape for another year. The experiences of the old timers of West Texas is that "the dryer the year the more crops should be worked and the soil stirred."


