IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE WORLD WAR

Peace Made With Bulgaria and Germany and Austria Ask for an Armistice Which is Denied Them by Inquiries.

During the past several days important and strategical changes favorable to the allies have been wrought.

The first great favorable news was that peace had been made with Bulgaria, a peace made by terms dictated by the allies. Bulgaria has disbanded her troops and allows the allied nations to pass through that country and use their resources as they see fit. The Macedonian front has been detached.

At a late hour Saturday night the official news that Germany had asked for an armistice that peace negotiations might be made, set this country on a whirl. It developed officially that Germany had requested the United States to use her good offices for an armistice and peace negotiations, saying that they would accept President Wilson's recent terms as a basis for peace negotiations.

These differ as to the real meaning of this strategic move on the part of the Germans. Some say they are doing it for time to better organize their defeated armies, others that they desire to hamper the sale of Liberty Bonds in the fourth campaign, others seem to think that they are the best they can get, but will accept unconditionally as a final peace rather than have our armies occupy their territory and plant the seeds of liberty, justice and freedom upon the domes of the state at Berlin. That they fear retaliatory measures for their atrocities to be meted out to them as their armies flee back from the wrath that has already come and leave their lands desolate and wasted as they have done to Belgium and France.

The new peace proposal came from the new Chancellor Maximilian who has been appointed to the place of Von Hindenburg, resigned. President Wilson's answer to the proposal is in substance as follows:

"Sir: I have the honor to acknowledge, on behalf of the President, your note of Oct. 6, enclosing communication from the German Government to the President; and I am instructed by the President to request you to make the following communication to the Imperial German Chancellor:

"Before making reply to the request of the Imperial German Government, and in order that reply shall be as candid and straightforward as the momentous interests involved require, the President of the United States deems it necessary to assure himself of the exact meaning of the note of the Imperial Chancellor.

"Does the Imperial Chancellor mean that the Imperial German Government accepts the terms laid down by the President in his address to the Congress of the United States on the 8th of January, last, and in subsequent addresses and that its object in entering into discussion would be only to agree upon the practical details of their application?"

"The President feels bound to say with regard to the suggestion of an armistice that he would not feel at liberty to propose a cessation of arms to the governments with which the Government of the United States is associated against the Central Powers so long as the armies of those powers are upon their soil. The good faith of any discussion would manifestly depend upon the consent of the Central Powers immediately to withdraw their forces everywhere from invaded territory.

"The President also feels that he is justified in asking whether the Imperial Chancellor is speaking merely for the constituted authorities of the Empire, who have so far conducted the war. He deems the answer to these questions vital from every point of view.

"Accept, sir, the renewed assurances of my high consideration.—Robert Lansing."

In the meantime the allied armies continue to push the Huns back, capturing important territory, towns and strategical points of battle. In fact, it is announced that the whole German army is now menaced, and a collapse is not unexpected. On with the battle to Berlin.

GOOD RAIN FALLS IN SPUR TUESDAY

Tuesday night of this week one of the biggest and best rains of the season fell in Spur and surrounding territory. In Spur .85 inches fell. At the Spur Experimental Station the rainfall registered 1.15 inches. In the Steel Hill and Duck Creek communities four inches of rain fell on Tuesday and Wednesday, covering whole fields and washing over roadways, the rain extending only a few miles to the east of that section. On Cat Fish and eRd Mud two or three inches of rain fell. Between Spur and Dickens the rain was light, but to the north and east of Dickens the rainfall increased, giving good seasons throughout the Afton and Draper sections.

The rain was sufficient in many sections to encourage the sowing of wheat, and a considerable acreage will probably be sown to wheat for winter pasturage.

In the Duck Creek country the rain was accompanied by hail which is said to have done considerable damage.

This rain is worth thousands of dollars to farming and cattle interests.

SPANISH INFLUENZA NOW EPIDEMIC OVER THE COUNTRY

Spanish Influenza is now epidemic throughout the country. Thousands of soldiers in camps are dying of a complication of influenza, pneumonia, etc. The disease is not confined to the army camps, but is spreading over the country, and civilians are suffering the effects of the disease. A number of cases are reported in this section, and precautions are being taken to prevent its further spread.

Years ago an epidemic of "la grippe" raged over the whole country, and until it was better understood thousands died of the disease. Spanish Influenza is similar to the "grippe" of past years, and will probably soon be under complete control.

As precautions in preventing further spread of the disease, all people are asked not to sneeze openly, nor spit promiscuously, since these are the greatest means of its spread. In sneezing or coughing, place a handkerchief over the mouth. Keep in the open air as much as possible; sleep with windows open; drink water frequently; avoid common drinking cups and wash your hands frequently, and avoid crowds as much as possible.

All Business Will be Suspended One Hour, and All People Requested to Meet, Observe the Day and Raise Bond Quota.

Saturday, October 12th, is the anniversary of the discovery of this country, and is the day set apart by the Treasury Department as Liberty Day throughout the United States.

A special observance of the day is asked because our sons in greater numbers than ever before are now fighting in France. Liberty is coming into her own and will soon free the world. Again, there is a special reason for the observance of the day, because, while everything carries the hope and promise of success and victory, yet now as never before is every ounce of energy, every scrap of enthusiasm necessary in order to bring to a successful issue the great war for right.

All Fourth Liberty Loan Committeemen throughout the county have been communicated with by County Chairman M. H. Lee, instructing that the day be observed by meeting together of all people to give thanks for the blessings vouchsafed to them in this land of the free, and to translate thankfulness into subscriptions to the Fourth Liberty Loan.

At Spur, Dickens, Afton and McAdoo, all business houses are requested to close from two to three o'clock, during which time appropriate programs are to be rendered and the full quota of Liberty Bonds subscribed.

All other communities of the county are expected to meet at public meeting place to observe the day and also fill up the Liberty Bond quotas.


In France, and those now in training camps, that we at home are backing them to the limit.



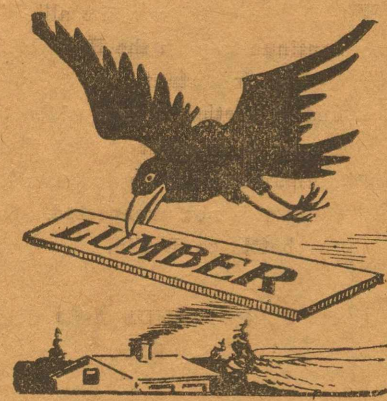

INTERESTING LETTER FROM
"OUR BOYS OVER THERE."

Mrs. Laura Crump:

Dear Mother and all:—Will write you all a few lines this eve. I am feelin' fine, but it is pretty cold over here. We landed yesterday eve. Everything here is sure different from what it is in the U. S. All the buildings are made of stone—I haven't seen a house built of lumber yet, but I guess it takes all of the lumber to make wooden shoes—all the old women and children up to 12 or 15 years old wear wooden shoes. I have seen some pretty girls, but haven't had a chance to talk with any of them. There is not much difference between the looks of the French and American girls, only most all the French girls have real dark hair. Some of them have brown eyes, and part of them blue, and lots of them can speak some English.

We are camped out of the town in a hay field, and sure do have some time of it. I don't know how long we will be here, but I hope they will put us in the trenches pretty soon, as I would like to get a shot at some of those Germans, or get after one with my bayonet.

We had a nice trip across and did not find any submarines. I don't know any war news. I haven't been here long enough to learn anything only that they have the Germans backing back pretty fast. They have very nearly all of them out of France and I don't believe that the war will last over 12 months longer anyway, and perhaps not that long.

If it keeps getting colder I think it will be pretty cool by December or January, for today has been just like summer day and we have one of those hot pancho (that is our

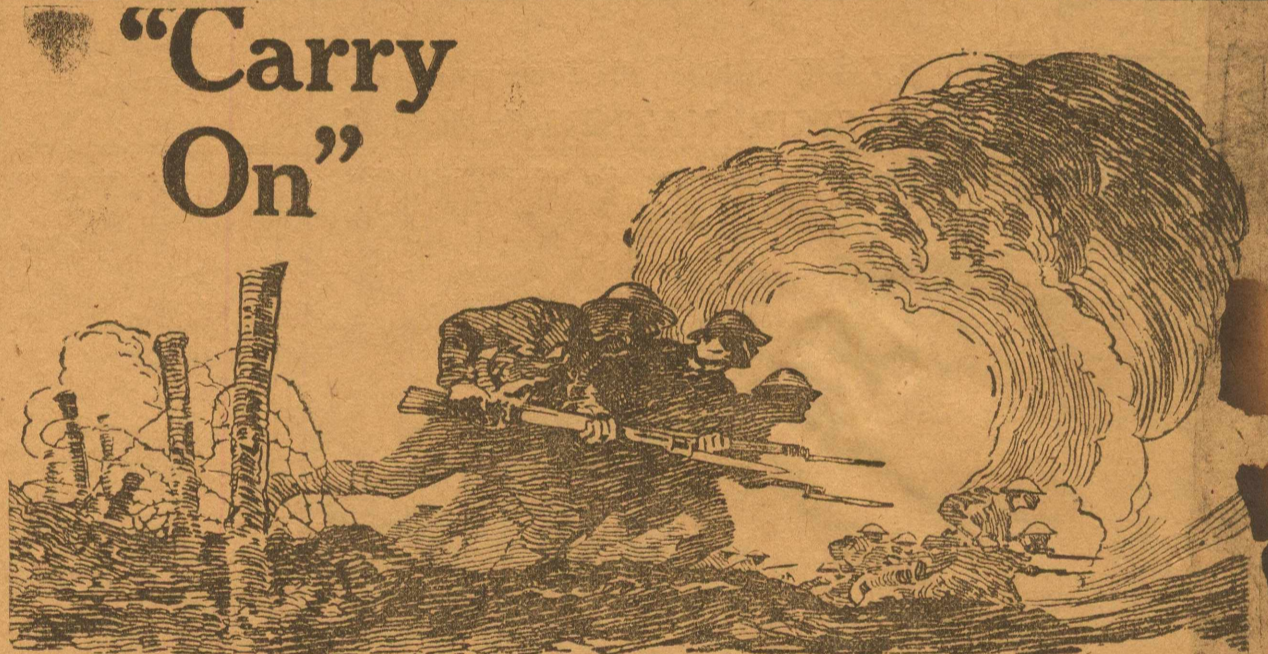
The ladies in charge of the Red Cross rooms at Spur will direct you to the Home Service. If you can not come, write to the Chairman of Home Service, Spur, Texas.

Dollars that Fight

By SENATOR HENRY CABOT LODGE

The war will be won by men and ships, by guns and airplanes. To raise armies and supply them, to build the navy and support it, and to furnish ships and transport, we must have money in large amounts. The expenditures of the Government for the ensuing year are estimated at \$24,000,000,000, a sum which baffles the imagination to conceive. That vast amount must

come one-third from taxes and two-thirds from loans. The success of the Fourth Loan, like those that preceded it is, therefore, absolutely necessary. We must work with the highest speed, as if the war was to end in six months. We must prepare in every direction, as if it was to last for years. Speed and preparation are both expensive.

Without the Loans we cannot have either

We are fighting to secure a just, righteous and lasting peace. For a complete peace we must have a complete victory. It must not be a peace of bargain or negotiation. No peace which satisfies Germany can ever satisfy us. No peace that leaves Germany in a position to renew the war against us will be worth having. It will be far from sufficient to gain all our objects on the Western front—Belgium, Alsace-Lorraine, Italia Irredenta. The President with wisdom and foresight and great force expressed his determination to redeem Russia. Russia

must not be left in Germany's hands. That would mean another war. Poland must be free. Slav republics must be established to bar the way between Germany and the East. Serbia and Roumania must be redeemed. All these things are essential. *Nothing will bring them but complete victory and a peace dictated by us and our allies.* It is a conflict of ideas. It is the principle of evil arrayed against the principle of good. It is the battle of freedom and civilization against barbarism and tyranny. *We must win and we shall win.*

We cannot win without money, and therefore, these Loans are vital, and the country should rally in all its strength and subscribe and oversubscribe the Fourth Liberty Loan

The farmers of this country should take warning now, and not pull cotton since you will lose seven to eight and ten dollars per hundred pounds. Pick your cotton and then pull what is impossible to pick.

Camp Travis, Texas, Oct. 1918
Dear Old Texas Spur and Editor:
—Since letter writing happens to be the enjoyment of a great number of the soldier boys this evening—some are writing to their wives, others to their lady friend. However, as I have no lady friend, I thought I would write the Texas Spur, a paper which I have read from the first original copy, until it has become a leading West Texas paper.

I wish you people liked army life as well as I do. I believe there would be a bunch of you to go into the service today.

Well, boys the army life is the ideal life for a young fellow of today.

When we hang the old Kaiser to a sour apple tree which is soon to come, then you would like to be there. However, if you are not there you will dog-gone sure hear something about it.

We have some camp here. Camp Travis alone has 60,000 men, yet remember they are not all trained soldiers. There were sixteen thousand rookies that came in the same week Dickens county boys arrived. There is more twenty one years old boys here than you ever saw. We are also near two other soldier camps which are only a few miles from us. We have enough soldiers in Texas, if they were trained and furnished with supplies, to wipe out the German Empire.

I tell all you fellows, if you want a romantic life get into the service of Uncle Sam—always something doing, either work or fun, plenty of both.

The Y. M. C. A. gives a program and picture show every night except Sunday.

I think all Dickens county boys like the service. I was put in 27th Co. where only one or two of the boys are located.

All you people who have not much to do, I would be glad to get a letter from you any time. You know all soldier boys like to get letters from different ones in his home country. It makes him still think of home folks. It is a joy to soldier boys to get them. Well, when they send me across "over there", which I hope they will speed up the time, I will write you some real war experiences.
